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Jesus Welcomes the Children

Background for the Teacher

A Childlike Faith

Belief and trust in God is the starting point and anchor of a life of faith. In the Bible story for this lesson, Jesus proclaims, "Let the children come to me and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it" (Luke 18:16-17). Jesus enjoins us to trust God, his and our loving Father. From our willingness to respond to God flows our whole life of faith.

Jesus describes the faith of those to whom the Kingdom of God belongs as a childlike faith. A person who has a childlike faith acknowledges their dependence on God for their life, for their happiness, for all that is good. Scripture gives us, over and over again, models of such childlike faith, the greatest of whom is Mary.

Jesus places his Father at the center of his life and invites us to do the same. Jesus invites us to have faith in God, who is Abba, our loving, caring, ever-present, unconditionally generous and merciful Father. Jesus' life is a living testimony to God the Father, who lavishes upon us his kindness, grace, goodness and unending love.

For Reflection

How childlike is my faith? What might the faith of the children teach me this week as I try to help them grow and see and value themselves as children of God?

About the Children

Remember that young children have a developing notion of right and wrong that is quite different than that of adults. Kindergarteners are still very egocentric. While an adult might see the value of sharing toys or being a good sport even when they are losing, this view of things is often not the perspective from which kindergarteners view their relationship with other people. Cognitively, children still view the world from the perspective that they are the center of the world. We should not jump to the conclusion that they are being intentionally selfish when they do: they are working through a stage of development that is part of every child's social and moral development.

A Few Suggestions ...

A child's developing relationship with other people and with God is primarily nurtured by strong positive experiences. It is important for teachers to keep this in mind when disciplining young children and to have developmentally appropriate expectations of children. Foster this development by focusing the children's attention on the positive dimensions of situations. For example, explore with the children how they would feel if these situations happened to them. Ask, "How would you feel if someone shared their cookie with you when you didn't have one?" Or, "How would you feel if some children would not let you play with them?" Avoid publicly shaming children in front of their peers; this hinders rather than fosters a child's developing relationship with other people and with God.

Lesson Planner

Faith Focus

Jesus taught that everyone is to live as a child of God. Things we do and say are to show that we are children of God and followers of Jesus.

Bible Story

Jesus Blesses the Children

Jesus had special friends who he chose to be his helpers. Jesus and his special friends, or disciples, traveled from town to town to remind people about the good news of God's love.

Hearing that Jesus was visiting their town, many people hurried to listen to him. They believed Jesus was a great teacher. They wanted to see him and listen to him. Some people asked him questions about God.

Sometimes Jesus answered their questions by telling the people stories. These stories helped people to understand what Jesus was teaching them. One very important thing that Jesus taught the people was that they were to always try their best to live as children of God.

One time when Jesus was teaching the people, parents brought their little children, even babies, to him. They wanted Jesus to touch and bless their children. When the disciples of Jesus saw what the people were doing, they told the people and their children to go away and to leave Jesus alone.

Jesus saw and heard what his disciples were doing, and he stopped them. He said, "Let the little children come to me. You are to learn to love God as these little children love."

Jesus turned to the children. He invited them to come to him. Jesus put his hands on them and he blessed them.

After that Jesus and his disciples went to another place.

BASED ON MATTHEW 19:13-15, MARK 10:13-16 AND LUKE 18:15-17

Day One

Lesson Objective

Recall the Bible story, "Jesus Blesses the Children."



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area. Invite the children to do the movements that go along with the song.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 4 to teach the children the song, "Let the Children Come to Me." Keep in mind that you will have to sing it several times until all the children learn the words.



Teach

Introduce the Bible story.

- Ask the children, "What Bible stories do you remember about Jesus?" Encourage the children to share the stories they can recall.
- Tell the children that the Bible stories about Jesus are in a section of the Bible called the Gospels.
- Tell the children that there are many stories in the Bible of people coming to see Jesus. Explain that today they will hear about a time when people brought their children to Jesus.
- Show the children the teaching poster or the cover of the children's leaflet and ask them to think about what Jesus might be saying to the people about the children.
- Invite a child to come up and open the Bible to the bookmarked story: Matthew 19:13–15.
- Tell the children to listen closely to discover what happens to the children in the Bible story.

Tell the Bible story.

Take the opened Bible, place the children's leaflet inside it and read aloud the Bible story "Jesus Blesses the Children" from the For My Family page. Refer to the teaching poster or the cover of the children's leaflet as you read the story.

