LESSON 5

Creation: Light, Water, Plants



Adult Faith Commentary

A fundamental truth of our Christian faith is that God created the world in order to show and tell us about divine goodness and love. (Cf. CCC 293)

We know that creation of the world and human beings did not happen by accident. God willed it sol. God wanted us! In fact, we are loved so much that we are invited to share in God's own divine love, wisdom, and goodness. (Cf. CCC 295)

God is revealed to us through creation. When we see the variety, beauty, and wonders of creation, when we study the order and harmony in our complex universe, we can only admire the greatness and beauty of God our Creator. (Cf. CCC 34) The sacred writer of the Book of Wisdom summarized God's revelation through creation over 2,100 years ago when he wrote: For from the greatness and beauty of created things comes a corresponding perception of their creator. (Wis 135)

Because everything in creation is good and thereby reflects some aspect of God's goodness and wisdom, it is only just and right that we should respect, cherish, and care for all of God's creation. (CE CCC 339)

God is good and God's love is forever. Let us give thanks! (Cf. Ps 136:1)

Helpful Teaching Notes

In this first lesson about creation the themes of *light, water*, and *plants* will be introduced. The second lesson will focus on the creation of *fish, birds, animals,* and *people.*

When teaching young children about God's marvelous creation, you will surely spark their natural sense of wonder and amazement. Using their key senses of seeing, hearing, touching, tasting, and smelling, as a means of discovery learning, the children should become increasingly aware of both the variety of God's creation and also the usefulness of God's gifts in their daily lives

Plan your lesson activities, whenever possible, to include live examples of flowers, trees, fruits, vegetables, animals, fish, and birds. Also, help the children think and talk about the many uses of water, plants, fish, and animals in their daily experience. Allowing them to experience God's gifts first-hand will not only delight young children, but also provide evidence of God's great love for them and lead them to a spirit of appreciation and thankfulness for all the good things that God has provided.

As the children's teacher, you not only have the opportunity to introduce them to our loving Creator, but also the responsibility to encourage them to take care of what God has provided for everyone's benefit and enjoyment. Teaching the children about caring for plants, animals, water resources, birds, fish — and especially each other — can stimulate and help nurture respect for all of God's creation.

Enjoy the children's wonder and awe as they discover more of God's wonderful world in your class and join you in offering joyful praise and thanksgiving to God in prayer, song, and positive actions.

✓ Note: A prayer celebration about creation could be held after the second creation lesson. A creation prayer celebration is included in our book Prayer Celebrations for Young Children available from Our Sunday Visitor.





4. God's Gift of Water:

Begin a discussion about God's gift of water by asking: When the sun makes us hot, what helps to cool us off? (*Water*.)


Next, review the various uses for water from the previous lesson, such as Baptism, washing, drinking, cooking, growing, and swimming.

5. Water for Plants and Flowers:

- Explain that the water God provides helps plants to grow. Ask the children to name some of the many kinds of plants God has given us. (Flowers, trees, bushes, grass, vegetables, fruits.)
- Invite one or more children to pour small amounts of water on the green plant(s).
- Invite everyone to take turns smelling the cut flowers in the vase.

6. Flannel-Board Story:

Read the flannel-board story "A Surprise for Peter," and follow up the story with the discussion questions provided on p. 66.



7. Creation Prayer:

Invite the children to gather around your prayer table and join you in a thank-you prayer about creation. Begin by teaching the children their response adapted from Psalm 1361: God is good. Let us give thanks!

Have the children practice this verse and then begin the following Creation Prayer adapted for children from the Genesis account in Scripture, using your flannelboard figures:

Teacher: "God made the sun to light up our days."
(Place sun, #21, on the flannel board.)

Children: "God is good. Let us give thanks!"

Teacher: "God made the moon and many stars to

shine at night."

(Place moon and stars, #34, on the flannel board.)

Children: "God is good. Let us give thanks!"
Teacher: "God made all kinds of plants to grow
on the land."

(Place flowers, #32, and tree, #22, on the flannel board.)

Children: "God is good. Let us give thanks!"

Teacher: "God sends rain clouds to water the land and help plants grow."

(Place cloud, #35, on the flannel board.)
Children: "God is good. Let us give thanks!"

Then end the prayer with the Sign of the Cross.

· Mix red food-coloring in water. Then place a stalk of celery in colored water to observe the gradual change in color of the celery leaves.

11. Creation Centerpiece:

The completed centerpiece will have eight facets, four of which are explained in this lesson. The other four will be completed in the next lesson (6). Each facet is labeled with a sentence indicating which creation picture the children should glue on it.

Begin by distributing p. 21 from the activity books and having the children cut out the sun, moon, star, flower, and tree. (If desired, the children could draw apples on the tree.)

Next, using small amounts of glue or a glue stick, instruct the children to glue the cut-out figures to the appropriate facets of the centerpiece on pp. 19-20. (If desired, gold glitter could be added to the sun.)

Lay the pages aside for drying and inform the children that they will be completing their centerpieces in the next lesson, which is also about creation.

Because everything in creation is good and thereby reflects some aspect of God's goodness and wisdom, it is only just and right that we should respect, cherish, and care for all of God's creation. (Cf. CCC 339)

Learning Objectives

- To increase the children's knowledge about the truth, purpose, and wonders of God's creation.
- . To increase the children's awareness of light, water, and plants as gifts from God.
- To help the children respond to God's gift of creation with a sense of wonder and appreciation through a story, discussion, and activities.
- To help the children express their thankfulness to God our Creator through Scripture, music, and prayer.

Faith Development at Home

Read the Take-Home Story to your child provided for this lesson and use the discussion questions that follow the story.

Children can use all of their senses to discover the variety, beauty, and usefulness of God's marvelous creation. Through God's gift of creation God's greatness and loving concern for us are revealed. Allowing children, for example, to experience God's gifts first-hand through a walk in nature will not only delight young children, but also provide visual evidence of God's great love in all that has been provided for us. As a follow-up activity, your child might also enjoy examining with you any plants or flowers that are in or around your home and then, under your supervision, watering them.

Ask your child to tell you about the creation centerpiece that he or she is working on in class. It will be completed after the next lesson on creation. As parents, you not only have the opportunity to introduce them to our loving Creator, but also the responsibility to encourage them to take care of what God has provided for everyone's benefit and enjoyment. Teaching the children about caring for plants, animals, water resources, birds, fish - and especially each other - can stimulate and help nurture respect for all of God's creation.
