Session Background

Purpose

Objectives

Learners will

- understand that Jesus is our model for living our friendship with God the Father.
- > explore the meaning of covenant and God's covenant with his Chosen People
- ▶ understand the Ten Commandments and their meaning for our lives today.

Catechist Formation

Human beings were created to be in relationship. It is part of our nature. Because we were created by a God who is himself a community of Persons-and we are created for the expressed purpose of union with our Creator-how could it be otherwise? There is a natural inclination within each of us to be with others. When those relationships are defined by justice and love, they become what God intended them to be. When they are defined by selfishness and abuse, they become disordered. The Church offers us many sources of guidance and support to create relationships that are signs of God's love.

How do the relationships in your life help you to come to know God hetter?

Young Adolescents Learning Faith

- As they expand their relationships and social responsibilities, younger adolescents are beginning to grapple with the expectations of others, including the sometimes conflicting expectations of family members and peers. This session allows youth to reflect on the promises and commitments that they make. Guide them as they consider their priorities and their friendship with God.
- Because younger adolescents usually lack the perspective and experience that come from having lived through many personal crises, the stresses of life can seem immediate and insurmountable to them. Your sharing an adult perspective can alleviate their sense of being overwhelmed.

Facilitating the Session

- Ask for the group's attention, and begin with the Sign of the Cross.
- Light the candle. Have one participant read the prayer.
- We thank you, God our Father, for the gift of life! Send your Holy Spirit to help us to praise you, and have faith in the plan you have for each and every one of us. May the Spirit help us to be patient and to accept that you have called us all, not just by any name, but by our own names, to be your living images, to be like you. and to help others to know you. We pray this through Christ our Lord, Amen.

FACILITATE ACTIVITY Ball Toss 5 minutes

This activity illustrates how demands and expectations can weigh on us.

- Invite a volunteer to help with this activity.
- Ask the participants to name demands and expectations others have of them. Toss a new ball to the volunteer with each suggestion named. If he/she drops a ball, he/she has to try to pick it up without dropping the other balls, while trying to catch and hold on to the additional balls being tossed.
- After all the balls have been tossed, ask the participants what they noticed in the activity.
- Ask the volunteer how it felt to have the balls tossed so quickly while trying to hold on to them.
- Thank the volunteer, collect the balls, and continue with the next piece of the session.

EXTEND THE SESSION 10 minutes

Hot Potato Game

In this activity, all participants get an opportunity to experience a variety of demands at the same time.

- Divide participants into group of six to eight. Ask them to sit in a circle.
- Give each small group an object (like a tennis ball) that is easy to pass from person to person.
- Give these instructions:

When the music begins, pass the object from person to person until the music stops. If you are caught with the object when the music stops, you must stand and receive a consequence! Once the game resumes, each time the object is passed to you, you must stand and do your consequence before passing the object on to the next person.

- Start the music. Stop it and ask all who have the object to stand. Give this group a consequence (see list below).
- Continue to start and stop the music. The point is to get young people to experience having to follow through on a variety of demands at the same time.
- Consequences:

Name all the Gospels.

Do two jumping jacks.

Sing "Jesus Loves Me."

Stand up and spin around twice.

Say the names of all the sacraments you know.

(Add your own ideas!)

SHARE Share about the various demands you have in your lifewhere they come from and how you try to manage them. Let the participants know if you've ever felt like Darryl-being pulled in several directions. Ask for volunteers to respond to these WHAT ABOUT YOU? questions:

What do you do when you are torn in different directions? Where do you go to simply talk or get advice?



READ Read CONNECT and PURPOSE AND DIRECTION on PAGE 14. Invite three volunteers to each read a paragraph aloud from JESUS' **EXAMPLE** on PAGE 15.

FACILITATE FAITH WALK ACTIVITY Expectations 10 minutes

In this activity, participants will work in groups of three.

- Give each group a sheet of paper and a pen. Ask one person in each group to serve as the recorder.
- Have the recorders divide their sheet of paper into thirds, and label one section Family, another Friends, and the last, God.
- ▶ Read the FAITH WALK on PAGE 15 to the participants.
- Ask the small groups to brainstorm ideas for expectations they would give themselves with regard to their families. List those ideas under the Family heading. Allow 2 minutes.







FYI Distribute Resource 2: My Covenants.



- Next, ask the small groups to brainstorm ideas for expectations they would give themselves with regard to their friends. List those ideas under the Friends heading. Allow 2 minutes.
- Finally, ask the small groups to brainstorm ideas for expectations they would give themselves with regard to God. List those ideas under the God heading. Allow 2 minutes.
- Ask the recorders to share their group's responses with the large group.
- Ask: Which ideas are similar between the three different headings? What does that tell you?

PRESENT Talk about covenants, using the content from PAGES 16-17. Use these or similar words:

We all have people we count on and people who count on us. Usually we trust these relationships; sometimes we make promises to one another.

