The foundation of the Christian life is formed by the unity of the three Sacraments of Initiation Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist (CCC 1212). Catechists must stress to their students that "Confirmation is necessary for the completion of baptismal grace" (CCC 1285).

What the Prophets of the Old Testament foretold regarding the Messiah who would be anointed with the Spirit of God, and what Jesus the promised Messiah fulfilled in receiving the Holy Spirit at his baptism by John, comes to fruition also in the believer through the Sacrament of Confirmation. This forge of grace in which the work of Baptism is fully sealed by the fire of the Holy Spirit was passed on through the Church by the

Apostles and their successors, the bishops, down to the present day. Just as Christ's life and mission were always fully consecrated to the Holy Spirit, so now in Confirmation is the believer fully consecrated to the Holy Spirit to make him manifest in the Church and in the world. (CCC 1286-1289)

The anointing with sacred chrism which takes place in Confirmation is pregnant with symbolism which reveals the mystery of grace taking place. For millennia, anointing with oil has accomplished and evoked many

things: "...oil is a sign of abundance and joy; it cleanses...limbers...s a sign of healing...and it makes radiant with beauty, health, and strength" (CCC 1293). These are visible in the anointing found in Baptism and Confirmation, highlighting the unity of these two Sacraments.

Just as the Apostles experienced the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, so does the confirmand receive the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in Confirmation. A deeper unity is established with Christ and his Church, endowing one with the gifts of the Holy Spirit and indelibly marking the soul with the seal of the Holy Spirit. The confirmand is fortified with strength and zeal. In this way, the common priesthood of the faithful in Christ begun in Baptism is brought to completion, thus equipping one to be an authentic witness of Christ in word and action (CCC 1302-1305).

How the Sacrament is Celebrated

In the Latin Church, Confirmation is normally administered by a bishop, and like Baptism it is re-

ceived only once. When celebrated separately from Baptism as it normally is in the Latin Church, the Confirmation liturgy begins with a renewal of Baptismal promises to stress the unity of Confirmation and Baptism. Later, the bishop anoints each person with sacred chrism on the forehead, saying, "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit", (CCC 1300, 1304)

All baptized Catholics should receive Confirmation. The confirmand should first receive the Sacrament of Penance in order to be

in the state of grace, and should further prepare by intense prayer. The confirmand also should have a sponsor who will help them spiritually to prepare, and to persevere in the grace of this Sacrament afterwards. A baptismal Godparent is an excellent choice given the connection of Baptism and Confirmation (CCC 130).

Restored Order Background

There is a great deal of variation from diocese to diocese for the age of confirmation in the United States. The Sacrament of Confirmation can be celebrated at any time between the age of discretion and sixteen years. It has been determined that a single catechesis cannot be assigned for this sacrament.

In the early Church, Christian Initiation was one event. Adults or children were baptized, anointed, or had hands laid upon them, and then participated in the Eucharist, all at the same celebration. For a variety of reasons this practice aradually became separated into three different events. In 1910, Pius X recommended in his encyclical Quam Singulari that the First Communion of children

should not be deferred too long after they had reached the age of reason. Previous to his urging, children who had been baptized as infants usually celebrated First Communion in the early teen years, and Confirmation usually was celebrated at an earlier age. However, once children began to participate fully in the Eucharist at an earlier age, the age for Confirmation was varied and not necessarily tied to reception of First Communion.

The Second Vatican Council called for the restoration of the Catechumenate and the revision of all the sacramental rituals. When the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, which also includes children of catechetical age, was issued, it restored the order of the Sacraments of Initiation

As a result, many dioceses and parishes throughout the United States have adopted the practice of celebrating Confirmation prior to First Communion. This is often referred to as Restored Order.

Some of these dioceses celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation at the same Eucharistic celebration in which children celebrate their First Communion.

Other dioceses celebrate at a different time, but before First Communion.

Other dioceses choose to celebrate Confirmation sometime after First Communion. All of these practices are approved by the United States Bishops Conference, which has given approval to the celebration of Confirmation for children baptized as infants anytime between the ages of seven and sixteen.

