Mary, the Mother of Jesus

BACKGROUND

Mary, Woman of Faith

Mary's fiat ("Moy it be done to me" [Luke 1:38]) is an act of faith and trust in God's providential plan. Mary's assent of faith to a seemingly impossible calling makes her the model of discipleship for us today. While Mary, the Mother of God, may sometimes seem "larger than life," she offers us a witness of faithfulness, courage, and trust.

The angel greeted Mary with exquisite esteem: "Hail, favored one! The Lord is with you" (Luke 1:28). The angel brought the good news that she was chosen by God to be a vessel for his saving action. The Holy Spirit would come upon her, and she would be the Mother of the Incarnate Son of God and he would be called Jesus. Throughout the ages the Church has retold this magnificent story, and Mary has been esteemed as the highly favored Mother of the Lord.

Mary, the Mother of God

Mary is the mother of Jesus, true God, and true Man. She is not the mother of the Triune God. She is the mother of the Second Person of the Holy Trinity. In saying Mary is the Mother of God, we are affirming Jesus' divinity and humanity. In A.D. 431 at the Council of Ephesus, the Church proclaimed Mary to be Theotokos, truly the Mother of God.

Devotion to Mary

Mary's inseparable link to the saving work of her divine son, Jesus, has given rise to many expressions of reverence and devotion throughout the history of Christianity. Mary is an intercessor and a model of faith. She is our guide to following Jesus, her son.

Meditation on the mysteries of the Rosary and other special devotions indicate the high esteem Christians place on this woman of faith. Church teaching encourages devotion to Mary. The Church emphasizes that all Marian devotion be guided by Scripture, liturgy, doctrine, and ecumenism, and must always lead believers to Jesus, her son.

The General Directory for Catechesis (GDC) reinforces the teaching of the Catholic Church on the value of devotion to Mary in the life of the Church and in the lives of the members of the Church. It states:

Multiple forms of devotion to the Mother of God have developed in different circumstances of time and place, in response to popular sensibilities and cultural differences. Certain forms of Marian devotion, however, because of long usage, require a renewed catechesis to restore to them elements that have become lost or obscured. By such catechesis the perennial value of Marian devotion can be emphasized, doctrinal elements gleaned from theological reflection and the Church's Magisterium assimilated (GDC 196).

Teacher to Teacher

Storytelling

First graders love stories. They love to hear them and they love to tell them. You can capitalize on that interest by telling, retelling, and allowing the students to retell Scripture stories throughout the year. Tell the stories often. Faith comes from hearing the Word of God. Let the students pick out their favorites. As you help them get to know the people in the stories, you are deepening their sense of belonging to the People of God.

Reading Scripture

Make reading and sharing Scripture stories a special time for both you and the students. One way of making this time special is to gather the students closer to you by having them either stand or sit around you. In all cultures storytelling is an important way of passing on traditions. Through storytelling our Catholic identity is not only passed on but also more easily remembered.

The Church Teaches...

Because the eternal Word assumed human nature, human experience is the locus for the manifestation and realization of salvation in him. By the grace of the Holy Splitt, persons come to know Christ, to know that he was sent from the Father, and to know that he died to save them in the midst of their human experience. (National Piecetary for Cerchesis 29A).

The Church teaches the importance of helping those we catechize apply the lessons of Jesus' life to their own lives.

Learning by Discipleship. The National Directory for Catechesis tells us that Mary is both a disciple and a teacher (NDC 29B). As the students learn about Mary's willingness to listen to and respond to God, help them recognize that God also speaks to them in their hearts when they pray. Encourage them to spend some quiet time in prayer every day, listening to God telling them how much he loves them, Invite them to place their faith and trust in God as Mary did.

Pray

- Ask the students to quiet themselves for prayer. Remind them that Jesus is always present as we pray.
- Begin and end with the Sign of the Cross:

Dear God. thank you for our mothers and for Mary, the Mother of Jesus. Amen.

Reflect

- Ask the students to look at and think about who they see in the picture. Help the students describe the image of Mary.
- Ask the students about their favorite family story. Have several volunteers share their favorite family stories.
- Read aloud the introductory paragraph and Scripture passage followed by a moment of silence.
- Ask volunteers to answer the follow-up question.

