

Catechist Background

What gives you strength?

The Israelites, our ancestors in faith, were waiting for the Messiah, the Anointed One, upon whom the Spirit of the Lord would rest. When Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist, the Holy Spirit descended upon him, signifying that he was the hoped-for Messiah. Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to empower the Apostles in their mission. The Holy Spirit came upon the first disciples at Pentecost, enabling them to do mighty deeds in God's name.

The Holy Spirit continues to empower those who are disciples of Christ. Throughout Scripture and the early Church, the laying on of hands and anointing were signs of this power, authority, and grace. They were signs of the Holy Spirit's power and presence.

In Confirmation, the bishop employs these gestures to confer the sacrament. When we are anointed with holy oil, we are strengthened to become more like Christ and share more fully in his

mission. "By Confirmation Christians, that is, those who are anointed, share more completely in the mission of Jesus Christ and the fullness of the Holy Spirit with which he is filled, so that their lives may give off 'the aroma of Christ'" (CCC 1294).

To be open to the Gift of the Holy Spirit, candidates must go through a process of preparation. During this time the candidates study, pray, and do acts of service for others. The parish community is the initiating community. Parishioners pray for and with the candidates, share their faith, and exemplify Christian living in their own lives. This preparation enables the candidates to be ready to receive the Holy Spirit, who enlivens us to be imitators of Christ.

Chapter Story

argaret could not eat much of her breakfast. She had a chapter test in math and was very anxious. All during the week and last night she had studied the material, but she had a hard time grasping fractions. One minute she remembered what to do and the next minute her mind went blank.

"Is anything wrong Margaret? Do you feel all right?" her mother inquired.

With her stomach in knots from worrying about the test, Margaret answered with a sigh, "I've studied so hard all week for this test. I still feel I don't know the stuff in math. I'm scared I am going to flunk this test. I just know it."

Her mother looked at her and said, "I've seen you studying and I bet you know more than you think. Maybe the problem is that you don't believe in yourself." Margaret's mother walked over to her and, placing her arm around her shoulders, whispered, "Before you begin your test, say a prayer to the Holy Spirit. Ask for the help to remember that God loves you no matter what!"

Later that day Margaret did as her mother suggested.

"Help me, Holy Spirit, to remember that God loves me," she
prayed. Things were going smoothly until the last section. She
could not remember how to do those problems. She began to
panic. Time was running out. Her teacher looked up and their
eves met. She gave Margaret a warm smile.

Somehow the teacher's smile made Margaret feel better. She remembered: "God loves me no matter what!" Margaret looked down at her paper again and did her best to solve those last math problems.

Why was it important for Margaret to study before the math test? How did the Holy Spirit help Margaret?

FAITH and MEDIA

Talk about the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Use these words: "Viewed in the light of faith, the history of human communication can be seen as a long journev from Babel, site and symbol of communication's collapse... to Pentecost and the gift of tongues . . . -communication restored by the power of the Spirit sent by the Son. Sent forth into the world to announce the good news . . . the Church has the mission of proclaiming the Gospel until the end of time. Today, she knows, that requires using media....'

(Pontifical Council for Social Communications, Ethics in Communications, June 4, 2000, no. 3)

CHAPTER PROJECT: CLAY MODELS

Organize the class into groups of three or four. Provide each group with a reasonable quantity of modeling clay. Explain that at the end of Days 1–4, each group will meet, discuss the lesson content, and then make something out of modeling clay to represent the content of the lesson. Groups may choose to make a scene from an important story described in the text, a symbol, a word, or another

object that closely relates to the main idea of the lesson. Provide time for groups to discuss what they want to make. Have each group show its work so that the students can see different ways of expressing the core ideas in each lesson. Display the clay models. Invite other groups to view them. Encourage the students to explain what the models mean or represent.

Additional Activities



Materials needed: Nicene Creed (See Prayers and Practices page 326.)

Explain to the students that in the Nicene Creed, we profess our belief in the Holy Spirit: "We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the prophets." Have students be mindful of these words as they review the Nicene Creed with a partner. Allow time for each partner to proclaim the Creed.

What's the Word?