Call to Celebrate: Eucharist includes two sessions for those parishes that

Catechist Orientation

Goals

- To welcome catechists in a hospitable environment
- . To affirm the important role of the catechist
- . To reflect on the catechists: experience of Confirmation
- . To inform the catechists about Call to Celebrate: Fucharist with emphasis on the Confirmation (Restored Order) sessions: . the philosophy of the
 - program
 - · the content

Welcome and Opening Prayer (30 minutes)

Welcome the catechists and distribute nametags.

Begin the session with welcoming words and introduce yourself.

Have the catechists introduce themselves to one another.

Review the goals and agenda for the gathering.

Gather the group around the prayer setting.

Begin the prayer by singing or listening to "We Are Marching," Songs of Celebration CD, track 2.

Light the candle and lead the catechists in the following reflection. Pause after each question.

- · Recall your own Confirmation day.
- · Where was it? Who was there?
- · Can you recall any significant things that happened that day?
- · Do you remember any feelings you may have had during the ceremony?
- · How were you prepared for the event?

Invite catechists to share any significant memories they may have of their own Confirmation.

Read John 14:15-26.

Allow silent reflection.

Materials

- Beverages and light refreshments
- Nametags
- · Copies of Call to Celebrate: Eucharist Child's Book
- Copies of Call to Celebrate: **Eucharist Catechist Edition**
- Songs of Celebration CD
- · A prayer table covered in a white cloth with a candle and a Bible on a stand, a clear glass bowl with water, and a branch or other instrument for sprinkling
- Matches or lighter

Pause and then discuss the question:

· How do you want the children you will be catechizing to hear the message of this Gospel?

Close with a blessing. Ask the catechists to stand, and extend your hands over them as you say:

Lord God, in your loving kindness strengthen and direct these catechists. Let your Spirit uphold them as they prepare to share their time and talent with your children. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Program Overview (15 minutes)

Distribute copies of the Catechist Guide, Child's Book, Sonas of Celebration CD, and the Family Guide for Call to Celebrate: Eucharist.

Explain what each is for and have catechists page through them.

Discuss any questions the catechists may have about the Restored Order of Confirmation. Refer catechists to p. ix of the Catechist Edition.

Scope and Sequence

Invite catechists to turn to the Table of Contents on p. iii of the Catechist Edition. Point out the articles in the front pages and the Catholic Source Book and Program Resources in the back pages.

Note the two sessions devoted to Confirmation are in the Catechist Edition

Point out that the Confirmation lessons follow Chapter 1. If you have a different schedule for these sessions, let the catechists know that,

Turn to the Scope and Sequence section on pp. vi-vii. Explain that a scope and sequence gives the overview of the content for each chapter. Note each of the features in the left column and go through one chapter column to explain the format. Go through the Ritual Focus row and show that the flow of the chapters is based on the Order of the Mass.

Note that the Confirmation sessions are based on the Rite of Confirmation.

Lesson Overview (30 minutes)

Child's Book

Use Session 1 of the Confirmation chapter, "Gifts of the Spirit," (pp. CE23–33) to show the three-step process of a session:

Celebrate

· celebration and reflection

Remember

- proclamation and breaking open the Bible reading
- · teaching the doctrine
- learning about the ritual action of the sacrament

Live

making connections to their lives and their families

Point out the Faith at Home boxes in the Remember section and the Signs of Faith feature on the Celebrate and Remember pages.

Catechist Edition

Use Chapter 4 of the Catechist Edition as a guide.

Familiarize catechists with the background and resources in the left-hand column on p. 32A.

Encourage them to read and reflect on the essay in the main column as they are planning their lessons. Note the reflection questions and Catechist Prayer.

Review the planner on p. 32B. Note the materials needed for each lesson, and have catechists turn to the pages noted to find the Activity Master CE9 and the Echo Pantomime CE10. Go through the Echo Pantomime with the catechists, and show the variety of Scripture Resources.

Go to pp. 32–41. Alert catechists that the side wrap gives a step-by-step lesson plan for the Child's Book pages, and the bottom boxes give them additional background, activities, and tips. Have them page through the lesson, and ask for any questions.

