The Holy Writings of God

Books tell stories of happiness and sadness. successes and failures. The Bible tells the story of God's love for his people and their response to his love. The Bible is God's own word to us. God speaks through the Bible. Sacred Scripture is another name for the Bible. It is a name that means "holy writings." The Holy Spirit inspired, or helped, the human writers of the Bible to faithfully and accurately communicate God's word. We call this truth of our faith the inspiration of the Bible.

The Bible is a collection of many writings. The Church divides the Bible

into the Old Testament and the New Testament. The word testament means "covenant." Guided by the Holy Spirit, the Church has identified the forty-six books of the Old Testament and the twenty-seven books of the New Testament to be the inspired word of God. We call this the canon of Scripture.



The Old Testament

The Old Testament tells the story of the Covenant that God entered into with humankind. The story of the Covenant begins at creation. It continues with the stories of Noah and Abraham and Moses and the prophets. The Old Testament of the Bible has four different kinds of books, or writings.

The Torah

The Torah is the first five books of the Old Testament. These five books are also known as the Pentateuch, a word meaning "five containers." The Pentateuch contains the Commandments and laws that help God's people live the Covenant.

The Historical Books

There are sixteen historical books. They tell about the struggle of the Israelites to live the Covenant faithfully.

The Wisdom Writings

There are seven wisdom writings. They teach practical ways to live God's Law.

The Prophetic Books


There are eighteen prophetic books in the Old Testament. These books contain the teachings of the prophets. The prophets were people God chose to speak in his name.

Faith-Filled People

Jerome

Saint Jerome (343–420) translated the Bible into Latin. Jerome's translation became known as the Vulgate Bible and was the standard Bible for the Roman Catholic Church for hundreds of years. Saint Jerome is honored as one of the four great Doctors of the Western Church. His feast day is September 30.

The New Testament

Jesus is the new and everlasting Covenant. The New Testament reveals that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, the Savior and Redeemer of the world. Jesus most fully reveals, more than anyone else did or will ever do, God and his love for us. We divide the New Testament into four parts.

The Gospels

The four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John are the heart of the New Testament. Each Gospel shares, in its own way, the story and meaning of Jesus' life, Passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension.

The Acts of the Apostles

The Acts of the Apostles is the story of how the Church began. It gives an account of the Apostles as they spread the good news of God's love and mercy revealed in Jesus Christ throughout the world.

The Letters

The twenty-one epistles, or letters, of Saint Paul the Apostle and other early Christian writers teach about Jesus and how Christians are to live.

The Book of Revelation

The Book of Revelation is the last book of the Bible. In it the Holy Spirit encourages Christians who are suffering to remain faithful to Jesus Christ.

Reverence for the Bible

The whole Christian life is strengthened by hearing and listening attentively and reverently to the word of God. Saint Ierome reminded us of the importance of the Bible in the life of Christians. He wrote, "Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ."

Before the printing press was invented in the sixteenth century, scribes copied the Bible by hand, Artists painted pages of the Bible with colors and decorated the edges of the pages with gold. Today the Bible is the most widely read book in the world.

Many Christian families have a family Bible. In it they write down the key events of their family's faith story. They record Baptisms, marriages, and other important milestones in the faith history of the family.

Your Catholic Identity At every celebration of the Eucharist, we read the word of God aloud. or proclaim it. We carry the Book of the Gospels with dignity in the procession and proclaim the


word of God from a place of honor. That place is called the ambo. This shows the faith of the Church in God's presence in his word.

When we gather with other members of the Church or as a family to read and listen to the Bible, Iesus is there. We listen and ask. What is God saving to us right now? How can the living word of God come alive in our lives today?

Lectionary and Book of the Gospels

At Mass on Sunday the first two readings are read from the Lectionary. The deacon or priest proclaims the Gospel from the Book of the Gospels.

The Holy Trinity

Jesus told his disciples, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). The Church follows that command today.

Every time the Church baptizes a person, we name the mystery of who God is. We baptize in the name of the one God who is the Holy Trinity. The mystery of the Holy Trinity is the deepest and central belief of the Christian faith. This is a truth about God we could have never known unless God revealed it.


The Old Testament

In the Old Testament we read the beginning of the story of God's revelation of himself. This story is filled with people of faith.

God first revealed himself at creation to Adam and Eve. God made an everlasting covenant with Noah and with all living beings. Years later God came to Abraham and Sarah and revealed that he alone is God. Abraham came to believe in and trust in one God. His descendants, the Israelites, shared their faith in the one true God through many generations.

The Nicene Creed

Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, two early councils of the Church taught about this great mystery of the Holy Trinity. These were the Council of Nicaea in A.D. 325 and the Council of Constantinople in A.D. 381. The Nicene Creed, which we profess at Mass, comes from these two councils.

Legend of Saint Augustine

Many Christians have tried to understand the mystery of the Holy Trinity. You may remember reading about Saint Augustine in chapter 1. There is a famous legend about him and his efforts to learn more about God

Augustine watched as the boy kept pouring the water, one bucket at a time, into a hole he had dug in the sand.

Augustine became very curious and asked, "Why do you keep pouring water into the hole?" The boy answered, "Isn't it plain to see? I'm putting this ocean in the hole.




