

The Gospels tell many stories about Jesus sharing meals. He ate with people like Zacchaeus, who was a tax collector. Tax collectors were Jewish men who worked for the Romans. They often cheated the

Jewish people by taking more tax money. They kept the extra money for themselves. That made them very unpopular.

Many Jewish people thought Jesus shouldn't eat with sinners. Jesus came to save *all* people. He loves all of us. He shares his Body and Blood with us in the **Eucharist**. Go to page 22 of your Catechism handbook to learn more about the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Eucharist

The word Eucharist means "thanksgiving." Gathering with your church family for the Eucharist is a lot like gathering with your family for Thanksgiving. You remember important stories, give thanks, and share a nourishing meal.

The Eucharist is the heart of the Church's life. Jesus offered

the sacrifice of his life once on the Cross. When we celebrate the Eucharist, he pours out the graces of salvation over and over again. The sacrifice of the Mass is offered for the whole Church, the living and the dead. Jesus' Death on the Cross makes up for our sins. It gives us every kind of goodness and blessing.

The Mass

The prayers and actions of the Mass make up one great prayer, one awesome act of worship. The Mass has two main parts.

I. The Liturgy of the Word

- We listen to the Word of God from Scripture, or the Bible.
- We say the Creed together. Remember, the Creed is the statement of what the Church believes and teaches.

II. The Liturgy of the Eucharist

- We offer bread and wine. The bread is made from wheat and the wine is made from grapes.
- We thank God for all of his blessings, especially the gift of Jesus, his Son.

 The priest consecrates the bread and wine. With the blessing of the Holy Spirit, the priest says the words of Jesus at the Last Supper.

"For this is my Body, which will be given up for you."

"For this is the chalice of my Blood, the Blood of the new and eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many."

The bread and wine truly become the Body and Blood of Christ.

• We receive Jesus in Holy Communion. We welcome Jesus into our body and soul. Jesus is so close to us. Jesus is so happy to be with us.

For Catechists and Teachers

Scripture Background

In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus enters the life and home of Zacchaeus, who is a cheater and sinner in the eyes of his neighbors. He was not only a tax collector and therefore an agent of the Romans, but he also regularly cheated his fellow Jews. Jesus doesn't focus on Zacchaeus's sinful past; he is concerned with his change of heart. Jesus came to gather all people into his love.

Connecting Scripture and Doctrine

The Gospels tell many stories about Jesus sharing meals. He ate with people like Zacchaeus, who was a tax collector. Tax collectors were Jewish men who worked for the Romans. They often cheated the Jewish people by taking extra tax money. Many Jewish people thought Jesus shouldn't eat with sinners, but he came to save *all* people. He shares his Body and Blood with us in the Eucharist.

"The movement of return to God, called conversion and repentance, entails sorrow for and abhorrence of sins committed, and the firm purpose of sinning no more in the future" (*CCC*, 1490). "Those who receive the Eucharist are united more closely to Christ. Through it Christ unites them to all the faithful in one body—the Church" (*CCC*, 1396).

Sharing the Lesson with Families

Encourage parents to invite their child to share the Gospel story using the pictures in their booklet. Suggest that parents ask their child what he or she learned about the Mass.



Teaching This Week's Lesson

Share Experiences

Objectives • The children will:

- Identify different types of invitations.
- Identify activities friends do together.

Gather in a prayer circle. Play and sing "Come and Follow Me" (CD-2, #14).

Gathering Prayer Invite a child to point to the current Sunday on a Church Year calendar. Pray: "Jesus, we want to follow you. Help us learn your teachings and follow your way. Help us to share your Good News with others." The children respond, "Amen."

Activity • Who Invites Me? Move to an open area. Brainstorm ideas of things children are invited to do. Organize the children into pairs. Each pair will act out a type of invitation. The class will guess what is being acted out.

Continue until each pair has had a chance to present its mime. Ask: Which invitation is the most exciting to receive?

Activity • What Does Friendship Look Like?

(page 2) Distribute *Good News* and pencils. Direct the children to turn to page 2 and find the activity at the top of the page. Read aloud the title and instructions and give the children time to solve the puzzle: *help, play, study, hike, laugh, talk, eat, pray.* Ask: Who has invited you to do one of these activities today?