Turn to the Catholic Source Book, pp. 82–105. Have catechists page through it and notice the additional activities provided in the wrap.

Break for refreshments and conversation.

Administrative Details (10 minutes)

Elicit any questions the catechists have about the components and resources.

Allow time for administrative details, such as calendars and class lists.

Remind them of the next session, which will be catechist training on liturgical catechesis. This is the method they will be using throughout the program.

Ask them to read pp. iv—xv before the training session.

Closing Prayer (10 minutes)

Gather the catechists in a circle around the prayer space.

Sing "We Are Marching," *Songs of Celebration* CD, track 2.

Make the Sign of the Cross and say:

Let us call to mind the goodness of God who gives us all good things. I bless you with this water to remind you of the gift of your Baptism and your call to hand on the faith. (Sprinkle the group with water.) Let us join in the prayerthat Jesus has taught us.

Pray the Lord's Prayer together.

Thank catechists for their attendance.

Catechist Training

Goals

- To introduce the method of liturgical catechesis
- To present the underlying meaning of the Sacrament of Eucharist
- To show how to design a prayer space and lead prayer
- To explain sacraments as actions of a faith community

Advance Preparation

Familiarize yourself with the ritual action in the opening prayer.

Select three persons to carry the holy water, candle, and Bible in procession.

Rehearse the suggested song, "Yes Lord, I Believe," Songs of Celebration CD, track 7.

Opening Prayer Service and

Reflection (20 minutes)

Sing together, "Yes Lord, I Believe," *Songs of Celebration* CD, track 7.

As you sing, walk forward slowly. Follow the people carrying the holy water, candle, and Bible.

Lead the opening prayer.

Leader: Let us begin. God, our loving Father, we are gathered here in your presence. We belong to you. Send us your Holy Spirit to help us live as disciples of your Son, Jesus. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

All: Alled.

Leader: On the day of our Baptism, we were claimed for Christ. By water and the Holy Spirit we received the gifts of faith and new life. On that day the faithful remembered their baptismal promises.

Today let us once again remember those promises together. Please come

Read John 15:1–12.

The Gospel of the Lord.

All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Leader: Consider these questions for reflection and discussion: What image or phrase

is important for you in this reading? What do Jesus' words "Remain in me as I remain in you" mean for you today?

When the discussion is finished, continue the prayer.

Let us stand and pray as Jesus taught us. Pray the Lord's Prayer together.

Let us offer each other the Sign of Peace.

Reflection on Prayer (20 minutes)

If there are a large number of catechists, organize them into smaller groups of 5 to 6 participants.

Invite catechists to recall the ritual moments of the celebration. Do a guided meditation using prompts from the celebration. Pause after each prompt.

Pause for a few minutes of silence. Then invite the groups to share their feelings about the celebration in their small group. Encourage them to stay with their feelings. After 5 to 7 minutes, invite sharing with the lar

Naming (20 minutes)

Ask the participants to name what they learned about God, Jesus, the Church, or their own Christian life from the celebration.

Take each category separately and list their responses on the board or on chart paper. Use phrases from their lists to summarize what they have said about faith, sacrifice, and service. Comment on how much "content" they came up with.

Distribute the article, "What Is Liturgical Catechesis?" Summarize the main parts of the article, and explain that this is the model of catechesis upon

which Call to Celebrate is based. Encourage catechists to read the article at a later time.

Rotation and Break (5 minutes)

Setting up a Prayer Space and Leading Prayer (30 minutes)

Gather catechists around the prayer space and pass out "How to Lead Prayer." Describe how you set up the space. Give catechists ideas on setting up a prayer space in their meeting place. Note where and how they can obtain materials for the space, and emphasize the importance of a prayer environment.

Distribute the article, "Role of the Prayer Leader," and summarize it with the catechists. Practice leading the procession and prayer gestures with them.

Rotation and Break (5 minutes)

A Theology of Sacrament and Eucharist (30 minutes)

Play Part 3 of the *Eucharist Stories of Celebration* video. After catechists have viewed the video, use the questions in the guide for discussion.

