Let the Children Come to Me

Nurturing Our Children

Adults can more easily adjust to change, but children rely on routine to know what to expect at a certain time, such as when to eat, sleep, bathe and have fun. Routine provides kids with a sense of security. By making religion class part of your child's routine, you can help them adjust to this new situation. Be sure to talk with them about what they did in class this week and remind them when they will be going back to class again. Predict for them that they will read stories, sing songs and have fun with new friends while they learn about Jesus and God's love for them.


Invite your child to pray this or a similar prayer with you after you read this week's Bible story.






My Favorite Things
