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# JESUS CHRIST, TRUE GOD AND TRUE MAN

#### Session Overview

In this session the participants will consider the question "Who are you?" in relation to one another and to Jesus. By asking one another the question "Who are you?" they will identify the many characteristics that define a person, including name, origin, background, family members, and so on. They will then explore the Scriptures and Church teachings to discover more about who Jesus is, with special emphasis on Jesus' being fully God and fully man. Through reflective sharing the participants will have an opportunity to recognize that without a personal relationship, we cannot truly know Jesus or one another, and that personal relationships help us to overcome misjudgments or prejudices that result from differences among us. In the optional session extension, the participants will reflect on events that take place at Christmastime and how they might modify some of these events to keep Christ in Christmas.

#### Objectives

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Enable the participants to do the following:

- explore the question "Who are you?" in relation to one another and to Jesus
- learn that Jesus is fully God and fully human
- understand that we learn about who Jesus is through the Scriptures, Church Tradition, participation in the sacraments, personal and communal prayer, and personal relationship with Jesus

#### **Preparation Tasks**

- Set three chairs in the front of the meeting space facing where the participants will sit.
- ☐ Write on the board the following instructions for the quick-start activity:

Pick up an index card and find other participants who

- were born in the same month as you
- · have the same favorite food as you
- have a first name that starts with the same letter as your first name
   Have them sign the card with their initials.
- Have the index cards available for the participants to pick up as they enter the meeting space.

#### Catechist Prayer

Who are you, Jesus? Lord, I ask that question with my group of young people. Open my heart to the truth of your message and your love, and give me courage and strength to share that truth. Amen.

### Session Steps

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#### A. Quick-Start Activity (5 minutes)

Greet the participants as they enter the meeting space. Point out the following instructions on the board, but also share them verbally if any participants need help referencing the board:

Pick up an index card and find other participants who:

- · were born in the same month as you
- · have the same favorite food as you
- · have a first name that starts with the same letter as your first name Have them sign the card with their initials.

#### B. Welcome and Opening Prayer (5 minutes)

- Welcome everyone and make any announcements.
- 2. Light a candle, make the Sign of the Cross, and lead everyone in saying, "Let us remember that we are in the holy presence of God."
- Invite a volunteer to read John 1:1-5.
- 4. Pray the following:
  - ► Creator God, we stand before you today with open hearts and minds, seeking to know more about your Son, Jesus. Through the Scriptures, Church Tradition, and personal relationship, help us to truly know you, Lord. Amen.

Close with the Sign of the Cross.

5. Briefly explain that this session will explore the importance of relationships, with Jesus and with one another.

#### C. Who Are You? (10 minutes)

- 1. Invite three brave risk takers to volunteer to be interviewed by the rest of the participants. Choose young people who are very different from one another. Ask them to step out of the meeting space for just a moment. While they are gone, explain to the rest of the participants that they will be asking the volunteers only one question, over and over again each time: "Who Are You?" Write "Who Are You?" on the board.
- 2. Welcome the volunteers back into the meeting space one at a time, and invite each to sit in one of the chairs in the front. Explain to the volunteers that when it is their turn, they will each call on other participants, who have many questions to ask. Tell the volunteers that their job is to



answer the questions truthfully, but that they may not repeat answers; they must give a different answer for each question asked. 6

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Suggest to less verbal or shy volunteers that they write their responses on the board or even act out their answers. Invite the volunteers to call on others who have their hands raised. Monitor the asking and the answering to make sure the participants ask only the question "Who are you?" and the volunteers never answer in the same way twice. Encourage fun by raising your hand and asking "Who are you?" in a funny voice, by writing it on a note and passing it to the volunteers, or by asking the question in a different language (e.g., "¿Quién eres tú?" or in sign language). Each volunteer should be asked the question five to ten times before inviting in the next volunteer.

- When the participants are done interviewing the third volunteer, ask the volunteers these questions:
  - ▶ Did you enjoy being interviewed?
  - ▶ How did it feel to be asked the same question over and over?

**Ask** the rest of the participants:

- ▶ What did you learn about our volunteers that you didn't know before?
- 4. Thank the volunteers for being brave risk takers.