Materials needed: copies of reproducible master, quide page 95F; Bibles

Distribute copies of the Scripture reproducible master. Choose volunteers to read the parts of the narrator, Luke, and Theophilus. Have these students read the script.

After the reading, use the Bibles to read together Acts of the Apostles 1:13-14 and talk about it. Then read Acts 1:15-26. Have the students write about the disciples' decision. (to choose Matthias to replace Judas as the new Apostle)

Materials needed: construction paper in a variety of colors, scissors, glue, poster board

Guide students to design a mosaic to depict a symbol of the Holy Spirit. Brainstorm a list of symbols of the Holy Spirit. (For example: a dove, fire, wind, water, anointing with oil, etc.) Have students select a symbol to sketch on a piece of poster board. Remind students to be sure to allow space for the symbol to be filled in with different sized pieces of construction paper. Cut out random shapes and sizes from multiple colors of construction paper. Glue the pieces to the sketch to form the mosaic. Allow time for the glue to dry. Have students write captions for their mosaics that explain the symbol of the Holy Spirit. Display the mosaics in a prominent place.

More to Explore

Help the students find examples of fine art online that depict the Holy Spirit. You may want to research certain Web sites and then direct the students to those specific sites.

Meeting Individual Needs

English Language Learners

Students for whom English is a second language may not be reading at a level commensurate with their peers. Pages with extensive text will require more time to work through. What's the Word?

Narrator: At the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles Luke addresses Theophilus. The name *Theophilus* means "friend of God." Let us listen in as Luke tells about the events that took place before Jesus returned to his Father in Heaven.

Luke: During the final time Jesus met with the disciples, he told them not to stay in Jerusalem. Jesus told the disciples to wait for "the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak; for John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the holy Spirit." (Acts 1:4-5)

Narrator: Luke then tells Theophilus that Jesus continued speaking to the disciples.

Luke: Jesus told the disciples "you will receive power when the holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1: 7-8)

Narrator: Luke continues to explain what happened that day.

Luke: And when Jesus finished saying this, he was lifted up on a cloud and disappeared into the sky. The disciples returned to Jerusalem, where they waited and prayed together for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Read Acts of the Apostles 1:13–14 to discover who were gathered together to wait for the Holy Spirit. Also read Acts 1:15–26 to read about an important decision the disciples made before the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Feast of Pentecost

The Book of Leviticus, chapter 23, verses 15-22, describes the Jewish "Feast of Weeks." Pentecost is the Greek word used for the feast. During the feast, the Jews offered the first fruits of the harvest to God in thanksgiving. It was a holy day celebrated by the entire community. In the Acts of the Apostles, the biblical writer records that Jews from every nation had gathered for the Feast of Weeks, or Pentecost.

On Pentecost the Holy Spirit came upon the first disciples.

WE GATHER

Holy Spirit, come to live among us. Has anyone ever helped you to change something about yourself, for example, the things you eat or the way you play sports? If so, who was it and how did you change?

WE BELIEVE

Jesus called all of his disciples to be his witnesses. He wanted them to spread the message of God's Kingdom. After his Resurrection, Jesus sent his Apostles to preach in his name and to baptize those who believed in him.

Jesus told his Apostles that they would not be alone in this work. He promised to send the Holy Spirit to guide and help them. They would be changed by the presence of the Holy Spirit in their lives. Jesus promised, "you will receive power when the holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts of the Apostles 1:8).

After Christ ascended to his Father, the Apostles returned to Jerusalem. Mary, the mother of Jesus, and some other disciples were there, too. While they were gathered in Jerusalem the Jewish feast of Pentecost was celebrated. The word Pentecost comes from a Greek word pente, meaning "the fiftieth day." This fiftieth day after Passover was a harvest festival for the Jews. On this day, the Jewish People thanked God for all their blessings, especially for the fruits of the earth.

Apostles and disciples. Ask: Name some people who can offer young people guidance. (teachers, church leaders, or older friends or family members) How does this guidance help you? (Answers will vary. Stress everyone needs guidance at some time during his or her life.) Explain that the Holy Spirit guides and helps us as we try to give witness to Jesus and his ministry.