Summarize these important points:

- Sacraments are actions of God and a faith community.
- In the Eucharist, we share in a meal during which we are fed with the Body and Blood of Iesus.
- The Eucharist is the community's great prayer of thanksgiving.

Distribute the articles, "What Is a Sacrament?" "Eucharist," and "Confirmation." Encourage catechists to read the articles later.

Closing Blessing (5 minutes)

Thank the catechists for attending the session.

Extend your hands over the catechists and pray in these or similar words:

God, the Father of mercies, has sent his Son into the world. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, may you continue to be transformed into the Body of Christ and witness his love in the world. Amen.

Parent Orientation

Goals

- To welcome parents and families in a hospitable environment
- To affirm the importance of parental and family participation in the process
- To inform parents and families about the Call to Celebrate: Eucharist program with the Confirmation component for Restored Order
- To inform parents and families about the parish policies and procedures relating to the celebration of Confirmation and First Communion

Environment

- · Clearly identify the meeting place, posting clear directions if necessary
- · Arrange tables and chairs for small
- Set up a prayer space with a large candle, a Bible on a stand, a clear bowl filled with water, and a branch or other instrument for sprinkling

Welcome and Opening Prayer

Welcome parents and other adults and distribute nametags.

Introduce yourself and briefly review the goals and agenda for the gathering.

Gather the group around the prayer space, or have them pause for a reflective moment.

Begin the prayer by singing or listening to "Yes Lord, I Believe!" from the Songs of Celebration CD, track 7.

Light the candle and lead parents in the following reflection. Pause after each question:

- · Recall your own Confirmation day.
- · Recall significant things that happened that day or during your preparation.

Invite parents and family members to share with one or two other persons in the group any significant memories they have of their own First Communion. Distribute Parent Orientation Restored Order Handout 1.

Call the group back together and lead the parents and family members in the Parent's Prayer.

View Video

Show Parts 1 and 2 of the Eucharist Stories of Celebration video. Use the questions in the video quide for discussion.

Discuss Restored Order

Use the "Restored Order" article to highlight the important points of celebrating Confirmation before or with the reception of First Holy Communion.

Make the point that there are three Sacraments of Initiation, and full participation in the Eucharist is the fullness of initiation.

Break for refreshments and conversation.

The Call to Celebrate: Eucharist Program

Distribute the Child's Book and the reproducible child pages from the Catechist Edition, pp. CE25-33 and pp. CE36-44. Lead the parents and family members through the Table of Contents.

Point out that the program:

· introduces the child to an understanding of the Sacrament of Confirmation and the Eucharist.

- is a preparation for a lifetime of celebrating the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the gift of Jesus in the Eucharist.
- introduces children to both the Sacrament of Confirmation and the Sacrament of the Eucharist through rituals and prayers.

Use one chapter of the reproduced pages or the *Child's Book* to show parents and family members the process of a session:

Celebrate

celebration and reflection

Remember

- proclamation and breaking open the Scripture reading
- · teaching the doctrine
- learning about the ritual action of the sacrament

Live

making connections to their lives and their families

Highlight the three Faith at Home features in the reproduced pages and the *Child's Book*.

Emphasize the importance of doing the activities on the Faith at Home page.

Describe the *Call to Celebrate: Eucharist Family Guide* using one of the two implementation models.

For programs in which the catechesis is done in a group with a catechist and includes family support

Distribute the *Call to Celebrate: Eucharist Family Guide.* Point out the differences in the two parts:

- the first part is a reflection tool for parents.
- the second part is a guide for doing home preparation.

Mention the availability of the *Songs of Celebration* CD, which will enhance their time with the child and support the child's learning.

Distribute Restored Order Parent Orientation Handout 2 and go through the frequently asked questions with parents and family members.

Go to Parish Policies and Procedures

* For programs in which the catechesis is done in the home

Distribute the *Call to Celebrate: Eucharist Family Guide* and the reproduced *Catechist Edition* pages for the two Confirmation sessions. Point out the difference in the two parts of the guide:

- · the first part is a reflection tool for parents.
- the second part is a guide for doing home preparation.

Go through one session of the *Family Guide* and one of the reproduced Confirmation *Catechist Edition* pages, and explain how to use the outline. Point out:

- · the parent background essay.
- · the easy-to-follow overview.
- the People of Faith story for each session and the importance of telling these stories to children.

Emphasize how essential the ritual prayer is to the session. Go through the prayer as it is written in the session and talk about ways to prepare a prayer space and environment at home.

Distribute Restored Order Parent Orientation Handout 2, "Celebrating Rituals at Home–Letter," and At Home Ritual Preparation Handouts 1–10.

Parish Policies and Procedures

Explain the commitment the parish expects of parents and family members for this preparation.

Distribute appropriate schedules or calendars.

Closing Prayer

Gather the parents and family members in a circular grouping around the prayer space.

Begin with the Sign of the Cross, and say these or similar words:

Let us call to mind the goodness of God who gives us all good things. I bless you with this water to remind you of the gift of your Baptism and your call to hand on the faith. (Sprinkle the group with water.)

We Belong

Before the Celebration

- Choose a gathering space that will be conducive to prayer and to accommodate the size of the group; the church, a chapel, or a gathering place in the parish hall would each be appropriate. You will want the group to be able to see, hear, and move easily during the ritual.
- Prepare the group for the ritual action of the Renewal of Baptismal Promises and for the reflection on the Scriptures.
- · Select a good reader to proclaim the reading.

- Select four people for the entrance procession to carry the Bible, the candle, the bowl of water, and the chrism. Show them where and how to place them in the sanctuary or on the prayer table.
- If not in a church or chapel, place chairs in semicircular rows around the prayer space. Leave enough space for people to move in and out of the rows. If possible, have tables and chairs set up in another space for adult discussion after the celebration.

- . A large, clear bowl with water, or if the celebration is in the church, use the baptismal font or pool
- A large candle or the Paschal candle
- . A prayer table for the candle, oil of chrism, a baptismal candle, a Bible. and a stand
- Songs of Celebration CD

Gathering Rite

We Belong

Goals

- . To reflect on the celebration
- . To review and discuss the effects of Baptism

Materials

- Poster board, chart paper, or
 Songs of Celebration CD overhead projector Bible

Markers

Reflection (20 minutes)

Invite the adults to gather in groups of five or six.

Begin by recalling the ritual moments of the celebration. Lead a guided meditation using the following prompts. Pause after each prompt.

- · Play a few verses of the opening song, "Yes, Lord, I Believe," Songs of Celebration CD, track 7.
- Ask: "What was it like to renew your baptismal promises?"
- · Call to mind the procession to the water and the signing of one another.
- · Read a few verses of the Gospel.
- · Ask participants to recall their discussion of the Gospel.
- · Recall the Lord's Prayer and Dismissal.

Small Group Sharing

Pause for a few minutes of silence. Then invite the participants to share their feelings about the celebration in their small group. Encourage them to stay with their feelings. After 10 to 15 minutes, invite sharing with the large group.

Large Group Sharing

Gather the responses of the small groups on poster board, chart paper, or an overhead projector. Ask for feelings and thoughts about the celebration as a whole, and also for specific parts of the celebration that were meaningful to members of the group.

Namind (30 minutes)

Ask the participants to name what they learned from the celebration about God, Jesus, the Church, Baptism, or their own Christian life.

Take each category separately and list responses on poster board, chart paper, or an overhead projector. When the lists are completed, use them to summarize the theology and meaning of Renewal of Baptismal Promises

Affirm, add, or enlarge upon the following points:

- · Baptism is a sacrament of belonging.
- · Baptism is a sacrament of faith and needs a community of believers.
- · Baptism makes us members of the Church.
- · In Baptism, all sin is forgiven.
- . In Baptism, we are made a "new creature."
- · In Baptism, we become adopted children of God and temples of the Holy Spirit.

Reflection and Small Group Sharing (20 minutes)

Ask "What will you do this week to nurture your bond with the Holy Spirit?"

Direct participants to reflect in silence for a few minutes, and then share their responses with their group.

