THE PROFESSION OF FAITH

SECTION ONE

"I BELIEVE"—"WE BELIEVE"

26 We begin our profession of faith by saying: "I believe" or "We believe". Before expounding the Church's faith, as confessed in the Creed, celebrated in the liturgy, and lived in observance of God's commandments and in prayer, we must first ask what "to believe" means. Faith is man's response to God, who reveals himself and gives himself to man, at the same time bringing man a superabundant light as he searches for the ultimate meaning of his life. Thus we shall consider first that search (Chapter One), then the divine Revelation by which God comes to meet man (Chapter Two), and finally the response of faith (Chapter Three).

CHAPTER ONE MAN'S CAPACITY FOR GOD

I. THE DESIRE FOR GOD

27 The desire for God is written in the human heart, because man is created by God and for God; and 355, 170 God never ceases to draw man to himself. Only in God 1718 will he find the truth and happiness he never stops searching for

The dignity of man rests above all on the fact that he is called to communion with God. This invitation to converse with God is addressed to man as soon as he comes into being. For if man exists, it is because God has created him through love, and through love continues to hold him in existence. He cannot live fully according to truth unless he freely acknowledges that love and entrusts himself to his creator.

28 In many ways, throughout history down to the

843,2566 present day, men have given expression to their quest 2095-2109 for God in their religious beliefs and behavior: in their prayers, sacrifices, rituals, meditations, and so forth. These forms of religious expression, despite the ambiguities they often bring with them, are so universal that one may well call man a religious being:

> From one ancestor [God] made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find himthough indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "in him we live and move and have our being."2

29 But this "intimate and vital bond of man to 2123,2128

God" (GS 19,1) can be forgotten, overlooked, or even explicitly rejected by man.3 Such attitudes can have different causes: revolt against evil in the world; religious ignorance or indifference; the cares and riches of this world: the scandal of bad example on the part of be-398 lievers; currents of thought hostile to religion; finally, that attitude of sinful man which makes him hide from God out of fear and flee his call.4

to seek God.

"Let the hearts of those who seek the LORD re-2567, 845 joice."5 Although man can forget God or reject him, He never ceases to call every man to seek him, so as to find life and happiness. But this search for God demands of 368 man every effort of intellect, a sound will, "an upright heart," as well as the witness of others who teach him

> You are great, O Lord, and greatly to be praised: great is your power and your wisdom is without measure. And man, so small a part of your creation, wants to praise you; this man, though clothed with mortality and bearing the evidence of sin and the proof that you withstand the proud. Despite everything, man, though but a small a part of your creation, wants to praise you. You yourself encourage him to delight in your praise, for you have

made us for yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in you.6

П. WAYS OF COMING TO KNOW GOD

Created in God's image and called to know and 31 love him, the person who seeks God discovers certain ways of coming to know him. These are also called proofs for the existence of God, not in the sense of proofs in the natural sciences, but rather in the sense of "converging and convincing arguments," which allow us to attain certainty about the truth.

These "ways" of approaching God from creation have a twofold point of departure: the physical world and the human person.

32 The world: starting from movement, becoming, contingency, and the world's order and beauty, one can 54, 337 come to a knowledge of God as the origin and the end of the universe.

As St. Paul says of the Gentiles: For what can be known about God is plain to them, because God has shown it to them. Ever since the creation of the world his invisible nature, namely, his eternal power and deity, has been clearly perceived in the things that have been made.

And St. Augustine issues this challenge: Question the beauty of the earth, question the beauty of the sea, question the beauty of the air distending and diffusing itself, question the beauty of the sky . . . question all these realities. All respond: "See, we are beautiful." Their beauty is a profession lconfessiol. These beauties are subject to change. Who made them if not the Beautiful One [Pulcher] who is not subject to change?8

33 The human person: With his openness to truth and beauty, his sense of moral goodness, his freedom 1730, 2500 and the voice of his conscience, with his longings for the 1776 infinite and for happiness, man questions himself about God's existence. In all this he discerns signs of his spiri-

- 366 tual soul. The soul, the "seed of eternity we bear in ourselves, irreducible to the merely material," can have its origin only in God.
- The world, and man, attest that they contain within themselves neither their first principle nor their final end, but rather that they participate in Being itself. which alone is without origin or end. Thus, in different ways, man can come to know that there exists a reality which is the first cause and final end of all things, a re-199 ality "that everyone calls 'God.' "10
- Man's faculties make him capable of coming to a knowledge of the existence of a personal God. But for man to be able to enter into real intimacy with him. 50 God willed both to reveal himself to man and to give him the grace of being able to welcome this revelation
- in faith. The proofs of God's existence, however, can 159 predispose one to faith and help one to see that faith is not opposed to reason.

THE KNOWLEDGE OF GOD ACCORDING Ш TO THE CHURCH

- "Our holy mother, the Church, holds and teaches that God, the first principle and last end of all things, can be known with certainty from the created world by the natural light of human reason."11 Without this capacity, man would not be able to welcome God's 355 revelation. Man has this capacity because he is created "in the image of God."12
- In the historical conditions in which he finds himself, however, man experiences many difficulties in 1960 coming to know God by the light of reason alone:

Though human reason is, strictly speaking, truly capable by its own natural power and light of attaining to a true and certain knowledge of the one personal God, who watches over and controls the world by his providence, and of the natural law written in our hearts by the Creator; yet there are