Focus

Share with the class that they are about to hear a story of a woman who had great faith in God.

Introduce

- Point out the Disciple Power box to the students. Share an example of courage from your own life. Ask a volunteer to share a time he or she was courageous.
- Remind the students that Mary, the Mother of God, was courageous too. She trusted in God and lived her faith.
- Let the class know they are now going to hear about another woman who was courageous. Have them listen for how she showed courage. Read about Mother Théodore Guérin



DISCIPLE POWER

Courage. During her life, Mary displayed extraordinary courage. Her faith was unshakable. From the Annunciation to her presence at the foot of the Cross and her steadfast support of the disciples in the Upper Room, Mary trusted in God's plan for her and for Jesus' disciples. Although your first graders are not yet aware of the extent of Mary's courage, your devotion to our Blessed Mother will help them begin to recognize the special place Mary occupies in the heart of every Catholic. Encourage the students to ask Mary to help them grow in trust. If possible, display a picture or statue of Mary prominently in your learning space.

Trusting God

At first, Mother Théodore and the sisters were cold and lonely. But over the years, people learned to trust the sisters. Like Mary, Mother Théodore lived a life of service by helping people in need. She always trusted God.

The Church honors Mother Théodore Guérin as a Saint. The Church celebrates her feast day on October 3.

How can you show that you love and trust God?



TEACHING TIP

Book Activities. The Be My Disciples student book has activities within every chapter. Coordinate your time frame and the students' abilities when deciding how to approach an activity. If needed, prepare some of the activity ahead of time. The more the students can do by themselves, the better they will process the information. Not every student will be able to complete the activity within the allotted time. Make adjustments for those students, such as shortening the activity to include only what they are able to achieve within the allotted time frame

Reinforce

- Have the students underline or highlight in the book examples of Saint Théodore's courage and faith.
- Invite responses to the follow-up question. Help the students by giving some examples of loving and trusting God.

Connect

- Ask the students the following questions:
 - · What do you think of when you hear the word courage? (Accept all replies.)
 - What are some things you do that need your courage? (Again accept all responsible replies, e.g., not to be afraid of the dark; try a new food; spend an overnight away from family.)
- Point out that sometimes we need courage to live our faith like Mary and Saint Théodore. Explain that we can pray for courage.
- ► Have the students complete the prayer activity by tracing the letters.

Pray

Gather the class for prayer. Invite them to pray the prayer to Saint Théodore that they completed on page 67.

Key Concept The Bible helps us learn about Mary.

Pray

Quiet the students for prayer. Lead them in praying the Sign of the Cross.

Teach

- ▶ Read the Faith Focus question to the class. Ask the students to look at the picture of Mary. Have a volunteer guess what is happening in the illustration.
- Point out the Faith Words box. Explain that angels are God's messengers and helpers. Then ask the students to listen for the angel's message to Mary as you proclaim the Scripture reading based on Luke 1:28, 31, 35, 38,
- Emphasize that Mary listened carefully and responded to God's message.

Reinforce

- Ask the students to respond to the two follow-up questions.
- Have the students find the word angels in the Glossary and copy it in the space provided.
- ► Briefly discuss Mary's response to the angel Gabriel. Invite the students to reenact what the Bible tells happened when the angel Gabriel gave Mary the message from God.
- Have partners take the parts of Mary and the angel and role-play the scene.

CATHOLIC DOCTRINE

Angels, Angels have been so commercialized in contemporary culture that it is easy to forget the role they have played in Salvation History. Angels are spiritual beings who serve as messengers of God. They live in the constant presence of God and are sent forth to do his will. They have been present since creation and have participated in the story of Salvation as witnessed by the Scriptures. They closed the gates of paradise after the fall of Adam and Eve, led the Hebrew people on their journey out of Egypt, assisted the prophets, and worshiped the Savior at his birth (see CCC 328-333).



Messengers of God. You might want to share with the class why artists paint angels with wings. Wings help things move. Artists paint wings on angels as a way to say that angels bring messages from God. First graders can be God's messengers. Draw a pair of simple wings and make copies on pastel colored paper. With the students, pick messages God wants people to hear, such as "God loves you," "Say yes to God," "You are special to God," and so on. Let the students print messages on pairs of wings, add some dabs of glitter, and hang the messages in the school halls.