We can trust God because he is true to his promise to be with us and call us back, even when we disobey and stray from his love.

Adam and Eve sinned, but God did not abandon the human race. Through a series of covenants, God remained faithful and eventually saved the human race. A covenant is like a contract between two persons, but it is more serious and heartfelt than a legal contract. It is a sacred promise or agreement between God and humans involving mutual commitments.

God shows us over and over that he will remain faithful to the covenant, even when we fail.

FACILITATE ACTIVITY My Covenants 10 minutes

In this activity, participants will write their covenant with family, friends, and God.

Help the participants begin to write their covenants by asking: Think about how you can improve your relationship with your family, with friends, and with God,

Think about where you need God in your life.

Using Resource 2, invite the participants to use the answers to those questions as a start to writing their covenants.

SHARE Share about your own covenant relationship with God.

EXTEND THE SESSION 15 minutes

Called by Name

In this activity, participants consider God's surprising call by reflecting on the call of Samuel.

- Read CALLED BY NAME on PAGE 16.
- Form groups of three. In each group, one young person will be Samuel, one will be Eli, and one will play the role of God.

- ► Have each group read Samuel 3:1–10, with each person reading the parts for their assigned character. The youth who is Eli will also be the narrator, reading the parts that are not assigned to a character.
- ▶ Prepare ahead of time newsprint with the questions listed below. Post the newsprint for this activity and distribute 3 x 5 cards to youth. Ask young people to reflect and journal on these questions from the perspective of their character. Allow a few minutes for individual reflection.
 - · What was happening in this story?
 - What is your character feeling?
- For Samuel and Eli: What do you learn about God from this story?
 - · For God: What are you communicating about who you are in this story?
- Have participants discuss their responses within their groups.
- Ask for volunteers to respond to questions in the large group.
- Conclude by asking: What does this story tell us about what God is like? How does God reveal something about himself in this story?

READ Invite the participants to read silently the LAWS OF LOVE on PAGES 18-19.

FACILITATE FAITH WALK ACTIVITY Our Relationship with God 10 minutes

In this activity, participants will describe the Ten Commandments in "youth-friendly" language, applying the laws to their lives.

- Divide the participants into ten small groups, and assign one commandment to each small group. If your large group is less than 15, you may give each small group two commandments.
- Give each group a half-sheet of newsprint and a marker.
- Invite them to review the wording of their commandment on PAGE 19 and think how they might write it using more youthfriendly words-but still communicate the same message.

EXTEND THE SESSION 15 minutes

Digging Deeper into the Commandments

In this activity, the participants will examine a commandment in more detail, looking for examples from their lives.

- Using the same small groups from the previous activity, ask the participants to re-examine their commandment, and look for examples of how people their age can live that commandment today.
- For example, young adolescents may look at the Fifth Commandment and say, "No problem. I won't take anyone's


life or commit murder." But in the world of a young adolescent, what types of situations may fall under the Fifth Commandment? Read CHECK THIS OUT! on PAGE 18.

Invite the small groups to make a list of their ideas on newsprint and present to the large group.

READ Read what CATHOLICS BELIEVE on PAGE 19

Ask participants:

In addition to the Ten Commandments, what else do we have that helps us know right from wrong?



Encourage young people to reflect on the WHAT ABOUT IT? and WHAT ABOUT YOU? questions on their own. Remind the participants to share FAITH AT HOME using the suggestion on PAGE 20.

FACILITATE ACTIVITY How God Cares for Us 5 minutes

- Distribute a 3 x 5 index card and pen to each participant.
- Invite young people to think of one or two ways that God cares for them and to write those ideas on their cards.
- Let participants know that these will be shared in the closing prayer.

EXTEND THE SESSION 10 minutes

PEOPLE OF FAITH

Have the group read silently the story of Saint Marcella on PAGE 21.

Ask the participants:

How can someone be happy without many of the comforts we are accustomed to having? Saint Marcella was tortured because the Goths thought she had a treasure, lots of money. What "treasure" do you think Saint Marcella had? What "treasure" do you have?







Gather the participants in the prayer area. Invite them to place their 3 x 5 cards from the How God Cares for Us activity in the basket on the prayer table.

Gathering

Play or sing one of the suggested songs.

Reading

Invite a volunteer to proclaim Micah 6:8.

Response

Earlier, we wrote on a card one or two ways in which God cares for us. As I pass the basket around, please take a card. I invite you each to read what is written on the card. After every three people, we will say together: We thank you, God, for loving us.

Going Forth

Loving Father, we thank you for our time together learning more about how we can be your people, living and loving one another as you love us. May the Holy Spirit grant us the courage to stay strong as we try to do your will. We ask this in the name of Jesus, our brother and Savior, Amen.
