Faith Focus

The Trinity Is Mystery

Christians could never have discovered for themselves that the God they worship is one God in three Persons. They know this central dogma of Christian faith and life only because Jesus revealed it to the Apostles during his life on Earth and because he sent the Spirit to confirm it after Jesus himself ascended to the Father. Even now, humans cannot imagine what the inner life of the Trinity is really like. It is a mystery "infinitely beyond all that we can humanly understand." (See the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 251.)

The Communion of Love

The love among Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—so intense that the human mind cannot conceive it—is nevertheless the very love which you, by virtue of your Baptism, are invited to share. Throughout the process of creation and redemption, God's ultimate goal has been that all humans would enjoy living in unity and love as in the communion of the Trinity. The communion of love that exists among the three Persons of the Trinity is the pattern on which God intends you to model your relationships with others. Although you may enjoy a foretaste of this communion here on Earth, it will be fully realized only in the fullness of the kingdom of God.

Jesus commanded his followers to love one another because only by loving could they be united with a God who is love.

TEACHING CHAPTER 4

The Trinity

It is impossible to explain the mystery of the Trinity adequately. Discussing the Trinity with fifth graders presents special difficulties. Honesty demands that you tell the young people there are truths about God that surpass the human intellect. Try not to give them the false impression that adults know everything about God, but remember that talking about "the mystery of God" may also cause fifth graders to lose interest.

Fortunately, it is easy to awaken in fifth graders an interest in Christian art. A book of colored reproductions of Renaissance or Baroque Church art will almost certainly include several paintings representing the Trinity. Many classic hymns devote a separate stanza to each of the Persons of the Trinity.

- · Show students paintings, and invite comments.
- · Draw students' attention to prayers in which the three Persons of the Trinity are named (the Sign of the Cross, the Glory to the Father, the Gloria).

· Ask students to analyze the lyrics of a few hymns that include references to the Trinity.


We can't always see God's plan for us. Blessings often come in the form of hardships. The following story shows how this was true for one Christian.

BIOGRAPHY

Kidnapped

Patrick, the son of a Roman official, lived on the western coast of Britain. While working on his father's farm one day, he was seized by a group of raiders and sold as a slave.

Patrick was taken away to Ireland, a place completely new to him. Again he worked on a farm, but now he had no warm clothing to wear and almost nothing to eat. He had no family and no friends. Angry with God, Patrick thought only of his misery. Why had God allowed this terrible thing to happen?

Tell a Story As you present a story, engage students with learning disabilities in a dialogue.

JUSTICE AND PEACE

The Mystery Unfolds

As time went by, Patrick began to realize that despite his harsh life, the lives of his Irish masters were even harder because they did not know Jesus. They did not know the Christian faith, which is full of hope and love. Patrick began to pray with all his heart, turning his life and his future over to God. After six years, he escaped and made the long, hard journey home. His parents were overjoyed to see him. They hoped that he would never leave them again

But Patrick kept thinking about the Irish people he had left. He never stopped wondering about the mystery of his life and what good might come from his time among these people. One night he dreamed that they were calling him. All at once it became clear to him that because he knew their language, he could bring them the Christian faith. Although the studies were hard for him, Patrick prepared to become a priest. In time, he became a bishop and returned to Ireland. When the Irish people heard Patrick speak, great numbers of them asked to be baptized. Because of his great holiness and love for God, the Church made Patrick

A mystery is a truth of faith that you cannot fully understand but that you believe because God has shown it to people in Scripture, in the life of Jesus, or in the teachings of the Church.

The Mystery Unfolds

- Call attention to Words of Faith.
- What are some things about your own life that cause you to wonder as Patrick did? Elicit responses to the auestion.

- Have students work in pairs.
- · Allow time for students to think of questions and write them.
- Write the volunteer's questions on the board or on chart paper.
- · Discuss some of the questions.

Close

Ask students what they have learned from hearing about Patrick's life. Remind students that Patrick learned the language of the Irish people when he was a slave. As a result, he was able to preach the gospel in that language. Christians are called to lives of trust. God is with his people even when their lives take unexpected turns.

The Mystery Beyond Words

Focus Who is the Holy Trinity?

Like Patrick, people today wonder about the mystery of God and the way God works in their lives. God wants to be known, yet he is greater than anyone can tell or understand.

From earliest Old Testament times, the Israelites learned through revelation that God is one, unfailing in truth and love. Jesus revealed a deeper level of this mystery, showing that the one God is three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit-the Holy Trinity. Patrick emphasized and honored the Trinity in all his teaching. Jesus and his followers invite you into a deeper understanding of the mystery of the God you cannot see.

ohn the Baptist testified that Jesus was the Son of God, sent by the Father and filled with the Holy Spirit:

"I saw the Spirit come down like a dove from the sky and remain upon him. I did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptize with the holy Spirit.' Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God."

John 1:32-34

Whenever the Church baptizes, the names of the three Persons in the Holy Trinity are used. Those who are baptized enter into the very life of God, who is love. All of the Sacraments offer a share in God's life and into the mystery that is God-Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

SCRIPTURE BACKGROUND

Images of the Spirit For centuries the standard symbol of the Holy Spirit in Christian art has been a dove.

Living Your Faith

The Sign of the Cross helps you recall that the Trinity is with you, protecting and guiding you to live as Jesus did. When you renew your baptismal promises, you are reminded that the Trinity gives you new life that never ends.

The first commandment is this: I am the Lord your God; you shall not have strange gods before me. This commandment calls you to believe in God, to hope in him, and to love him above everything else. In obeying this commandment, you live in relationship with the Trinity.

A virtue is a habit of doing good. The virtues of faith, hope, and love are called theological virtues because they are gifts from God.

- Faith is the virtue by which you freely choose to respond to God's invitation and say "yes" to all that he has revealed.
- Hope is your desire and expectation that God will grant you eternal life with the Trinity and give you the grace to attain it.
- Love, or charity, is the virtue by which you love God above all

All people are made in the image of God because they are created by God. If you try, you can see traces of the Trinity reflected in every person. When people love one another, they reflect the communion of the three Persons in one God.