▶ Present Catholics Believe about feast days honoring Mary. (See information in Our Catholic Faith at the bottom of page 126.)

Connect

- Read the activity aloud. Allow time for partners to discuss how the people in the pictures are saying yes to God and to create their own pictures.
- When the students finish drawing, encourage sharing.
- ▶ Be sure to compliment the students on being courageous in saying yes to God.

Pray

► Gather the class for prayer. Invite them to respond, "Pray for us" after each of the following invocations:

Holy Mary . . . Courageous Mary . . . Faithful Mary ... Loving Mary ... Mother Mary ...

Conclude with the Sign of the Cross. **Key Concept** Mary trusted in God.

Prav

Duiet the class for prayer. Begin and end with the Sign of the Cross. Again, invite the students to respond, "Pray for us" after the following:

> Trusting Mary . . . Loving Mary ... Gentle Mary . . . Mother Mary ...

Teach

- Write the word faith on the board and see if the students can recall its meaning (from Chapter 2). (knowing and believing in God)
- Emphasize that God invites us to have faith in him. Explain that Mary expressed her faith when she said "yes" to God.
- Add the word trust to the board and draw attention to it in Faith Words. Tell the students that when we have faith in someone, we trust them. We know they will keep their promises to us, always help us, and take care of us.
- Have the students enter the word trust in the Glossary.
- Ask a volunteer to read Say Yes to God. Direct the students to listen to how Mary trusted God.

Reinforce

Ask the students how Mary showed her faith and trust in God. (She said ves to God.)

TEACHING TIP

Participation. Find ways to involve the entire class in active learning. Know which students are comfortable performing in front of the class and which students do not mind being in front, as long as they do not have to say anything. Know which students would rather be the audience, and make sure that they are involved in some way. Be alert to those students who want to participate but are too shy or hesitant to say so.

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FAITH-FILLED PEOPLE

Saint Juan Diego. In 1531, the Blessed Mother appeared to a poor peasant named Juan Diego. She told Juan to ask the Mexican bishop to build a church on the site where she had appeared. The bishop did not believe Juan and asked for a sign. Mary, Our Lady of Guadalupe, gave Juan roses to carry in his cape. When he opened his cape for the bishop, the roses had been miraculously changed into a beautiful painting of Mary. Through Saint Juan Diego, Our Lady of Guadalupe showed that God cares for all people, especially the poor. For more information on Saint Juan Diego, go to the Saints Resource at BeMvDisciples.com.

Connect

- Invite the students to think of people they trust. Then ask: Why do we trust these people? (because we love them, care about them, and so on)
- Read aloud the opening paragraph on the page. Emphasize that we trust God because he always loves us.
- Read the directions to the class and have them do the activity.
- After the students have completed the activity, read each item and have students respond by raising their hands when they hear the ways they checked.
- Ask the students why these actions are important ways that we can say "yes" to God. (For example, they show our respect for God and others. Accept all appropriate responses.)

Prav

- Call the students to prayer. Pray:
 - "Gracious Father, you give us many ways to trust you, have faith in you, and say 'yes' to you. Hear us as we say . . ."
 - Have the students respond,
 - "Thank you, loving God."
- Conclude with the Sign of the Cross.

Key Concept Mary is the mother of Jesus and our mother, too.

Pray

Gather the students for prayer. Remind them that God is present when we pray. Lead them in the Sign of the Cross.

Teach

- Draw the students' attention to the artwork of Mary and Jesus. Invite volunteers to suggest what Mary might be thinking as she holds Jesus in her arms.
- Read the section, God Chose Mary aloud to the class.
- Ask: Why is Mary so special? (Mary is Iesus' mother; she is the Mother of God; she cared for Jesus; she loves and cares for us.)
- Ask the students how the Church honors Mary on January 1. (We celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. It is a holy day of obligation.)

Reinforce

- Ask why Mary is so special. Share with the students that because Mary is the Mother of God and our mother, too, we can ask her to pray for us.
- Ask volunteers to suggest reasons why children might ask Mary to pray for them.

Connect

Invite the students to close their eves and silently tell Mary about their needs. Then lead them in praying the Hail Mary.

