Session Background

Purpose

Jesus is our model of wisdom. We follow his way to know true happiness and salvation. This session helps young people understand the qualities of Jesus as teacher.

Objectives

Learners will

- know and rely on Jesus as our source of wisdom.
- understand that Jesus' wisdom came from being the Son of God.
- explore the way that Jesus taught through words and actions.
- explore the challenge of living by the values of God's kingdom as presented in the Beatitudes.

Catechist Formation

Jesus provides a voice of wisdom amidst the clamor of society's many pressures and norms. Jesus did not accept the status quo. He did not follow the norm just because it seemed the acceptable thing to do. He healed, forgave, and spent time with people most rejected. Jesus offered a way of acting toward others based upon divine values: peace, love, and justice.

Jesus shared his wisdom through the things he said and did. He was an amazing teacher, who taught wherever he went. Jesus' quintessential teaching is the Beatitudes. The word beatitude means "blessed or happy." The Beatitudes are about the present and the future to which we are called by God: a share in the divine nature, eternal life, and rest in him.

What values of Jesus and the kingdom do you most need to embrace at this time in your life?

Young Adolescents Learning Faith

- Young adolescents are looking for heroes and engaging in more complex decisions because of expanding social and personal roles. In the midst of these changes, we have an opportunity to present Jesus as their guide and model.
- To believe this message, youth need to experience your enthusiasm for Jesus and his teachings. They want to see why people choose Jesus as their model of wisdom.
- Many of the teachings identified in this session are opposite to the messages that we experience in our culture, especially those about wealth, power, fame, and physical beauty. Engage youth in wrestling with these challenging messages.

fascinating are popular culture figures; be sure to listen and be accepting of these ideas knowing that you will be presenting Jesus as our model within the session

PRAY Begin by welcoming the young people.

- Ask for their attention and begin with the Sign of the Cross.
- Light the candle. Have one participant read the Scripture passage, Matthew 4:23. A second one will read the prayer. Loving God.
- We need your Good News. Teach us and heal us. Guide us to know your wisdom that we may always live within your peace. We ask this in Jesus' name Amen

SHARE Explain that fascination means being curious, interested, or attracted to something or someone. Take 2-3 minutes to share a story about someone with whom you are fascinated.

REFLECT Ask participants to reflect on the two WHAT ABOUT YOU? questions on PAGE 13:

Who is someone you find fascinating? Why do you find that person fascinating?

- Have participants reflect quietly or record their answers to these questions in the Faith Booklet on PAGE 13.
- Ask them to share their responses with a partner.
- After 2 minutes, elicit responses to share with the large group.
- **FYI** Expect that the people youth find >>> Summarize reasons why we are fascinated with certain people.



PRESENT Introduce Jesus as teacher using these or similar words: People who knew Jesus during his time on earth were fascinated with him. They followed him, they listened to him, and they stayed with him. Many changed their lives because of him and dedicated themselves to following him and living by his teachings.

Let the group know that they are going to learn more about Jesus the teacher.

READ Have the group read the first two paragraphs on PAGE 14 and the FAITH WALK on PAGE 15.

FACILITATE FAITH WALK ACTIVITY Qualities of Jesus the Teacher

10 minutes

This activity will help youth explore Jesus as teacher. Youth will work in groups to read a Scripture passage, and identify Jesus' qualities as a teacher. Groups will share these qualities with the large group.

- Divide the group into working groups of four to seven
- ▶ Refer to the FAITH WALK feature on PAGE 15
- Give each participant a Bible.

John 3:1-10

- Give each group six 5 x 8 index cards and a marker.
- Assign each group one of the following Scriptures. If you have more than five groups, you can repeat a Scripture.

Mark 10:13-16 Iesus and the Children Luke 15:8-10 Parable of the Lost Coin Jesus Ministers to the Crowds Matthew 4:23-24 Vine and Branches John 15:1-11

- Refer to the question: "What was Jesus like as a teacher?" posted on the wall.
- Tell the groups that the object of this activity is to identify the qualities of Jesus as a teacher. Ask participants to think about the following:

Nicodemus Visits Jesus

What do you notice about Jesus and his teachings from the Scripture? What was Jesus like as a teacher? What were his qualities as a teacher that made people remember his words and act on them?

- Instruct participants to begin by reading the assigned Scripture. Each group will identify and record three to five reasons why people were fascinated with Jesus as a teacher and chose to follow him. Each quality of Jesus should be recorded on a separate index card.
- ▶ After 5 to 7 minutes of small group time, have each group present their qualities to the rest of the group and post the cards around the question.
- Ask: What qualities of Jesus inspire you to follow him?

READ Ask volunteers to read aloud beginning with A TEACHER LIKE NO OTHER on PAGE 14 and ORDINARY LIFE, EXTRAORDINARY MEANING on PAGE 15

Have participants reflect on these paragraphs and identify further qualities of Jesus. Ask for additional responses to the question:





FYI Distribute Resource 2: Living the Message.



What was Jesus like as a teacher?