#### D. Who Is Jesus? (20 minutes)

- 1. Share with the participants that they are going to brainstorm to identify all the categories the volunteers used to answer the question "Who are you?" They probably will have started with their names, followed by responses like "I am a student" or "I am Italian." Give a few minutes of thought time for slow processors. Write the heading "Categories" on the board. Invite the participants to consider other ways of answering "Who are you?" to add to the category list. Include name, origin, birthplace, age, family members, friends, titles, occupation, residence, religion, gender, nationality, education, hobbies, and other categories that give us clues about who a person is. Leave this list on the board as a reference.
- 2. Explain that you are now going to read two Gospel passages and then spend a few minutes studying some of the words from the passages for insight about who Jesus is. Distribute a Bible to each participant and then ask everyone to open to the beginning of the Book of Matthew. Invite the participants to help others who might be having trouble finding it. While the young people are finding the Gospel in their Bibles, write "Matthew 1:1" and "Matthew 2:1" on the board. Also start a chart on the board with the following headings: "Word," "Category," "Who Are You?"

3. Explain to the young people that their job is to read along and listen carefully as you read these two Scripture verses, and to snap their fingers or say the word who like an owl when they hear something about Jesus that sounds like any of the "Who are you?" categories listed on the board. Read the Scripture verses slowly, emphasizing, if necessary, the words in the following chart. After each snap, or "who," invite the participants to identify the word from the verse, the category the word fits into, and how the word answers the question "Who are you?" about Jesus. Record this information under the headings on your chart. When you are finished, the chart should look something like the one that follows. As you record the information, share the italicized explanation of the deeper meaning of each word.

Word	Category	Who Are You?
Jesus	name	gives Jesus' name, which means "God saves"

Christ title

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Jesus' title is Christ, which means "the anointed."

Christ is the Greek word for the Hebrew word Messiah. The title Christ tells us that Jesus is anointed by the Holy Spirit as priest, prophet, and king.

Jesus is a descendant of Abraham. Abraham religion

Jesus is descended from Abraham, the father of the Jewish people. This tells us that Iesus was Iewish.

tells us Jesus is connected to the family of David family David

Jesus is descended from a King. He is a descendant of David and meets the requirements to be the Messiah.

> Iesus was born as a human baby, of a born origin human mother.

Jesus entered into human history and was born as a human baby, which helps us recognize that he is truly human.

4. Divide the large group into small groups of two or three. Be flexible about allowing some young people to work in pairs or even solo if group work is a problem for them. Distribute to each small group a slip of paper with a Scripture passage to look up (use Matthew 1:18-23, Mark 9:7, Luke 3:21, John 1:14, John 8:58, John 10:30, Philippians 2:6-7). Explain that their job is to locate and read the passage, and then try to figure out how it answers the "Who Are You?" question about Jesus.

- Invite a representative from each small group to read the group's Scripture passage and to share what the group thinks it tells us about who Jesus is. Support each presentation with your own insights.
- Describe the Catholic perspective on who Jesus is by explaining the following points in your own words (be sure the participants have their Catholic Connections Handbook for Middle Schoolers available):
  - As Catholics we believe we learn much about who Jesus is through the Sacred Scriptures and Church Tradition. The names and titles for Jesus, his family, his ancestors, and other aspects of Jesus' life teach us a great deal about who Jesus is.
  - ▶ We believe Jesus is a divine Person with two natures. He is fully man and fully God. As fully God [reference image of Christ on page 100 of handbook that emphasizes his divinity], Jesus is the second Person of the Trinity and is eternal. As fully human [reference image of Christ on page 98 of handbook that emphasizes his humanity], the Son of God took on flesh and

became like us in all things but sin.

- The truth that Jesus

- ► The account of Jesus' baptism helps us to see that he is in an eternal relationship with the Father and the Holy Spirit.

# E. Knowing and Being Known (15 minutes)

Discuss with the participants some of the many
ways Jesus has been
misunderstood. Include
misunderstandings from
his day (the Pharisees'
seeing him as a threat to
their authority, the



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Zealots' seeing him as a potential military leader against the Roman occupation, and so on].