Recall the Bible story.

 Help the children recall key details of the Bible story by inviting them to respond to the questions below. Affirm and encourage them as they respond. Always give the children clues if they need help responding.

- —Why did people bring their children to Jesus? (They wanted Jesus to touch and bless their children.)
- —What did Jesus say to his helpers? (Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me.")
- —What did Jesus do? (Jesus took the children in his arms
- Summarize by telling the children that Jesus loves them as he loved the children in the Bible story.



Work on the children's leaflet activity.

- Distribute the children's leaflets and have the children open them. Point out the text at the top of both pages and read it aloud to the children, "Jesus Blessed the Children. Jesus taught everyone to live as a child of God. Things I do and say show that I am a child of God."
- Draw attention to the game board and have the children look at the pictures. Invite the children to describe what is happening in each of the pictures.
- Discuss with the children what it means to live as a child of God. Lead them to think about such things as being a good friend, including others at play, giving their outgrown toys and clothing to the poor, donating food for the poor and so forth.
- Divide the children into pairs and have them play the game.

Connect with the child's life.

Tell the children to take their leaflet home. Encourage them to share the story "Jesus Blesses the Children" and the activities with their family.





- Gather the children in the prayer center.
- Introduce the prayer by saying, "Today we will thank Jesus for loving children and for loving us." Explain to them that they will repeat the words of the prayer aloud after you.
- Invite the children to quiet themselves for prayer, using the breathing gestures. (Pause.)
- Lead the children in prayer. Begin with the Sign of the Cross.

Teacher: Thank you, Jesus, for loving children.

Children: Echo the words of the prayer.

Teacher: Thank you, Jesus, for loving me. **Children:** *Echo the words of the prayer.*

Teacher: Together let us pray, "Amen."

All: Amen.

Day Two

Lesson Objective

Identify how to live as a child of God.



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 4.
 Sing the song, "Let the Children Come to Me" that the children learned on Day One.



Teach

- Display the teaching poster or hold up the children's leaflet and invite the children to retell the Bible story "Jesus Blesses the Children." Provide clues, as necessary, to help the children recall the story. Use guiding questions, such as:
 - —Who can tell me what happened first in the Bible story? (The people brought their children to Jesus.)

Day Two continued

- —Who can tell me what happened next in the story? (Jesus' disciples told the people and their children to go away and leave Jesus alone.)
- —Who can tell me how the Bible story ended? (Jesus invited the children to come to him and he blessed them. Jesus told the people to learn to love God as these children love God.)
- Summarize by telling the children that they are special.
 Jesus loves them with a special love as he loved the children in the Bible story.



Decorate paper candles.

- Explain to the children that Jesus is also called the Light of the World. When our actions show that we are children of God, we bring Jesus' light to others.
- Remind the children that there are several things they can do to share Jesus' light with others. We do this by living as children of God, as Jesus taught us to live. Invite the children to share their ideas of what they can do to share Jesus' light with others and live as children of God. Praise all the children's responses.
- Give each child a construction paper candle with the phrase "I will bring Jesus' light to others" printed on it.
- Have the children decorate the candles with markers, crayons, stickers and other craft supplies.

Connect with the child's life.

Have the children take their candles home and share them with their families. Encourage the children to talk with their families about how they can share Jesus' light with others.



Pray

- Gather the children in the prayer center. Invite them to quiet themselves for prayer. (Pause.) Invite the children to think about how wonderful and good God is. Then ask them to imitate your gestures as you slowly breathe in and out and raise and lower your extended arms.
- Lead the children in praying the Day One prayer.

Day Three

Lesson Objective

Discover that children of God welcome all people.



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 4.
 Sing the song, "Let the Children Come to Me" that the children learned on Day One.



Teach

- Show the children the teaching poster or the cover of the children's leaflet and remind them of Jesus' words, "Let the little children come to me."
- Invite the children to role-play the Bible story. Play the role of Jesus and divide the children into three groups, disciples, children and adults. Discuss with the children their different roles and then have them role-play the story.
- As time permits, ask the "children" to be the "adults" and the "adults" to be the "children" and act out the story again.
- Praise the actors and all the children for remembering the story so well.
- Conclude by telling the children that they are special.
 Jesus loves them with a special love just as he loved the children in the Bible story.



Make doorknob hangers.

