
Unit 2 Opener

USING ILLUSTRATIONS

Pictures help stimulate the religious imaginations of the children. The pictures on page 87 of the student book illustrate some of the important concepts in the unit.

- Invite the children to look at and think about the pictures.
- Have the children describe what each picture says to them.
- Invite the children to share a response to the concluding question and affirm all their appropriate responses.



Teaching Tip

Teaching Tip

Sensitivity to Diversity. The faith life of the families of the children in your group, more than likely, is quite diverse. Some families may participate in the liturgy and the life of the Church on a regular basis; others may participate mostly on special occasions, such as the Baptism of children and the marriage of family members. It is your responsibility to remind the children and their families of their obligation to take part in the celebration of Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation. Be aware of this diversity as you call for a sharing of the children's faith experiences. Try to provide clear clues that will help the children respond to the questions.

GETTING READY

The "Getting Ready" page helps the children share prior knowledge and it assists you in planning your lessons to meet the needs of the children.

What I Have Learned

This section asks the children to share something they already know about the liturgy and the sacraments of the Church. Read the faith terms to the children and ask volunteers to share ideas they know about each term.

Words to Know

This section is a quick assessment of the children's familiarity with some of the faith words they will be learning. At the end of the unit the children will be asked to once again share their understanding of the faith words.

The Church Celebrates All Year

Background

The Liturgical Year

The Church's year of worship, or liturgical year, is made up of Sundays, seasons, solemnities, feasts, and memorials. The seasons of the Church's year evolve in an annual cycle that celebrates Christ's birth, life, Passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension. In each celebration, as we retell the mysteries of our faith, the entire Christian story is evoked, and its fountain of grace is continually poured out for all ages.

Advent-Christmas

The liturgical year begins with the First Sunday of Advent. For four weeks the Church prepares for a renewed appreciation of the Incarnation and anticipates the Second Coming of Christ, The Advent season is filled with joyful expectancy and hope. Advent gives way to Christmas, a season running from the celebration of Christ's birth on December 25 through the Sunday after the feast of the Epiphany, During the Christmas season we focus on the timeless meaning of the Incarnation for believers.



Lent-Easter

Lent is a period of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving for all the faithful. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, it is a period of final preparation for those preparing to celebrate the Sacraments of Christian Initiation— Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist—at the Easter Vigil.

The weeks and days of Lent lead up to the celebration of the Easter Triduum and the Easter season. The Easter Triduum is a sacred period of three days, beginning with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, continuing with the celebration of the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday, climaxing with the Easter Vigil, and ending with the celebration of Vespers, or Fvening Prayer, on Easter Sunday.

Easter begins a season of fifty days when the Church rejoices in the Resurrection of Christ and in our hope of our own resurrection and life everlasting.

Ordinary Time

The remaining weeks of the liturgical year are named Ordinary Time. The weeks in Ordinary Time are designated by numbers such as the "Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time." The designation "Ordinary" is related to the English word ordinal as in ordinal number. During Ordinary Time we remember and listen to the teachings and work of lesus among us.

Catechist to Catechist

Celebrate the Year

The children see the changes in nature as we pass from winter to spring, from summer to fall. Each year they learn more and more about how to celebrate the various holidays associated with each season. This year you can help the children understand that the Church has seasons and that each season of the Church's year has signs that tell us about and help us understand that season. For example, explain to the children that the colors we use to decorate our churches and the songs we sing at Mass change from one season to another.

Classroom Celebrations

As you plan the year, be sure to incorporate into your sessions small celebrations for each of the seasons of the Church's year. You can do this by using the various liturgical year lessons beginning on page 235 in the children's book. The lessons include information, activities, and prayers that will help you, the children, and their families celebrate Advent, Christmas, Lent, the Triduum, and Easter.

The Church Teaches.

By sharing in the celebrations of the liturgical year we are made sharers in the saving work of Christ. At the Second Vatican Council, the Church taught: Holy Mother Church believes that it is for her to celebrate the saving work of her divine Spouse in a sacred commemoration on certain days throughout the course of the year. Once each week, on the day which she has called the Lord's Day, she keeps the memory of the Lord's resurrection. . . . In the course of the year, moreover, she unfolds the whole mystery of Christ. Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy 102

That is why Faith First puts so much

emphasis on the liturgical year through the seasonal lessons and celebrations.

