Leader Background

The aspect of *priest* is spotlighted in Lessons 2 and 3. It's important to establish early in the lesson what is meant by "sharing in the priesthood of Jesus" and to differentiate between the ordained priesthood and the priesthood of all baptized persons. Emphasize the concepts *service, called, and anointed*.

This very active session will require much energy on your part and early establishment of conduct rules.

Opening Prayer Service

Candidates should assemble in the prayer corner. The flasks of oil should be prominently displayed. Lead the opening prayer.

Opening Prayer Service

Leader: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

ALL: Amen.

Leader: Be with us, Holy Spirit! Fill us with your presence. With your gifts we will be able to do great things for Jesus! We can change the world into the kingdom of God. Amen.

ALL: Amen.

Move back into the class meeting area.

Priest

Read aloud the following candidate text.

Priest

What does it mean that you share in the priesthood of Jesus? Are you the same as an ordained priest? No, that is another calling and anointing. Your mission of priest is to imitate Jesus in the way he served others. He washed their feet, he taught them lessons for life, he healed their bodies and souls, he fed the hungry, and he comforted the grieving. That's *your* mission of priest as well.



The CD symbol tells you when to go to the *Director Resources* CD.

Word Search

Defining Service

Read aloud the instructions for the service exercise and hand out the Scripture passages. Give the candidates time to carefully read them and highlight their choices.

Defining Service

How did we learn to serve? How did we get the idea that Catholics are the servants of the people of God?

Priests and kings have been called and anointed throughout history. Your leader will give you several Bible passages that illustrate some aspect of service.

Here's an example: Acts 6:1-7 says that as the number of disciples continued to grow, the Greeks and the Hebrews complained that their widows were not being treated equally. The apostles solved the issue by choosing seven Greek and Hebrew men of good reputation who were filled with wisdom and the Holy Spirit. These men were called by name and presented to the apostles, who laid hands on them, prayed over them, and appointed them to take care of the money, food, and goods of the Church.

Which phrases in this passage define *service* to you? Take care of the money, food, and goods of the Church? Yes, but you could also include solving the complaints.

Read the Scripture passages your leader gives you and highlight the phrases in each that define *service* to you.

Divide candidates into pairs; then read aloud the following instructions from the candidate text.

With a partner, write a definition of service that fits our Catholic heritage.

Have each pair write their definition on the board; then work as a class to get the best definition.

Share your definition with the entire group by writing it on the board.

As a group, combine the definitions to get the best one. Write the final definition here.

Have candidates look up the following passages or give them the Scripture handout from the CD. Then follow the Discussion Activity procedure.

Look up the following Scripture passages and ask yourself what gifts from the Holy Spirit you'll need to live a life of service. After you read each passage, write down one thing you can do right away to get in shape for it.

Ephesians 4:1-6 _____

Share with your partner. Take notes on your partner's ideas.

Share with your small group, select one of the group's ideas, and write it on the board.

Look at the ideas you and your classmates have for service and spiritual growth. Pick one for yourself; write it down here, and do it this week.

Read aloud the following candidate text.

Before you go to bed each night, ask yourself if you have lived up to your resolution. If so, congratulations! If not, resolve to try harder the next day.

Prayer Jar

Read aloud the Scripture passage and instructions for making prayer jars and give the supplies to the candidates. Check the design sketches to be sure they're related to the Pentecost reading and suitable for the prayer service.

Prayer Jar

Read the following from Acts 2:1-6: *When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each.*

Your leader will give you these items to make a prayer jar: a jar, paper, a copy of a prayer to the Holy Spirit, a picture of flames with the gifts of the Holy Spirit listed on it.

- Sketch a design for the jar that reflects the Pentecost story on a separate sheet of scratch paper. Show it to your leader before you take the next step.
- Use paints and jewels to complete your design.
- Paste the prayer on the inside of the lid.
- Cut out the flames and put them in the jar.
- Put your prayer jar on the table in the prayer corner.

Closing Prayer Service

Drape a wooden-cross necklace over each jar and ask for a volunteer reader. Begin the service. Play music as you lay hands on the candidates' heads and pray.

Closing Prayer Service

Leader: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

ALL: Amen.

Leader: Let us listen attentively to God's holy word.

Reader: A reading from the holy Gospel According to Luke.

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you'" (Luke 10:1-9). The gospel of the Lord.

ALL: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Leader: Let us offer our prayers and petitions to God. That we may be like the seventy disciples and bring Jesus to others by the work that we do, we pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: That the pope, our bishops, and our priests, deacons, religious, and the laity will be models of service to the people of God, we pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: That we are truly thankful to God for the chance to serve others as we prepare for confirmation, we pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: That we bring the message of the kingdom of God as we work for others, we pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: It is a tradition in our Church that those chosen to be of service, to go on a mission for Jesus, are presented with a cross. Receive the cross of Jesus Christ and wear it as a reminder that anything you do, you are doing in his name.

As the leader places the cross around each candidate's neck, lays hands on each candidate's head, and prays, the candidate silently asks the Holy Spirit to help him or her perform service with Jesus the Priest.

Leader: The Lord Jesus sent forth the disciples and the seventy disciples. May the Lord bless us and keep us as we go forth to serve the Lord.

ALL: Thanks be to God!

Leader: Let us offer each other a sign of peace as we go forth.

Read aloud the last section of the candidate lesson.

Sending Forth

You have just been presented with the cross of Jesus Christ. Please wear it as you perform the service projects we'll discuss in the next lesson.

Take your prayer jar home, keep it in your room, and remember to ask the Holy Spirit to be with you as you serve others.