- Provide copies of the activity master on page 207 of this guide and crayons or markers.
- Give each child a copy of the activity master. Explain that
 they are going to make signs to hang on a doorknob. Point
 out that the word Welcome is printed on the sign. Invite
 the children to color the sign.
- While the children are working, walk among them and remind them that Jesus welcomed all people. Explain that Jesus teaches us to welcome all people too.

Connect with the child's life.

Have the children take their doorknob signs home and share them with their families. Have them tell their families that they live as children of God when they welcome others.



Pray

- Gather the children in the prayer center. Invite them to quiet themselves for prayer. (Pause.) Invite the children to think about how wonderful and good God is. Then ask them to imitate your gestures as you slowly breathe in and out and raise and lower your extended arms.
- Lead the children in praying the Day One prayer.



Day Four

Lesson Objective

Share that living as children of God makes them special.



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 4. Sing the song, "Let the Children Come to Me" that the children learned on Day One.



Teach

Play a game of "Simon Says."

come and gather around me.'

- Explain to the children that when you say "Simon says, 'Come forward,'" they can take a step forward. But if you only say, "Come forward," they are not to take a step forward. See the examples below:
 - "Simon says, 'Take two steps forward.' " (Children take two steps forward.)
 - "Take two steps forward." (Children remain in place.)
- Conclude the game by saying, "Simon says, 'Everyone
- After the children have gathered around you, ask God to bless them. Extend your hands over the children and say, "God bless these children. Fill their hearts with your love."



Continue the Bible story.

- Have the children imagine what they think might have happened after the children in the story went back to their homes. Encourage your class to use their imaginations. Give examples to encourage participation by all the children; for example, they might comment about seeing Jesus and talking with him, or they may suggest that the children in the story would begin to do good and caring things as a result from meeting Jesus.
- Choose several of the scenarios named by the children and invite the children to role-play what happened when the children in the story returned home and told their family and friends about meeting Jesus.

Connect with the child's life.

- Ask and invite responses to the following questions:
 - -What can you do or say this week to show the people in your family and your friends that you are proud to be a child of God?
 - -What can you do or say this week to show the people in your family and your friends that they are children of God too, and Jesus loves them?
- Congratulate the children for their responses. Summarize by reminding the children that living as children of God makes them special.



Pray

- Gather the children in the prayer center. Invite them to quiet themselves for prayer. (Pause.) Invite the children to think about how wonderful and good God is. Then ask them to imitate your gestures as you slowly breathe in and out and raise and lower your extended arms.
- Lead the children in praying the Day One prayer.

6 We Are Children of God

Background for the Teacher

Created in the Image of God

The human person, created in the image and likeness of God, is the pinnacle of God's creation. (See Genesis 1:27 and Psalm 8:6-7.) Among God's creation, the human person is unique. God, for reasons beyond human comprehension, chooses to create us in his divine image and likeness. He makes us sharers in the very life of God and invites us to live in communion with the Holy Trinity, both now and forever.

The dignity of every human person is rooted in this truth: every human being is sacred, or holy. This dignity and sacredness demand that we treat every person with the reverence that honors and respects that dignity. As we learn to love ourselves as God created and loves us, we learn to show reverence for ourselves and others, as God does.

For Reflection

What do I do that shows respect and reverence for myself and others? What might I do this week to help the children grow in their awareness that they are holy?

About the Children

Coming to understand and appreciate the concepts of likeness and difference is important to the cognitive and social development of kindergarteners. Five- and six-year-olds are usually able to make comparisons by focusing on only one feature at a time. For example, they can look at eye color and identify who has eyes that are "like" their own. Identifying whose eyes are "different" from theirs would be another cognitive step. Even a larger cognitive leap would be to make comparisons between two features at the same time. Very few kindergarteners would find success if asked to understand that their friend can be "like" them because their hair is brown and at the same time "different" from them because their eyes are blue.

A Few Suggestions ...

As a teacher of kindergarteners, one of your goals should be providing the children with a successful experience in developing the important concepts of likeness and difference. To put the children on the road to success in this developmental task, start by making comparisons using one obvious feature, such as gender, and have all the children who are the same gender stand together. Continue to focus on likeness with other features before moving on to the concept of difference and then compare only one feature at a time. Expect children of this age to vary in their ability to grasp these concepts of likeness and difference. They will need ample opportunity to practice growing in their ability to develop and successfully use these concepts.

Chen's Gift

As Chen and his mother were driving home from school, she noticed that he was very quiet. She looked over and saw that he had a sad face. "Why are you feeling so sad today, my son?" she asked.

