The symbols of the sacrament of baptism tell us what the sacrament means.

You have **godparents** because your parents need lots of support and guidance to raise you as a Christian. This is not a job to be done alone!

When you were baptized, the presider made the **Sign of the Cross** on your forehead. Your parents and godparents did the same. This reminds us that we are all followers of Jesus.

Then everyone listened to the **Word of God** and offered prayers that we would all be faithful followers of the Gospel.

After listening to God's Word, a **Litany of the Saints** might have been sung to remind us that all the wise and holy people who have gone before us support us in our desire to be Christians. Next we prayed you would be protected from all evil and harm. The presider anointed you with the **Oil of Catechumens**



as a sign of strength. Since oil stains can be permanent, the oil also reminds us of the mark of God's love that stays on our souls forever. God will never abandon us, even if we forget about God.

The presider then blessed the water that would be poured over your head. He asked if you rejected sin and accepted faith. These are called our **baptismal promises**. If you were baptized as a baby, your parents and godparents answered

Renewing My Baptismal Promises


Leader: Do you say "no" to sin? Response: I do. Leader: Do you believe in God the Father, Jesus, his only-begotten Son, the Holy Spirit, and the Church? Response: I do.

The most important moment of your baptism was when the presider poured **water** over your forehead and baptized you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

COPYRIGHT © 2013, LIGUORI PUBLICATIONS Then you were given a **candle**. This candle is lit from the paschal (or Easter) candle. The paschal candle is the symbol of Jesus our Light. The baptismal candle reminds us that Jesus is our Light, and we should bring his light to the world.

The presider then pointed out the **white garment** you were wearing. This garment reminds us of the new life we all have in Jesus.

Each one of us is unique and special to God. God knows each one of us by our name. God told the prophet Isaiah how very, very precious each one of us is. This is what God said to the people:
