

It Helps to Know

Scripture tells us that

 God created all the universe and all living things, and gave it to us to enjoy and care for. (See Genesis 1:26–30.)

The Catechism teaches us that

- God made the world and everything in it (CCC, 198). The beauty of God's Creation calls us to respect the Creator and follow his will.
- by examining God's Creation, we discover the laws of nature (CCC, 341), which we are able to apply to our own lives.

Keep It Simple

- Talk about the changing of the seasons and about how seasons are part of God's wonderful Creation.
- Spend time in seasonal activities, such as finding colorful leaves in fall, planting flowers in spring, and so forth.

How Four- and Five-Year-Olds Understand the Lesson, by Joseph White, Ph.D.

Four- and five-year-olds often understand how the weather and natural surroundings change with the seasons, particularly if they live in a climate that has pronounced seasonal changes. They become excited about finding colorful leaves, playing in snow, and swimming or playing in water when it's hot outside. Children who live in climates with less pronounced seasonal changes may still understand the seasons from books and videos, as well as the holidays they celebrate at various times of the year.

It Helps to Know

Scripture tells us that

 after God created people, he looked upon his creation "and saw that it was very good" (Genesis 1:31).

The Catechism teaches us that

- although we might understand the biology of life, we cannot fully comprehend its mystery—how a new soul comes into being out of nothing. This is a mystery of the divine work of Creation. (CCC, 297)
- God created us to do good things, to show love to him and to others.
- Adam and Eve transmitted to all people their own first sin, known as Original Sin. We are therefore deprived of original holiness and justice. (CCC, 417)



Keep It Simple

- With your child, read the story of Creation in the Bible. Explain that God is the author of the Bible, which is the holy book of the Church.
- Make handprints using finger paints, clay, or some other medium that will show the small lines of the hands and fingers. Explain that each finger print is unique and special. Tell your child that in the same way, there is no one exactly like him or her.

How Four- and Five-Year-Olds Understand the Lesson, by Joseph White, Ph.D.

Most four- and five-year-olds know very little about how they came into being, and many have not even begun asking this question. It is possible, however, for them to learn that God made the world and everything in it, including people. Equally important is for children to begin to understand that God knows them personally, and that he is pleased with how he made them. He loves them just the way they are, and will help them become all that he made them to be.

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