Chen sniffled and tried not to cry. "Today in school, Sam built a tower higher than anyone else with his blocks. Mrs. Hernandez said it was an excellent tower and we should all look at it. Then we were painting, and Mrs. Hernandez held up Emma's picture to show us." Chen stopped talking and got very quiet.

His mother slowly pulled the car over and parked. She turned off the motor and looked at him. "Chen, look at me. Are you feeling sad because your friends can do so many wonderful things?" she asked.

"It's just that I can't paint or build things like they can. I think everyone likes them better than me," he sniffled.

Chen's mother spoke gently. "Everyone has special talents. Some of us are good at building or painting. But we are not good at everything. You have a special talent too. Do you know what it is?"

"No." he answered.

"Well, I happen to think you are very good at playing with your sister, Lucy. You make her smile and you calm her when she is frightened. You are an excellent big brother. God gave you that special gift."

Chen raised his head a bit and smiled, "I am good at that, aren't I? Hey Mom, let's go. I want to get home and play with Lucy!"

Day One

Lesson Objective

Recall the story, "Chen's Gift."



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area. Invite the children to do the movements that go along with the song.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 2 to review with the children the song, "It Is Good!" This is the song that the children learned in Chapter 1.



Teach

Introduce the story.

- Remind the children that last week they learned that Jesus invited the children to come to him. He blessed them and told the people how special children are to God.
- Invite the children to listen to a story about a boy named Chen. Tell them to listen carefully to discover what Chen's gift is.

Tell the story.

Refer to the teaching poster or the cover of the children's leaflet as you read the story "Chen's Gift."

Recall the story.

- Help the children recall the key details of the story. Ask:
 - —Why is Chen upset when his mom picks him up from school? (Chen is upset because his friends were better at some things at school than he was.)
 - —What special gift or talent does Sam have? (building with blocks)
 - —What is Emma's special gift or talent? (Emma is good at painting.)
 - —What is Chen's special gift or talent? (Chen is good at playing with his little sister.)
- Ask the children to name a special gift or talent they have. Point out the gifts and talents of children who have a difficult time thinking of one on their own. Tell the children that each one of them is special.
- Conclude by saying, "God loves us and gives us many gifts.
 These gifts show us that we are special to God."



Work on the children's leaflet activity.

- Distribute the children's leaflets and have the children open them. Direct their attention to the left page and read aloud the title and text, "God Created Me. I am a child of God. God always loves me."
- Talk with the children about all the people who love them.
 Summarize by saying, "God loves you too. God will always love you."
- Have the children look at the pictures of the children on the page. Ask the children to tell you something they remember about each of the children. Ask:
 - —What are some things these children like to do?
 - —Which of these things are the same things you like to do?
- Direct the children's attention to the page on the right.
 Read aloud the text, "God's love makes me special. God gives me many gifts. These gifts show God's love for me."
 Point out some things that you have come to know that make each child special.
- Ask the children how it makes them feel to be so special to God.
- Read the rebus aloud. Let the children help you by naming each picture as you come to it.
- Read the rebus again and have the children use these gestures or your own ideas as you read the rebus:
 - -heart (Hold hands over heart.)
 - -hands (Hold hands up with palms out.)
 - -ears (Cup hands over ears.)
 - -mouth (Invite children to laugh aloud with you.)

Connect with the child's life.

Tell the children to take their leaflet home. Encourage them to share the story "Chen's Gift" and the activities with their family.





- Gather the children in the prayer center.
- Introduce the prayer by inviting a child to come up and open the Bible on the prayer table to the place marked by the bookmark, Psalm 139:14. Explain to the children that they will pray the words of a prayer from the Bible aloud after you.
- Invite the children to quiet themselves for prayer, using the breathing gestures. (Pause.)
- Lead the children in prayer. Begin with the Sign of the Cross.

Teacher: I praise you, God, so wonderfully you made me. (Based on Psalm 139:14.)

Children: Echo the words of the prayer.

Teacher: | praise you . . .

Children: Echo the words of the prayer.

Teacher: Together let us pray, "Amen."

All: Amen.

Day Two

Lesson Objective

Recall that God created everyone good.



Gather

Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area. Invite the children to do the movements that go along with the song.