Read the Text and Scripture Read aloud the next two We Believe paragraphs. Write the word Pentecost on the board. Have a volunteer read aloud the Scripture passage. Then have the students read and highlight the final We Believe paragraphs. Stress that the Apostles were changed men after receiving the Gift of the Holy Spirit. Explain that Peter, filled with the Spirit, changed the people who listened to his proclamation of the Good News.



It was during this time that the Holy Spirit came as Jesus had promised. This is the way the coming of the Holy Spirit is described in the Acts of the Apostles.

Acts of the Apostles 2:1-47

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the holy spirit and began to speak in different to speak to sport to speak to proclaim. Yet so the Apostles 2:1-4)

The people outside heard all of this, but they did not know what was happening. The Apostles went out into the crowd. Peter told the people that God the Father had indeed raised Jesus. He said that what they had just seen and heard had been the coming of the Holv Spirit.

Each person heard this Good News of Christ in his or her own language. The people in the crowd were amazed. They asked Peter told them to be sorry for their sins and to repent. He told them to be baptized and receive the Gift of the Holy Spirt. About three thousand people believed and became disciples that days

Each year on Pentecost we celebrate in a special way the coming of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost is also a feast of gratitude for the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit. On Pentecost, the Apostles began to go into the world as Jesus had asked.

Jesus calls all people to follow him and share his Good News with others. Strengthened by the Holy Spirit, we are all God's workers in the world.

Symbols of the Holy Spirit

Read aloud the text. Explain that many of the symbols referring to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit are found in the Old Testament. In the prophet Isaiah, we read, "The spirit of the Lord Goo is upon me" (61:1), and we find the same words used by Iesus when he

words used by Jesus when he announced the beginning of his public ministry (Luke 4:18). List on the board some of the other symbols or images suggested by the students. (dove, water, Advocate or lawyer who is on our side, and Comforter)

Laying on of hands and anointing are signs of the Holy Spirit's presence.

WE GATHER

In a classroom you often see students raising their hands. What might this action be a sign of? What are some other actions that we use as signs?

WE BELIEVE

After Pentecost the Apostles were strengthened and guided by the Holy Spirit. They began to spread the message of God's Kingdom throughout the world. They gave witness to Jesus Christ by what they said and did. They baptized many believers.

The newly baptized received the strengthening power of the Holy Spirit when the Apostles placed their hands on them. These early Church members understood the importance of the laying on of hands. This ancient action is a powerful sign of God's Delessing. By the laying on of hands, authority and grace were given in God's authority and grace were given in God's name. By the Apostles' laying on of hands, the Holy Spirit came upon those who believed in Jesus Christ.

From the very beginning of the Church there was a connection between Baptism and this laying on of hands by the Apostles. The laying on of hands was the beginning of the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Discuss Anointing Have the students read silently the remainder of the *We Believe* text. Stress that anointing occurs within the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Orders, and the Anointing of the Sick, as well as in Confirmation. Point out that Sacred Chrism is the oil with which the person being confirmed is anointed by the bishop.

Quiz One Another Form groups of three or four. Have each group develop three questions about the *We Believe* text. For example, "What happened to people As the Church grew and spread, eventually an anointing was joined to the laying on of hands. The word anoint means to apply oil to someone as a sign that God has chosen that person for a special mission. Like the laying on of hands, anointing is an ancient practice. Anointing was an important part of Jewish life during Jesus' time.

The early Church continued anointing with oil as a sign of God's presence in the life of the person anointed. The anointing that took place with the laying on of hands was a sign of the Holy Spirit's presence and of the receiving of the Holy Spirit's

In time the anointing became the essential sign of the Gift of the Holy Spirit. Sacred Chrism, oil blessed by a bishop, was used in this anointing. Today in the Sacrament of Confirmation, the anointing with oil is done as the celebrant anoints the forehead of the one being confirmed.

As Catholics...

There are many symbols that remind us of the Holy Spirit. Two of them can be found in the Pentecost story: wind and fire. Each symbol helps us to understand the ways the Holy Spirit acts in our lives.

The word spirit comes from a Hebrew word that means "wind," "alr," and "breath." The presence of the Holy Spirit is often symbolized as wind. Wind travels everywhere. It surrounds us. The Holy Spirit door, the school.