Write the additional qualities of Jesus as a teacher on index cards and post them on the wall.

PRESENT Summarize the ideas on the cards posted by participants. Then highlight the Sermon on the Mount text on **PAGES 16-17** using the following points:

Jesus' words and life taught the people around him. He taught everywhere he went. He preached in homes and synagogues, in boats, on the road as he walked, and on the shores. These teachings are collected in the Gospel of Matthew in what is known as the Sermon on the Mount.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus teaches us how to pray, how to live in a just and fair way with our neighbors, and how to honor God. The common theme of these teachings is to love God and neighbor, trust in God, rely on him, and know that his ways are the path to happiness and true peace.

EXTEND THE SESSION 20 minutes

Living the Message

In this activity, participants will explore the meaning of Jesus' teachings in the Sermon on the Mount. Youth will begin by using Resource 2 to reflect on one of Jesus' teachings. After completing their reflection on the handout, they will work in groups to create a report to share with the large group.

- Begin by reading aloud WHERE IT HAPPENED on PAGE 16. Review the Sound Bytes on PAGE 17.
- the Sound Bytes on PAGE 17.

 Divide the participants into groups of three to five members.
- ▶ Tell the groups that they will be exploring the meaning of one of Jesus' teachings in the Sermon on the Mount.
- Distribute a Bible and one copy of Resource 2 out to each participant.
- Assign each group one of the Scriptures listed on the handout.
- Instruct the participants to read the Scripture assigned to his or her group and complete the questions on the handout working individually. Allow several minutes for this portion of the activity.
- After youth have completed the reflections on the handout, distribute a newsprint sheet and a marker to each group and ask the group to create a combined report with these two elements: one sentence in their words that describes the main point of the teaching, and three to four ideas for how we can live this message today and apply this teaching to our lives.
- Ask the groups to share the main ideas from their newsprint sheet and post the newsprint on the wall.

READ Ask for volunteers to read aloud **PAGES 18–19**, beginning with **DIVINE WORDS FOR WISE LIVING** and continue through the paragraph that is titled **THE MESSAGE**.

PRESENT Introduce the Beatitudes with these or similar words:
God has placed the desire for true happiness within our hearts. In
the Beatitudes, Jesus describes people who live according to God's
ways as "blessed" meaning that they are blessed by God and that
they are happy living according to God's plan.

In magazines, television shows, and commercials, we receive many messages that tell viewers what to do to be happy. "Happy are the skinny for they will be attractive." "Happy are those with big muscles and six-pack abs for they will be irresistible." "Happy are the rich because they get to buy things." What are some other messages that you experience in the media that describe happiness?

God's plan for our happiness is not based on our outward appearance or our material wealth, status, or possession. His plan relies on our total trust in his teachings and commandments.

FACILITATE ACTIVITY Rewriting Beatitudes 10 minutes

In this activity, young adolescents will work in groups to rewrite one of the Beatitudes as a slogan or bumper sticker that explains Jesus' plan for our happiness today.

- Explain the purpose of this activity.
- Divide into groups of three to five members.
- Give each group an 11 x 17 piece of paper and a pack of markers.
- Assign each group one of the Beatitudes from the Gospel of Matthew.
- Ask each group to read their passage, discuss the meaning, and rephrase the Beatitude as a bumper sticker or slogan.
- As groups finish, ask them to share and post their bumper sticker or slogan.

EXTEND THE SESSION 20 minutes

Beatitude Drama

- Assign one of the Beatitudes to each small group from Matthew 5:3–12 and/or Luke 6:20–26.
- Ask the small groups to prepare a silent presentation of that Beatitude for the other groups. They are to show people who are living the message of this Beatitude in a situation we experience today.
- Allow 10 minutes for small group preparation.
- Ask groups to present their Beatitude and then read the corresponding Beatitude from Scripture.

REFLECT Invite youth to think about the key ideas about Jesus presented in this session.

Ask young people to share in pairs the following question: What do you notice about Jesus and his teachings?

SHARE Briefly (about 2 minutes) share why and how you follow Jesus' wisdom in your own life.

PRESENT Highlight the key ideas of this session.

- Summarize or read aloud the CATHOLICS BELIEVE on PAGE 19
- Refer to the newsprint summary previously prepared.



REFLECT Invite participants to reflect on the ideas from the summary and sharing. Ask: What does this mean for us today? What can we do to know and follow Jesus?

PRESENT Share the ideas from the LIVE OUR FAITH box by refering to the newsprint summary you prepared.

Invite participants to choose one of the ways to live out their faith and focus on it during the prayer.

EXTEND THE SESSION 10 minutes

PEOPLE OF FAITH

Help youth reflect on Oscar Romero as a person of faith.

- Ask for volunteers to read the story on PAGE 21 to the group.
- Have participants work individually or in groups to address this question:

How did Oscar Romero follow Jesus and his teachings?

- Instruct participants to look over the story and to circle a sentence, phrase, or word that reminds them of Jesus and his teachings.
- After a few moments, ask for responses and record these ideas on newsprint.