Teach

- Display the teaching poster or the cover of the children's leaflet and help the children recall the story "Chen's Gift."
- Ask the children:
- —Why was Chen feeling sad? (He was feeling sad because his friends at school were better at some things than Chen was.)
- —What made Chen feel better? (Chen's mom pointed out that Chen was very good at playing with his little sister.)
- Praise the children for remembering so well.

Day Two continued



Create paper plate faces.

- Explain to the children that they are unique. Explain the meaning of the word unique. Then say it aloud again and have them repeat it aloud several times after you. Tell them that one way for them to show that they are unique is to draw the features of their face on a paper plate.
- Give a paper plate to each child. If possible, provide other materials that are easily available for making details in the drawing, such as plastic eyes or varn for hair.
- You might wish to provide a mirror so that the children can look closely at the details of their face.
- Invite the children to share their "face" with the rest of the group. Summarize by telling the children that God created each of us special.

Connect with the child's life.

Have the children bring their paper plate faces home and share them with their family and friends. Encourage them to tell their families that God created each of us special.



- Gather the children in the prayer center. Invite them to quiet themselves for prayer. (Pause.) Invite the children to think about how wonderful and good God is. Then invite them to imitate your gestures as you slowly breathe in and out and raise and lower your extended arms.
- Lead the children in praying the Day One prayer.

Day Three

Lesson Objective

Understand that God loves all people equally.



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area. Invite the children to do the movements that go along with the song.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 2 to review with the children the song, "It Is Good!" This is the song that the children learned in Chapter 1.



Teach

- Show the children the character punch-outs or the inside of the children's leaflet. Ask the children:
 - —Which person is like you?
 - -Which person is not like you?
- Help the children by giving them an example, such as, "I am like Chen because we both have straight hair." Or, "I am not like Marcos because he has brown eyes and I have blue eyes."

Praise the children for their responses.



Apply

Play the game Stand Up.

- Invite the children to play a game with you to help them see that some things about each of them are the same and some things about them are different from one another.
- Nave the children stand up when you name something that they think tells about them. Have the children sit down if you say something that they do not think tells about them. You may wish to use this list or one of your own. Make sure that each child will be able to stand up for several of the statements.

Say, "Stand up if you . . .

- -have red hair."
- -have ten toes."
- -are a fast runner "

- -like to paint."
- —like to sing."
- -wear glasses."
- —like to go swimming."
- —like to play the drums."
- —like to make things."
 - -are five years old."
 - -are six years old."
 - —are a child of God."

Connect to the child's life.

- Ask or invite responses to these questions:
 - —What is one way we are like one another?
 - -What is one way we are different from each other?
- Thank the children for their responses. Summarize by reminding them that although all people are not exactly the same, God loves all of us the same, or equally. Invite them to tell a family member that God loves everyone in the family equally.



- Gather the children in the prayer center. Invite them to quiet themselves for prayer. (Pause) Invite the children to think about how wonderful and good God is. Then invite them to imitate your gestures as you slowly breathe in and out and raise and lower your extended arms.
- Lead the children in praying the Day One prayer.

Day Four

Lesson Objective

Recognize that everyone is a child of God.



Gather

- Play the gathering song to signal that it is time to move to the Story Time Area. Invite the children to do the movements that go along with the song.
- Use the RCL Benziger Stories of God's Love Kindergarten program Music CD and companion Songbook, Song 2 to review with the children the song, "It Is Good!" This is the song that the children learned in Chapter 1.



- Show the children the teaching poster or the cover of the children's leaflet. Ask the children what Chen's special gift or talent is.
- Remind the children that God gives us all special talents or gifts. Explain that when we use our gifts to help others, we are living as a child of God.
- Ask the children to recall their special talents or gifts that they mentioned on Day One.



Create an "I am a Child of God" poster.

- Provide crayons, markers and pieces of art paper on which you have printed, "______ is a Child of God" at the bottom.
- Ask the children to take a sheet of art paper. Read aloud the words to the children and have them write their name on the blank line.
- Ask the children to draw a picture of themselves in the space above the words.
- Gather the drawings as the children complete them and create an "I am a Child of God" collage and display it in the classroom for all to see.

Connect with the child's life.

Ask the children to tell the members of their family and their friends that they are a child of God and God loves them.



Pray

- Gather the children in the prayer center. Invite them to quiet themselves for prayer. (Pause.) Invite the children to think about how wonderful and good God is. Then invite them to imitate your gestures as you slowly breathe in and out and raise and lower your extended arms.
- Lead the children in praying the Day One prayer.