The symbol of fire suggests warmth, energy, power, and change. Fire changes whatever it touches. So does the Holy Spirit. We are changed by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Talk about other symbols or images of the Holy Spirit.

On the Feast of Pentecost, the Church rejoices in the coming of the Holy Spirit to the Apostles. The first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles in the New Testament instead of a reading from the Old Testament. In between the second reading and the Gospel, there is a special hymn called a sequence:

"Come, Holy Spirit" (Veni, Sancte Spiritus) sung or prayed in honor of the Holy Spirit. Locate this sequence in a missalette or in the lectionary. Gifts of the Holy Spirit

The seven gifts received in Confirmation are wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. Wisdom is the ability to know and follow God's will. Understanding is seeing others as Jesus does. Counsel helps us to discern what is the right thing to do. Fortitude is the gift to do it. Knowledge helps us to learn more about God. Piety helps us to honor God. Fear of the Lord means we know that God's loving presence is everywhere.

Preparation is an important part of Confirmation.

WE GATHER

Holy Spirit, Giver of Life, guide our way. Both at home and in our neighborhoods, we prepare for important events. Think of one. How and why do you prepare for it?

WEBELIEVE

Preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation is very important. Those preparing for this sacrament are called candidates. Candidates prepare for Confirmation by praying and reflecting on the life of Jesus Christ and on the mission of the Church. During this time candidates learn about the Git of the Holy Spirit.

During this preparation candidates grow closer to Christ. The relationship with Christ that began at their Baptism is strengthened. The candidates begin to see how they can better live out the promises made at Baptism. Through their preparation, candidates can feel a greater sense of belonging to the Church. Through their production of the Church Church and Church Church Rey learn to give writness to the Good News of Christ through their lives.

The whole parish can participate in this preparation. People in a parish:

- pray with and for the candidates
- meet with the candidates to talk about their faith
- help the candidates to find ways to serve together in the parish.

The Importance of Preparation Have a volunteer read aloud the We Believe statement. Then write the names of the following professions on the board: firefighter, doctor, lawyer, nurse, and architect. Have the students suggest what types of preparation people would have to make prior to becoming one of these professionals. For example, architects must study how buildings are constructed, and so on. Explain that candidates for the Sacrament of Confirmation also undergo a period of preparation as disciples before receiving the sacrament.

Read and Write Have the students write the phrase Preparation for Confirmation in the center of a piece of drawing paper. Have them read the first three We Believe paragraphs. As they read, have them develop a word web that describes different ways in which candidates prepare for Confirmation.

Articulate the Connections Read aloud the title of the next We Believe section, "Connections to Baptism." Have volunteers take turns reading aloud the text. Emphasize the following points:



At Confirmation we choose a name, usually that of a saint whose example we can follow in becoming closer to Jesus. Although we can choose the name of any saint, we are encouraged to take the name given to us at Baptism. This highlights the link between the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation.

If we were baptized as infants, our parents also chose godparents for us. Godmothers and godfathers are people who help us to grow in faith. When we are preparing for Confirmation, we also choose someone to help us grow in our faith. We choose a sponsor. A sponsor needs to be a Catholic who has received the Sacraments of Christian Initiation and is a person we respect and trust. Our sponsor can be a family member other than a parent, a friend, or someone from our parish. Selecting one of our godparents to be our sponsor again shows the link between Baptism and Confirmation. But whomever we choose, our sponsor should be an example of Christian living so that he or she can continue to encourage us to follow Jesus.

Sponsors can be involved in our preparation for Confirmation. They can share their own experiences with us and answer any questions we may have about our faith. Sponsors also play an important role in the celebration of Confirmation. They present us to the bishop for anointing.

Explain that part of the preparation for the reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation is learning to serve others in Christ's name. Encourage the students to look for opportunities within the parish and larger communities to witness to their being Christians, Urge them to get involved with a parish outreach program or local effort to help others in need. Tell them to check with their parents before volunteering their talents and time. Point out that young people need to go through an apprenticeship of sorts to learn the skills that are necessary to work effectively and to give witness to Christ.

 Sponsors play an important role during the preparation for Confirmation. They present us to the bishop for anointing.
