The Holy Writings of God

Books tell stories of happiness and sadness, successes and failures. The Bible tells the story of God's love for his people and their response to his love. The Bible is God's own word to us. He speaks through the Bible.

Sacred Scripture is another name for the Bible. It is a name that means "holy writings."

And for this reason we too give thanks to God unceasingly, that, in receiving the word of God from hearing us, you received not a human word but, as it truly is, the word of God, which is now at work in you who believe.

THESSALONIANS 2:13



The Bible is really more than one book. It is a collection of many books. Some of the books in the Bible tell wonderful stories, such as the story of Moses. Others are history. There are also songs and poetry. But while there are different types of writings in the Bible, they all, in their own way, tell the story of God's leve for which is really a story of the story of God's



The Old Testament has four different kinds of books, or writings. They are the Torah, the historical books, the wisdom books, and the prophetic books.

The Torah

The Torah, also known as the Pentateuch, contains the Ten Commandments and other laws and teachings that guide God's people to live the Covenant. The five books of the Old Testament that make up the Torah are Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy.

The Historical Books

The sixteen historical books are Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings, 1 and 2 Chronicles. Ezra, Nehemiah, Tobit, Judith, and 1 Maccabees and 2 Maccabees. In these books of the Old Testament, we hear stories about how the Israelites lived the Covenant both successfully and unsuccessfully.

The historical books also reveal that God always remained faithful to his people. He always forgave his people and gave them another chance to live the Covenant faithfully.

The Wisdom Books

The seven wisdom books of the Old Testament are Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, Wisdom, and Sirach (Ecclessiasticus). These writings teach us practical ways to live God's Law.

They include short sayings and longer stories.

The Prophetic Books

God chose certain members of his people to speak in his name. These people are called prophets. There are eighteen prophetic books in the Old Testament. These books contain the teachings of the prophets. The prophetic books in the Old Testament are Isaiah. Ieremiah, Lamentations, Baruch, Ezekiel, Daniel, Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Naham, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.

When God's people, the Israelites, turned away from the Covenant, God called them back through the prophets. When hardship and exile discouraged his people, God sent prophets to help them live with faith and hope. Through the prophets, God gave his people hope that his promises to them would come true. Again and again, God spoke through his prophets and promised to send his people a savior.

Faith-Filled People

Jerome

Saint Jerome (343-420) translated the Bible into Latin. Jerome's translation became known as the Vulgate Bible and was the standard Bible for the Roman Catholic Church for hundreds of years. Saint Jerome is honored as one of the four great Doctors of the Western Church, His feast day is September 30.

The New Testament

Jesus Christ is the new and everlasting Covenant. The New Testament reveals who Jesus is and the meaning of his work on earth. It includes the four Gospels, the Acts of the Apostles, the letters of Saint Paul the Apostle and other early Church writers, and the Book of Revelation.

The Four Gospels

The heart of the New Testament is the four Gospels. The word gospel means "good news." Each of the four accounts of the Gospel shares the events and meaning of Jesus' life, Passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension. Each of the four Gospels in its own way teaches that:

- Jesus fulfills all the promises of the Old Testament.
- Jesus calls people to discipleship.
- Jesus is the Savior of all people.

 Lesus analysis us to live
- Jesus enables us to live with God forever.

Saint John sums up why his and the other Gospels were written. We read:

But these are written that you may [come to] believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name. John 20:31

Acts of the Apostles

In the Acts of the Apostles, which was written by Saint Luke, we learn about life in the early

Church. We travel with the Apostles throughout the world. We listen and learn as they spread the Gospel of God's love and mercy revealed in Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world.

The Epistles and Other Letters

The New Testament also contains the epistles, or letters, of Saint Paul the Apostle and other early Church writers. These twenty-one letters teach about Jesus and how Christians are to live. By reading and listening to these letters, we go back to the beginning of the Church. We learn who we are and how to live as disciples of Jesus.

Book of Revelation

The Book of Revelation is the last book of the Bible. It was written to encourage Christians who were suffering to remain faithful to Iesus Christ.

Iesus is the fullness of Divine Revelation. In Jesus. who is true God and true man. God most fully makes himself known. Jesus most fully reveals, more than anyone else did or will ever do. God and his love for us.

Reverence for the Bible

The whole Christian life is strengthened by hearing and listening attentively and reverently to the word of God. Saint Jerome reminded us of the importance of the Bible in the life of Christians. He wrote, "Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ."

Before the printing press was invented in the sixteenth century, scribes copied the Bible by hand. Artists painted pages of the Bible with colors and decorated the edges of the pages with gold.

Priest holding the Book of the Gospels The Bible is the most widely read book in the world. Many Christian families have a family Bible. In it they write the key events of their family's faith story. They record Baptisms, marriages, and other important milestones in the faith history of their family.

At every celebration of the Eucharist, we read the word of God aloud, or proclaim it. We carry the Book of the Gospels with dignity in procession and proclaim the word of God from a place of honor. That place is called the ambo. This shows the faith of the Church in God's presence in his word.