Closing Blessing (5 minutes)

Gather and begin with the Sign of the Cross.

Leader: God, our Father, we praise and thank you for choosing us to be your children.

All:

Restored Order Session 1-Parent/Adult Catechesis

We Belong

Goals

- To welcome participants in a hospitable environment
- To discuss how one "belongs" to the Church
- To help participants come to a deeper understanding of the Sacraments of Initiation

Environment

- Clearly identify the meeting place, posting clear directions if necessary
- Arrange tbles and chairs arranged for small groups
- Set up a prayer space with a large candle, a Bible on a stand, a clear bowl filled with water, and a branch or other instrument for sprinkling

Materials

- · Beverages and light refreshments
- Copies of Call to Celebrate:
 Eucharist Family Guide
- Songs of Celebration CD
- Copies of Eucharist Parent/Adult
 Catechesis Handouts 1:1 and 1:2
 (www.osvcurriculum.com)
- . Board or chart paper

Welcome and Opening Prayer (15 minutes)

Begin the session with welcoming words and introduce yourself. Briefly review the goals and agenda for the gathering.

* If this session was preceded by a large group ritual and reflection, go to We Belong. If not, continue with the prayer.

Gather the group around the prayer setting, if possible; if not, have the group pause for a reflective moment.

Introduce the prayer with the Sign of the Cross.

Sing "Yes Lord, I Believe!" *Songs of Celebration* CD, track 7.

Pray these or similar words:

God, you are the source of life. You have made all things. We live with the breath of your life in us. We give you praise and thanks for these gifts. We belong to you. We are your children and we are never alone because you are present to us in so many ways, especially in the Church. Open our hearts that we may bring your life to those around us. We ask this in the name of your Son, Jesus. Amen.

Read John 15:1-17.

Invite the assembly to reflect on the Gospel using the following question:

 What does the image of the vine and branches suggest to you about your relationship with Jesus? **Ask** the participants to share their responses with one or two people.

Invite participants to come forward to sign themselves with the holy water as a sign of their belonging to God and the Church.

We Belong (30 minutes)

Write the word "belonging" on the board or on chart paper. Ask the group to give you any word or image that belonging brings up for them. Jot down the responses and point out that real belonging involves investment in relationships and causes.

Distribute Eucharist Parent/Adult Catechesis Handout 1:1 and ask participants to complete it. Explain that it will help them see from their own experiences how people come to belong.

Organize the large group into smaller groups of 5 to 6 people. Ask participants to share their stories of initiation in the small groups.

Direct them to listen for any common characteristics of what happens to people in the process of coming to belong to a group.

Invite participants to share in small groups. Develop a list of characteristics common to everyone's sharing that tells something about how people come to belong. At the end of the sharing, ask volunteers from the small groups to share the lists. Use ideas from the list and give further input on what it means to belong to the Church. Emphasize that:

- · Belonging is a process.
- · Usually we are invited in (evangelization) or are really attracted by what we see (Christian witness).
- · We make choices about our involvement.
- · There are always rituals connected to the process of belonging (sacraments).
- · As we become more involved in the group, we change (conversion).
- · If it is really important to us, we tell others about it we invite them in

Allow some quiet time and ask participants to think about all the things they have just discussed and listened to and to ask themselves

• On a scale of 1-10 (10 being the highest), where would you rank yourself as belonging to the Church? Where would you rank yourself as belonging to God?

Break for refreshments and conversation.

What Are the Sacraments of Initiation? (30 minutes Use some of the comments from the previous session

to move into this seament. Point out that initiation, or coming to belong, is

always a process, and it usually involves symbols, rites, and rituals. It is that way with the Church, too. The Church has three Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

Distribute Eucharist Parent/Adult Catechesis Handout 1:2 and go through it in a conversational style, making comments and explaining as questions arise. You may use the questions as a small group resource for sharing.

Allow time for questions, comments, and insights.

