God the Father

CHAPTER BACKGROUND



Look at the birds in the sky; they do not sow or reap, they gather nothing into barns, yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are not you more important than they?

Matthew 6:26

God the Father

The fatherhood of God is a frequent theme throughout the Scriptures. God became known in the Hebrew Bible as the father of the Israelite people, the Israelites as God's children. During the Egyptian sojourn, the description of God was broadened from father to father and king. In the New Testament, Jesus transforms this image of God, inviting humanity to address God as Abba, an affectionate term for father. In doing so, Jesus invites all God's people into an intimate relationship with his Father.

God, a Loving Parent

Young children reach out to parents or caregivers for comfort and answers. Consumed with worry, afraid of the unknown, in need of answers, adult Christians seek someone to care for them, too. Jesus invites his followers to reach out to their heavenly Father. He summons them to pray to the Father for all they need and to trust in his loving care.

A good parent's love is steadfast. Good parents go to great lengths to protect their children and are willing to sacrifice themselves to meet their children's needs. God, our heavenly Father, loves each and every person with a love beyond that of any human parent. He loves his children unconditionally. He invites his children to rely on him, to trust in him as a loving father. He invites them to experience the depth of his love.

TEACHING CHAPTER 4

Images of God the Father

The images of God the Father that you may have formed as a child probably included an old man with gray hair and a beard. As you have become more knowledgeable, you no longer need a photographic image. You have come to appreciate God the Father as your loving parent because that is how Jesus revealed him.

- Jesus called God Father. The word he used was Abba. The relationship that exists between Jesus and the Father is one of filial love.
- Jesus spoke about his Father and obeyed his Father. According to Luke 2:49, Jesus said to Mary and Joseph, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?"
- Recall the obedience of Jesus on the night before he died as he prayed, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done" (Luke 22:42). Jesus came to do the will of the Father. Jesus wants all people to know that his Father is their Father and that he loves and cares for them

more than they

can ever

imagine.

Father John Bosco found the boys cold and in the dark. He brought them home. They told Father John that many other children lived alone on the streets.

"I will start a home for the children of the streets. I will teach them how to read, fix things, and pray," said Father John.

Father John helped many children who were homeless to feel loved. He taught them that God is everyone's Father. After he died, he was named a saint.

TEACHER BACKGROUND

Holy People The Church solemnly proclaims some holy men and women as saints because they practiced great virtue and devotion. Their holiness makes them models of Christian life and intercessors with God on our behalf. (See Catechism of the Catholic Church, #828.)



TEACHER BACKGROUND

Saint John Bosco was born in 1815 in Piedmont, Italy, and died in 1888. He had great compassion for the homeless boys he observed on the streets. He gave them a home, educated them, and taught them a trade. His mother helped him by providing a home for girls. He is the founder of the Salesian order of priests, brothers, and sisters who sponsor Catholic schools throughout the United States.

God the Father

Father John Bosco treated the young children like they were his own. He showed them love and taught them about God. like Jesus did.

Jesus taught about his Father's great love. God cares for everything and everyone. God loves you as a good parent does.



Have volunteers read aloud the first two paragraphs.

- Remind children that Jesus taught people about his Father's love.
- Explain that God loves them the way a good parent loves a child. Tell them that God will always care for them.
- · Proclaim the Scripture.
- · Explain that this passage is from the Old Testament, God made this promise before Jesus was born.
- How do you know that God cares for vou? Have children discuss the question.

- · Have children discuss some ways that God cares for them.
- · Divide the group into pairs. Have each pair talk about ways they can thank God.
- · Have children trace their hand and write a thank-you note to God on the outline of their hand.

Remind children that God the Father loves us the way a good parent does. Jesus' life was an example of his Father's love

Poster Frame Have children cut out the outlines of their hands that they traced. Invite each child to paste his or her hand around the outer edge of a poster board, forming a frame.

Heavenly Father Christians can call God Father because they are his adopted children by virtue of Baptism and the anointing of the Holy Spirit.

- This scripture passage calls Christians to rely on God the Father for what they need.
- Jesus acknowledges that humans do have needs, but people should not become obsessed with meeting them.

Trust in God

Jesus always called God "Father." You call God "Father" because he created you and cares for you. Jesus told his followers to pray to the Father for whatever they might need. In your prayer, you will be speaking to God the Father as Jesus did.

Iesus knew that you can always trust God. You can be sure that God loves you and wants what is best for you. God, your loving Father, is always listening.

Wends of Faith

Prayer is talking to and listening to God. To trust is to believe

in and depend on someone.

- Connect Your Faitl Write An Asking Prayer Write down some of the things that you and others need. God our Father. Amen.

Trust in God

Ask children what they think it means when you trust someone.

- · Choose volunteers to read aloud the two paragraphs on this page.
- · Explain to children that when we pray, we talk to God the Father just as Jesus did. Discuss with children things that people pray about.

- · Discuss with children something that they need. Remind them that a need is different from a want.
- · Read aloud the directions for the activity. Allow time for children to complete it.
- Invite volunteers to pray aloud their prayers to the group. Have the group respond with "Lord, hear our praver."

Remind children that Jesus told us that we can call God Our Father. Explain that God the Father always gives us what we need and what is best for us.

OPTIONAL ACTIVITY

Trust Walk Have children work in pairs. Tell one child in each pair to close his or her eyes. Ask the other child to lead the partner around the room. Remind children that they must keep their eves closed.

· Connect the experience with trusting God who wants only what is good for his people.

Family Explain to children that as members of the Body of Christ, Catholics have a duty to assist those whose basic needs are not being met. Christians have an obligation to help others unless they have such a scarcity of their own resources that it is impossible to do so. Ask children to give examples of how they can help those in need.

When you love or respect someone, you have trust in that person. You believe that the person will do what is best for you. You know you can depend on that person in good times and bad times.

You can trust

- family members to love you and take care of you
- your friends to play fair and treat you kindly
- teachers to help you learn
- crossing auards and police officers to protect you
- members of your parish family to help you grow closer to God.

Sometimes, people you trust may let you down, even though they do not mean to. But you can always depend on God. You are his child. He is with you every day. You can trust God to love you, to care for you, and to give you what you need.


