Invitation to Faith

CHAPTER BACKGROUND

He [Abraham] did not doubt God's promise in unbelief; rather, he was empowered by faith and gave glory to God and was fully convinced that what he had promised he was also able to do.

Romans 4:20-21

The Gift of Faith

Abraham's story vividly describes how one person walked a journey of deep faith. Imagine the faith it took for Abraham to go willingly to a strange land when God called him to do so. Abraham believed God's promise that Sarah would bear a son, even though both Abraham and Sarah were quite old. When God asked Abraham to sacrifice Isaac, Abraham was determined to do it until God blessed him for his faith by sparing Isaac.

The kind of faith shown in Abraham's life is a gift. The same gift of faith is offered to all people. The truly extraordinary part of Abraham's story is his perseverance in his faith in God even in the worst circumstances. Faith also involves freedom. You are always free to accept or reject the gift of faith that God offers you.

The Prayer of Faith

One response to accepting the gift of faith is prayer—honest and loving communication with God. Abraham's first words of prayer are a reminder to God of his promises. As it did with Abraham, faith brings you to prayer and prayer brings you to faith. People of faith become more intimate with God through prayer. Often the most fervent prayers emerge from situations that test a person's faith.

TEACHING CHAPTER 4

Stories of Faith

Learning that faith can guide a person is important for sixth graders. During this preadolescent age, it is helpful for these young people to see and hear stories of how faith has guided others in their life journeys and choices.

Biblical stories of men and women of faith embarking on difficult journeys, uncertain of their final destination, will provide students with comfort and vision and will offer concrete models for their own lives. Students may think the world of the Bible so distant as to be irrelevant. Students need to see that contemporary people of faith have also navigated times of change and transition.

- Share your own faith journey with students.
- Invite a group of older teens from your school to participate in a panel discussion about their faith journeys.
- Give students opportunities in class to ask questions relating to a journey of faith

and prayer.

Focus Who is Abraham?

The risks involved in a journey are not so scary if you know that God is with you. Abram and Sarai learned that God was with them always. They remained faithful to God, and God blessed them.

Abram's Call

Abram and Sarai were getting old and had no children. One day God said to Abram, "Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your father's house to a land that I will show you. I will make you a great nation, and I will bless you."

As God directed, Abram and Sarai took all of their possessions and set out for the land of Canaan. After traveling through the land



SCRIPTURE BACKGROUND

Ur and Haran Abram and Sarai left Ur (in what is now Irag), traveling along the Fertile Crescent of the ancient world to the land of Canaan (in what is now Israel).

- . They journeyed through Haran, Shechem, and Hebron to the Negev desert area.
- . They traveled with a large number of followers, flocks, and herds. They did occasional trading.

The Journey Continues

God appeared again to Abram and told him that his descendants would be as numerous as the stars in the sky and that they would have a land of their own. Although he had no children. Abram put his faith in God. God changed Abram's name to Abraham and Sarai's name to Sarah as a sign of the covenant.

One day three men visited Abraham and Sarah. The couple quickly prepared a meal for their guests. The men told Abraham that Sarah would have a son, as God had promised. Sarah was listening and laughed to herself because she was too old to have children. But within a year Sarah did give birth to a son and named him Isaac, which means "one who laughs."

Ask students to read The Journey Continues silently.

- How did God keep his promise to Abraham and Sarah? Have students answer the question on page 79.

- · Have students work individually to unscramble the words.
- Have students work in pairs to find examples of how Abraham and Sarah showed each quality, faith; believing in God's call; hope: trusting God's promise; love: devoting their future to God

Remind students that God called Abram and promised great blessings in return for Abram's obedience. Abram's faith prompted him to set out on his journey.

God's Plan of Salvation

Focus What does it mean to have faith?

The faith journey that began with Abraham continued with his son Isaac and Isaac's son Jacob. It is from Jacob that the nation of Israel would take its name.

The Book of Genesis

The Story of Joseph

in the Book of Genesis, Jacob was renamed Israel after wrestling with an angel. The name means "one who struggles with God."

Jacob became the father of twelve sons, but Joseph was his favorite. Joseph's brothers were jealous of him and plotted to get rid of him. They sold him to a caravan of travelers, and Joseph became a slave. Because he could interpret dreams, Joseph saved Egypt from starvation during a great famine. Joseph's brothers arrived in Egypt to buy food and were united with Joseph, who invited them to settle there.

Catholic Social Teaching: Rights and Responsibilities



The Hand of God God sometimes uses events that are frustrating or tragic on the human level to reveal his plan of salvation. Joseph sees this in his own life.

• In Genesis 45:1-8 Joseph forgives his brothers for selling him into slavery. He tells them not to be upset because of their deeds, for God used their actions to make Joseph the ruler of Egypt and enable him to save the country and his family from famine.



As seen through the faith stories of Abraham, Sarah, and their descendants, God keeps his promise of salvation.

You encounter God today through the Bible, the sacraments, and the Church. God's Son, Jesus, is the way of salvation for you. The Holy Spirit, whom Jesus sent, will help you on your faith journey. Wherever you go, God the Father is with you.

God invites you to respond to him in the same way that Abraham and Sarah did-with faith. This means that you freely choose to believe in God and all that God has revealed. When you respond to God with faith, you offer your heart and mind to him. You begin your own journey of faith, as Abraham and Sarah did. You have faith that God will guide you and keep his promises to you.

Faith and Prayer

God still speaks to people today, and people can communicate with God. This is done through prayer, Prayer begins and ends with listening to God. You can strengthen your faith with prayer, using one of these forms: blessing and adoration, petition for your own needs, intercession (praying for the needs of others), thanksgiving, or praise. You can take time to pray at any time throughout the day.