Summarize by saying these or similar words:

Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist are the Sacraments of Initiation. These sacraments celebrate our belonging to Jesus Christ and being incorporated into his Body, the Church. Most of us ao through a process of understanding what this really means for us. It is important to keep in mind that when we celebrate sacraments without being in relationship with and participating in the community of faith, we miss out on a lot. It is also important to keep in mind that initiation is only a beginning. It is not a graduation.

Parent Moment (10 minutes)

Highlight the three Faith at Home features in the Child's Book and show how they will help the parents and family members to participate in the children's preparation.

Emphasize the importance of doing the activities on the Faith at Home page, especially the ritual action.

Closing Prayer (5 minutes)

Gather the participants in a circle around the prayer space. Pray these or similar words:

God, who calls us to yourself, who longs for us to belong to you, we ask for your blessing as we continue our faith journey. May we always be alert to your presence in the sacred signs of our lives and the celebrations of the Church. We ask this in Iesus' name. Amen.

We close by reminding ourselves of our Baptism and our common kinship in God's family. In all that we do, may we reflect the glory of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. (Sprinkle with water.) Amen.

Thank everyone for their time and participation.

Restored Order Session 1-Intergenerational Catechesis

We Belong

Objectives

- To guide families to experience a celebration of the word, including Renewal of Baptismal Promises
- To explore the meaning of the ritual action in family groups
- To help family members increase their understanding of the Sacraments of Initiation
- To help family members express that they are followers of Christ

Welcome and Celebration (10-15 minutes)

Welcome the families in the gathering space.

Distribute copies of the celebration.

Select a family to be in the procession. Have them choose a family member to carry the Bible in procession.

- When families are assembled, walk forward slowly. Follow the child carrying the Bible.
- During the procession, lead families in singing "Yes Lord, I Believe," from the Songs of Celebration CD, track 7.
- Place the Bible on the prayer table and have family members return to their seats.
- · Light the prayer candle.
- Begin prayer with the Sign of the Cross and invite the group to follow the order of the prayer.
- If the group is too large to gather around the
- water and candle, have families remain seated.
- For the proclamation of the Gospel, you may use a Bible or the adapted reading in the Child's Book on pp. 6–7.
- Conclude with the opening song from the Songs of Celebration CD, track 7.

New Life individual family unit experience (10 minutes)

Guide family members to reflect on the celebration by asking the following questions:

• What did you see? What did you hear? What did you do?

Explain the Signs of Faith: Water and Paschal Candle by summarizing the text on pp. 4–5 of the *Child's Book*.

Ask for a volunteer to read aloud The Body of Christ section in the *Child's Book*.

We Belong to God family cluster sharing experience (10 minutes)

Organize the large group into small clusters and invite them to reflect on the following question:

· What does Jesus tell us about belonging to God?

 \boldsymbol{Ask} volunteers to share their responses.

Ask each family cluster to select a leader to read aloud the first paragraph on p. 6 of the *Child's Book*.

Scripture whole-group learning experience (10 minutes)

Read aloud the Scripture story on pp. 6–7 of the Child's Book.

Invite the large group to reflect on the following:

- What was Jesus telling his friends in this story?
- · Ask volunteers to share their responses.

Allow silent time for individuals to reflect on how Jesus is their friend. At the end of the reflection, have family members share their responses with one another.

Direct the families to help children complete the Share activity on p. 7 of the *Child's Book*.

Emphasize that Jesus wants us to know we belong to him, and he wants us to love one another.

The Sacraments of Initiation family cluster sharing experience (15 minutes)

Organize the large group into the same family cluster groups as earlier. Be sure each group has selected a leader. Provide one sheet of poster paper for each family cluster and invite them to reflect on the question: Which sacraments are signs of belonging?

Ask each group leader to write down his or her group's responses on the poster paper.

Ask each group leader to select a member of his or her group to read aloud the first paragraph on p. 8 of the *Child's Book*.

Guide family cluster groups to look at the sacraments that they have listed on their chart paper, and have the leaders circle the Sacraments of Initiation.

Explain that Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist are the Sacraments of Initiation. These sacraments make us full members of the Church. These sacraments are signs that we belong to God.