OUR CATHOLIC FAITH

Feast Days. When the Archangel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would be the Mother of God's Son, Mary responded with faith, knowing that all things were possible with God. By giving her consent, Mary became the mother of Jesus, the Son of God. Mary, the mother of Jesus, is also the Mother of the Church. The Church honors her with special feast days and holy days throughout the liturgical year.









Pray, "Thank you, God, for helping me to show my faith and love for you. Amen."

TEACHING TIP

Saying "Yes" to Parents. Mary's example of saying yes to God gives us an opportunity to reflect on our own willingness to serve the Lord. Reflect with the students on how often they say "Yes, Mom" or "Yes, Dad" even when they might not want to do what their parent or guardian is asking them to do. Discuss ways they can serve God by saying yes to things that are good for them even when they may not always want to do them.

Reinforce

Remind the class that we learn to show our faith and love for God by the example of Mary and other people who have faith in God.

Respond

- Emphasize that we actually show our faith and love for God by what we say and do.
- Explain the activity and have the students complete it. Ask volunteers to share their work.

Choose

- Present My Faith Choice and give the students a few moments to talk about what they might do.
- Encourage them to put their faith choices into practice this week.

Pray

Point out the prayer at the bottom of the page. Invite the class to join in offering the prayer thanking God for their faith.

DAY 5 CONCLUDE

Prav

Gather the class for prayer. Begin with the Sign of the Cross. Then invite each student to offer to Mary the prayer request he or she wrote.

Recall


- Read aloud the To Help You Remember statements, leaving out a key word in each statement. Have the students supply the correct word.
- Point out the activity. Have the students complete each of the five sentences. Afterward check responses.

Reflect

Give the students time to think about and then write their prayers thanking God for Mary.

Share

Encourage the students to share what they wrote with the class and also with their parents later on.



TEACHING TIP

Visiting the Parish Church. Plan in advance with your pastor or other member of your parish's pastoral team to give the students a tour of the parish church. Ask the guide to point out images of Mary in statues, stained-glass windows, paintings, and other art forms and, if possible, to mention an interesting fact about each image. Help the students understand that we do not honor the image of Mary, such as a statue. We honor Mary, the person whom the statue represents. After the visit, invite the students to draw one of the images of Mary they saw in church. Display the drawings in the classroom

TASKS OF CATECHESIS

Teaching to Pray. The Book of Psalms is a collection of songs of prayer. During the great feasts at Jerusalem and each Sabbath, the Jewish people prayed from the Book of Psalms. The prayer of the psalms is both personal and communal. These prayers express adoration and blessing, praise and thanksgiving, petition and intercession. They recall God's promises and foretell the coming of the Messiah. The psalms are part of the official daily prayer of the Church, the Liturgy of the Hours. Point out that we pray or sing psalms at Mass. Pray from the Book of Psalms often with the class.

We Pray

- Gather the students for prayer.
- ► Tell them that together you will pray a psalm.
- ▶ Show the students the Book of Psalms in the Bible. Explain that psalms are special prayer poems. Then practice the words of the psalm response with the class.
- Remind the students of how they learned in the last chapter that some prayers may be signed, or said without words spoken out loud. Say, "In Chapter 4, we learned how to sign 'Jesus, I love you.' "
- ► Tell the students that they will learn a new word in American Sign Language today, the sign for "happy."
- Point to the picture of the boy on the page. Practice the sign for "happy." (right hand touching chest and brushing up and outward two times) Say, "We will use this sign whenever we pray the word happy in our psalm."
- Have one of the students be the Reader and allow time for him or her to practice the reading.
- Meanwhile, point out the response to the Gospel. Explain that it is the same response we make at Mass on Sunday after the Gospel is proclaimed.
- Lead the class in prayer, beginning and ending with the Sign of the

TEACHING TIP

As your first graders demonstrate good listening skills, provide stickers or stars for them to post next to their names on the chart. This incentive will help them become better listeners. In addition to affirming the students' efforts, model good listening by giving the students your full attention when they are speaking.

Making Bible Story Puppets

- Invite the students to use the list on the board to print two ways they show they are good listeners.
- Have the students use their maps to tell about a time they were good listeners.