When we gather with other members of the Church or as a family to read and listen to the Bible, Jesus is there. We listen and ask, What is God saying to us right now? How can the living word of God come alive in our hearts today?





The Holy Trinity

The mystery of the Holy Trinity is the deepest and central belief of the Christian faith. The Holy Trinity is the mystery of one God in three divine Persons—God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. This is a truth about God we never could have known unless he revealed it.

Throughout his life on earth Jesus, the Son of God, taught about God the Father and God the Holy Spirit. Just before he

ascended to his Father, the Risen Jesus met the eleven disciples on a mountain in Galilee. He said to them:

"Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit."

MATTHEW 28:19-20

Every time the Church baptizes a person, we name the mystery of who God is. We baptize the person in the name of the one God who is the Holy Trinity.

The Old Testament

In the Old Testament we read the beginning of the story of God's revelation of himself. This story is filled with people of faith.

God first revealed himself at creation to Adam and Eve. Then God made an everlasting Covenant with Noah and with all living things.

Years later God revealed himself to Abraham and Sarah. They lived in a land and at a time when people believed in many gods. God revealed to Abraham and Sarah that he alone is God. He invited Abraham and

Sarah to put their faith and trust in him alone. God asked Abraham to leave his homeland. He said:

"Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk house to a land that I will show you."

Abraham came to believe in God and trust in his plan for him. The descendants of Abraham were called Israelites. They kept faith in the one true God and shared that faith with others.



John de Matha Saint John de Matha founded the Trinitarians. The prayer and work of the Order of the Most Holy Trinity (Trinitarians) and the Sisters of the Order of the Most Holy Trinity proclaim the mystery of the love of the Holy Trinity for humankind. Saint John de Matha's feast

day is February 8.

Mary, the Mother of Jesus

Many centuries after he revealed himself to Abraham, God invited the Virgin Mary to place her faith and trust in him. In the Gospel of Luke we read:

[T]he angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David. and the virgin's name was Mary. . . . Then the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid. Mary, for you have found favor with God. Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son. and you shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High. . . . The holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow vou. Therefore the child to be born will be called holy. the Son of God."

LUKE 1:26-27, 30-32, 35

This event is known as the **Annunciation**. It gives us a glimpse into the mystery of the Trinity.

God chose the Blessed Virgin Mary to be the Mother of Jesus, the Son of God and the Savior whom he promised to send. So special is the Virgin Mary's role in God's plan that she was free from all sin from the very first moment of her conception, or existence, and throughout her whole life. We call this Mary's Immaculate Conception.

Jesus Christ

Throughout his life on earth, Jesus, the Son of God, spoke clearly of the Father and the Holy Spirit. On one occasion Saint Philip the Apostle said to Jesus:

"Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us." JOHN 14:8

Listen carefully to Jesus' answer.

"Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me, Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father."

JOHN 14:9

Later in his conversation with Saint Philip and the


other disciples, Jesus went on to say:

"I have told you this while I am with you. The Advocate, the holy Spirit that the Father will send in my name—he will teach you everything and remind you of all that [I] told you." John 14:25-26

Jesus was speaking of one God, who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Many years after the return of Jesus to his Father in heaven, the Church named this central mystery of faith the Holy Trinity.

The Creeds of the Church

The Holy Spirit, as Jesus promised, has always helped the Church believe in and explain her faith in the mystery of one God, who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit two early councils of the Church taught about the mystery of the Holy Trinity. These were the Council of Nicaea in A.D. 325 and the Council of Constantinople in A.D. 381.

The Nicene Creed, which we profess at Mass, comes from these two councils of the Church. The creeds of the Church are official statements and summaries of the faith of the Church. The two main creeds of the Church are the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. We profess faith in the Holy Trinity when we pray the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed.

Praying the creeds of the Church connects us with all the other faithful Christians, past and present. With the Church we continue to hear God's invitation to believe in him who is one God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

We can never fully understand the mystery of the Holy Trinity. But the Holy Spirit helps us grow in understanding this mystery of faith little by little throughout our life on earth.



Legend of Saint Augustine

Many Christians have tried to understand the mystery of the Holy Trinity. You may remember reading about Saint Augustine in chapter 1. There is a famous legend about him and his efforts to learn more about God.

One day Augustine was walking on the beach. The vast ocean inspired him to think about God. As he was walking along, he met a young boy who was taking water from the sea with a small bucket. Augustine

watched as the boy kept pouring the water, one bucket at a time, into a hole he had dug in the sand.

Augustine became very curious and asked, "Why do you keep pouring water into the hole?" The boy answered, "Isn't it plain to see? I'm putting this ocean in the hole."

Augustine began to laugh. "That's impossible," he told the boy. "The great sea is way too large for that small hole." With loving eyes, the boy looked up and said, "And God is too big for your little mind." Suddenly, the boy disappeared.

Little by little with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we can come to know the mystery of God the Holy Trinity in whose image we have been created.
