








The Birth of Jesus






The Multiplication of the Loaves and Fish

More and more people began to follow Jesus to listen to His teaching and to see His miracles.

Once, while He was with a crowd in the desert, the Apostles told Him that it was getting late, and He should tell the people that they needed to go into the town to get themselves some food. Jesus told the Apostles that they should feed the people.



The Twelve told Him that all the food they had were five loaves of bread and two fish. They then brought Jesus the loaves and the fish, and He prayed over them. He gave thanks to the Father, and then He broke the bread and fish and had the Apostles give them to the people.

Many people were there that day, over five thousand. Yet, when the Apostles gave some bread and fish to each of them, everybody had enough to eat. In fact, when they were finished eating, they gathered whatever was left over and put it into some baskets. They collected twelve baskets of food.