Engage

PRAY

- · Gather the children for prayer.

DISCOVER

Purpose: To discover what the children may already know about the seasons of the Church's year

- · Ask the children to look at the picture and identify the four seasons of the year. Then have them tell one thing they like to do during each season.
- · Read the introductory paragraph and invite responses to the last question. Advent. Christmas, Lent. Easter. Ordinary Time.
- · If the children cannot name the seasons of the Church's year. affirm their efforts and tell them that they will learn about the seasons of the Church's year in this chapter.



Sacramentals. Sacramentals are sacred signs (blessings and objects) the Church gives us "for the sanctification of certain ministries of the Church, certain states of life, a great variety of circumstances of Christian life, and the use of many things helpful to [people]" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1668), Sacramentals are concrete objects and actions (blessings). It is always helpful for young children to see and touch the things that they are learning about, for example, a crucifix, an Advent wreath, a Nativity display. This week display in your prayer area a variety of sacramentals that are associated with the celebration of the liturgical seasons. Discuss each object and its use by the Church.

Jeach

FOCUS

Read the "Faith Focus" question aloud. Share with the children that in this chapter they will explore the seasons of the Church's year.

DISCOVER

- Share that each of the Church's seasons tells us something about Jesus.
- Present "The Seasons of the Church."
- Read "Advent" and have the children listen for what we celebrate during this season.

Apply

REINFORCE

- Point out the words Church's year and their meaning in "Faith Words." Have the children turn to page 295 in the Glossary, find the words, and write them in the space.
- Ask the children to recall that during Advent the Church gets ready for Christmas and we get our hearts ready for Jesus.

INTEGRATE

- Show the children a regular calendar. Ask who knows when the year starts. January. Point out that the Church's year starts four weeks before Christmas.
- Have the children complete the activity. Ask volunteers to tell about how they use an Advent wreath or Advent calendar at home or in their parish.

The Seasons of the Church

The different times of the Church's year are called its seasons. Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time are the seasons of the Church's year.

Each season of the Church's year tells us something about Jesus. All year long we remember God's love for us.

Advent

Advent is the first season of the Church's year. The Advent wreath reminds us to prepare for Christmas. We get our hearts ready for Jesus. The color for Advent is purple.



Teaching Tip

Christmas Traditions. After you present "Advent" you might share with the children this Irish Christmas tradition. Explain that on Christmas Eve people in Ireland put a candle in their window as a way to remember Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem. The candle is meant to light their way. Suggest that the children might start this tradition with their families

Christmas

Christmas comes after Advent. During the Christmas season we remember the birth of Jesus. Jesus is God's greatest gift to us. He is God's Son who came to live on earth with us.

The Church's celebration of Christmas is not just one day. The season of Christmas lasts about two or three weeks. We use the color white to celebrate Christmas.



Joseph

Saint Joseph was the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus. The angel told Joseph that Mary was going to have a baby. The angel also told Joseph to give the baby the name Jesus. The Church celebrates the feast day of Saint Joseph on March 19.



Background: Faith-Filled People

Saint Joseph. Joseph, husband of Mary and foster father of Jesus, was a descendent of King David. Though Scripture tells us little about Saint Joseph, he is described as a just man. We know that he was a carpenter, that he loved Jesus, and that he was a man of faith. He did what God asked of him. He left his home to care for Jesus and Mary. He followed the Jewish Law. We are told that he took his family to Jerusalem each year to celebrate Passover. Saint Joseph is the patron saint of fathers and workers. We celebrate two feast days in his honor: March 19, Joseph the Husband of Mary; and May 1, Joseph the Worker.

Teach

FOCUS

Remind the children that during Advent we prepare for the coming of Jesus. Share that they will now discover what we celebrate during the Christmas season.

DISCOVER

- Present the section "Christmas" in your own words.
- Ask: What do we celebrate at Christmas? The birth of Jesus.
- Point out that the Church uses the color white to celebrate Christmas.
- Read "Faith-Filled People." Ask the children to describe one new thing they learned. An angel spoke to Joseph as an angel spoke to Mary.
- Summarize by sharing with the children the Gospel account of the angel telling Joseph about the birth of Jesus (see Matthew 1:18–25).