- 2. Share a story that is appropriate for the age-group about a time in your life when you were misunderstood. Perhaps you were the victim of a rumor, or someone got a bad first impression of you. Describe how you felt, how the misunderstanding impacted your relationships, and how it was resolved.
- 3. Invite a few volunteers to share their own stories of times in their lives when others had impressions of them that were not true. Tell these volunteers that their sharing must be appropriate for public sharing; they should not use offensive or derogatory language. Support the volunteers with compassionate, thoughtful responses to their sharing.
- 4. Facilitate a large-group discussion using the following questions as a guide:

Part 2: Jesus the Christ

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#### Who Is Jesus Christ?

How do we get to know who Jesus Christ is? We might start by thinking about how we get to know and understand people in general. We spend time working, playing, and relaxing with them. We think about what they say and do. We get to know them as persons. Someone is kind and caring. Someone else is determined and stubborn. We get to know their talents and abilities. One is great in math. Another is a terrific storyteller.

We get to know lesus Christ in a similar way, Only, because his earthly life is long in the past, we have to rely on the reports of others who were with him at the time. Those reports are part of God's Revelation, which is passed on to us through the Scriptures and Tradition. What do the Scriptures and Tradition tell us about lesus?

They show us that Jesus is a divine person with two natures. He keeps the divine nature that he has had for eternity. He also takes on our human nature. He is not just God or just man or some sort of half-and-


ust have laughed He was like us in all things except sin and rienced the same



- ► How do others learn about who we are?
- ► How do others get false impressions of who we are?
- ▶ How are people with special needs sometimes misjudged?
- ▶ Have you ever thought badly about someone, but then after spending time with her or him, realized that she or he is a good person?
- ► How do we learn about who lesus is?
- ▶ Is hearing about Jesus from the Scriptures and Church Tradition enough? What else can we do to answer the question "Who are you?"

5. Witness to the importance of entering into and maintaining a personal relationship with Jesus in order to really get to know him. Encourage the participants to continue to learn about who Jesus is through the Scriptures, Church Tradition, personal and communal prayer, frequent participation in the sacraments, and recognition that we can experience the risen Lord in the hearts of others in the Body of Christ.

#### F. Closing Prayer (5 minutes)



Encourage each participant, in turn, to respond to the following question asked in unison by the group: "Jesus, who are you?" Each participant will answer by saying, "Jesus is . . . "Reference the categories on the board, and encourage a variety of answers.

#### Conclude with the following:

▶ Jesus, we thank you for revealing yourself to us. As we discover more about who you are, we discover who we are. We love you and are grateful for your eternal love for us. Amen.

Close with the Sign of the Cross.

Note: If doing the optional course project, you may wish to take time now to explain the project and hand out any takehome instructions for parents.

### Optional Session Extension

#### Keeping Christ in Christmas? (15 minutes)

This session extension works best just before the closing prayer.



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#### Materials Needed

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-13 -3 Gather the following items:

an audio recording of a Christmas song and a tape or CD player

- 1. Start the Christmas song and then brainstorm with the participants a list of things that happen at Christmastime. Include both sacred and secular traditions and happenings (e.g., midnight Mass and last-minute shopping). Record the participants' ideas on the board.
- 2. Ask the participants to consider each event on the list and whether Jesus would fit in, feel comfortable, or be welcome. Write a "J" beside each event during which Jesus would fit in.
- 3. Consider with the participants the remaining items on the list, discussing whether the event could be modified to be more welcoming of Jesus. Write the modifications of the event on the board next to the event, and add a "J" next to them as well. For example, exchanging gifts with family could be modified to purchasing and giving gifts to families in need.
- 4. Challenge the participants to make a list of their own practices at Christmastime, and to modify their plans to keep Christ in Christmas.

#### Discussion Starters

- Think about the people in your life whom you do not like very much. Could getting to know them better change your view of them? What steps could you take to get to know them better?
- Do you feel as if you really know Jesus? If yes, how can you get to know him even better? If not, what are some things you can do to get to know
- Identify some of the barriers in your life to a good relationship with Jesus. What can you do to remove those barriers?

#### Media Connection

As an introduction to the session, as the participants are entering the meeting space, you might want to have a song playing that is related to the "Who are you?" concept, such as "Who Do You Say?" by the Paul Colman Trio, on the album One (Essential Records, 2003).