Baptism individual family unit experience (5 minutes)

Point out the word "Baptism" in the Child's Book.Invite family members to group together and have

 Invite family members to group together and hav the adults share memories of their Baptisms or that of their child or children. Select a child to read aloud about Baptism on p. 8 of the Child's Book.

Confirmation and Eucharist whole-group learning experience (10 minutes)

Point out the word "Confirmation" in the Child's Book:
 Explain to the large group that the Sacrament of Confirmation strengthens baptized persons with the aifts of the Holy Spirit.

- Read the prayers on p. 9 of the Child's Book.
- Ask the families which Person of the Trinity we receive in a special way during Confirmation.
- Select a volunteer to read Signs of Faith: The Trinity.

Point out the word "Eucharist" in the Child's Book:
Select a family member to read aloud from the book about Eucharist.

Clarify that Eucharist is a name used for the whole action of the Mass and that Holy Communion is the receiving of the Body and Blood of Jesus during the Fucharist.

Children of Light individual family unit experience (5 minutes)

Guide families in sharing how they live as followers of Christ using the activity on p. 10 of the *Child's Book*. At the end of the reflection, ask volunteers to share their family's responses.

Closing Blessing (5 minutes)

Invite each family to form a family circle.

Begin with the Sign of the Cross

Pray the prayer on p. 10 of the Child's Book.

Conclude by leading families in singing Songs of Celebration CD, track 7, "Yes Lord, I Believe."

Direct families' attention to the Faith at Home page and encourage them to the activities at home.

child and pray:

Child: Amen.

Closing Prayer

Leader: Loving Father, we thank you for the gift of your Spirit. Send us forth to bring your love to others. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

All: Amen.

Goals

- . To explore the meaning of Blessing and Gifts of the Holy Spirit
- To review the ritual action of Extension of Hands in the Confirmation Rite

Materials

- Poster board, chart paper, or overhead projector
- Markers Songs of Celebration CD
- Take each category separately and list responses

on a poster board, chart paper, or an overhead projector. When the lists are completed, use them to summarize the theology and meaning of Blessings, Extension of Hands, and Gifts of the Holy Spirit,

Affirm, add, or enlarge upon the following points:

- · Blessings call down God's favor on those being blessed. We can bless one another.
- One of the signs the Church uses to call upon the power of the Holy Spirit is the extending of hands.
- · During the Sacrament of Confirmation, the bishop and the priests who are with him extend their hands over the candidates and pray that the Holy Spirit will give them the gifts of wisdom, understanding, right judgment, courage, knowledge, reverence, and wonder and awe.
- · The Holy Spirit is given to us at Baptism to be our helper and advocate.
- Confirmation increases the aifts of the Holy Spirit in us. The gifts are given for the sake of building up the Church.

Reflection (20 minutes)

Invite the adults to gather in groups of five or six.

Begin by recalling the ritual moments of the celebration. Lead a guided meditation using the following prompts. Pause after each prompt.

- · Play a few verses of the opening song "We Are Called," Sonas of Celebration, track 1.
- Read some verses of the Gospel.
- · Ask participants to recall their discussion of the Gospel.
- Call to mind the ritual of blessing the candidates.
- · Ask: "What was it like for you to observe the candidates being blessed?"

Small Group Sharing

Pause for a few minutes of silence. Then invite the participants to share their feelings about the celebration in their small group. After 10 to 15 minutes, invite sharing with the large group.

Large Group Sharing

Gather the responses of the small groups on a poster board, chart paper, or an overhead projector. Ask for feelings and thoughts about the celebration as a whole, and also for comments on specific parts of the celebration that were especially meaningful to members of the group.

Namind (30 minutes)

Ask the participants to name what they learned from the celebration about Blessing, the Holy Spirit, the Church, and their own Christian life.

Reflection and Small Group Sharing (20 minutes)

Ask "Which of the seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit will you pray for this week? Why?"

Direct participants to reflect in silence for a few minutes and then to share their responses with their group.

Closing Blessing (5 minutes)

Gather and begin with the Sign of the Cross.

Instruct participants to face a partner and extend hands over them in blessing, saying:

May the Gifts of the Holy Spirit be active and effective in your life this week.