Apply

REINFORCE

Gather around a crèche or have the children look at the picture on this page. Lead them in singing an appropriate Christmas hymn to help them recall that we celebrate the birth of Jesus during Christmas.

INTEGRATE

Have the children work in pairs to complete the activity on this page. Walk among the children and, if necessary, guide them in completing the activity.

Teach

FOCUS

Recall that Advent and Christmas are the first two seasons of the Church's year. Point out that the children will now learn about the other seasons of the Church's year.

DISCOVER

- · Invite the children to share what they think of when they hear the words Lent and Easter.
- · Read the text for "Lent." Have the children raise their hand when they hear what we celebrate during Lent. Then have them underline the sentence that tells the answer.
- · Repeat the process for "Easter" and "Ordinary Time."

REINFORCE

- · Write the names of the seasons of Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time on the board. Ask the children to name the color the Church uses to celebrate each of these three seasons. Lent, purple; Easter, white; Ordinary Time, green.
- · Point out the word Easter and its meaning in "Faith Words" on page 90. Have the children turn to page 296 of the Glossary, find the word, and write it in the space.

INTEGRATE

- · Point out the symbols on this page and help the children recall what these symbols remind us of.
- · Have the children complete the activity.



Background: Liturgy

Liturgical Colors. For each season and feast of the liturgical year, the priest wears corresponding colored vestments. The Church is also adorned in the colors of the feast and season. During Advent and Lent the colors violet or purple are worn. These colors represent expectation and penance. White or gold represents joy and is worn during Christmas and Easter. Green, a symbol of hope, is worn during Ordinary Time. During Holy Week, the liturgical color for Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion and Good Friday is red, which is also the liturgical color for Pentecost. White is the liturgical color for Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday.

Background: Liturgy

Celebrating the Lord's Day. The Bible tells us that God rested on the seventh day of creation. Christians rest on Sunday, the day of the Lord's Resurrection. The Resurrection is the first day of the new creation of all things in Christ. Catholics keep Sunday, the Lord's Day, holy by gathering and taking part in the celebration of Mass. We worship God and give him praise and thanksgiving for all his blessings. We also keep Sunday holy by setting aside time to remember and celebrate that our family is a blessing from God.

Connect

HIGHLIGHT

Point out that the Church family gives one day to the Lord each week

DISCOVER

- Present "Celebrating Sunday" by having the children point to the words Lord's Day.
- · Emphasize that Sunday is the Lord's Day. The Church gathers at Mass on Sunday to remember that lesus was raised from the dead.
- · Explain that Sunday is also a special family day. We spend time with our own families and time with our Church family.
- · Present "Our Catholic Faith." You might name the six holy days of obligation celebrated in the United States to begin to familiarize the children with these days, namely, Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God (January I); Ascension of the Lord (Thursday of the sixth week of Easter); Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 15); All Saints (November 1): Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary (December 8); Nativity of the Lord (December 25).

INTEGRATE

Invite volunteers to tell how their families celebrate Sunday and brainstorm new ways that they may celebrate Sunday in the future.

Connect

HIGHLIGHT

Remind the children that during the Church's year, we celebrate God's love with the other members of our Church family.

RESPOND

- · Review the seasons of the Church's year and write their names on the board.
- · Ask the children to point to the large candle on this page.
- · Explain the activity and have the children complete it.

CHOOSE

- · Present "My Faith Choice" by helping the children brainstorm ways to celebrate the current Church season. Have them write how they will celebrate it.
- · Encourage the children to put their faith choice into practice



Background: Doctrine

The Liturgical Year. "Through the yearly cycle [of the liturgical year] the Church unfolds the entire mystery of Christ and keeps the anniversaries of the saints" ("General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar," Roman Missal 1). "From the time of the Mosaic law, the People of God have observed fixed feasts, beginning with Passover, to commemorate the astonishing actions of the Savior God, to give him thanks for them, to perpetuate their remembrance, and to teach new generations to conform their conduct to them" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1164). The Church "recalling the mysteries of redemption . . . opens up to the faithful the riches of her Lord's powers and merits, so that these are in some way made present for all time" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy 102).

Teaching Tip