Discover Gospel and Doctrine

Objectives • The children will:

- Recognize that Jesus came to save sinners.
- Recognize the parts of the Mass.

Play and sing "Gospel Acclamation" (CD-2, #24) as preparation for the proclamation of the Gospel.

Sunday Gospel • Jesus Invites Himself to

Dinner Gather in the Gospel area. Sunday's Gospel is told with images in the booklet the children will make later in the session. Tell the Gospel story:

One day, Jesus came to the town of Jericho. A rich tax collector named Zacchaeus wanted to see him. But Zacchaeus was a short man, and he couldn't see Jesus because of the crowd. He climbed up a sycamore tree so he could see Jesus.

When Jesus reached the sycamore tree, he looked up at Zacchaeus and said: "Zacchaeus, come down quickly. I want to stay at your home today." Zacchaeus hurried down and welcomed Jesus into his home.

The people grumbled, saying, "Zacchaeus is a sinner, and Jesus is going to his home to eat with him."

Later that day, Zacchaeus said to Jesus: "I will give half of my belongings to the poor. I will pay back four times as much to anyone I have ever cheated."

Because Zacchaeus was sorry for his sins and was making things right, Jesus said: "You and your family have been saved. I came to find and save those who were lost."

Give the children a short time to think about the story. Then invite them to retell it. Be sure they understand that Jesus invited Zacchaeus to get to know him and that Zacchaeus changed his life because of Jesus.

Connecting Gospel and Doctrine

(page 4) Direct the children to turn to page 4. Read the title "Jesus Is a Friend to All" and invite two strong readers to read aloud the two paragraphs.

Refer back to the last lesson and the discussion of sin and virtue. The people grumbled about Jesus eating at Zacchaeus's home because Zacchaeus was a sinner.

Refer back to the first paragraph on page 30 in your Catechism handbook. Ask: What are the three things that make something a sin? It is wrong. We know it is wrong. We choose to do it anyway. **Ask:** Who here has ever done something wrong that you knew was wrong and chose to do it anyway? All hands should be raised, *yours included.* That means every one of us is a sinner, and so were the people who grumbled about Jesus eating with Zacchaeus.

Ask: Whom did Jesus come to save? Sinners. People who are lost. All people. Ask: What does Jesus share with us that helps us stay close to him and try not to sin? His Body and Blood in the Eucharist.

Catholic Faith Word • Eucharist (page 4) Read the definition of Eucharist. Ask: Has your mom or dad ever said, "You eat so many (French fries, chicken nuggets, other favorite food) that you're going to turn into one"? Reread the last line of the definition of *Eucharist*. Tell the children that they are never going to turn into a French fry or chicken nugget, but Jesus gives us his Body and Blood in the Eucharist so that we *will* become more like him.

Activity • Stretch and Sing The children have been sitting for a long time. Invite them to get up and sway, stretch, and sing along to "You've Got to Love Them" (CD-2, #20). Point out that Jesus loves all people. If we want to follow Jesus, he asks us to love all people too.

What the Church Believes and Teaches

The Mass: The Liturgy of the Eucharist (page 22)

Review what the children learned about the Eucharist in the 9/18 lesson. **Ask:** What

are the four parts of most special family meals? *Gathering, sharing stories, sharing a special meal, and going home*. Print these in a column on the board. **Ask:** What does the word *Eucharist* mean? *Thanksgiving*. **Ask:** What is another name we use for the Eucharist? *Mass, also Jesus' Body and Blood in Holy Communion*.

Print Liturgy of the Word, Concluding Rites, Liturgy of the Eucharist, and Introductory Rites in a column next to the meal column. Invite volunteers to match each part of a meal to its similar part of the Mass. Rewrite the Mass parts in their correct order: Introductory Rites, Liturgy of the Word, Liturgy of the Eucharist, Concluding Rites.

Ask: What are the two main parts of the Mass? *Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist*. **Ask:** What stories do we share during the Liturgy of the Word? *Stories of God's people and Jesus from the Bible*.

Prepare six cards in advance of your session. Each card should contain one of the bulleted sections from page 22 of the Catechism handbook. Give the cards to six volunteers and direct them to take turns reading the cards aloud. Invite the other children to tell when in the Mass that part comes—Liturgy of the Word or Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Direct the six children to stand in the order their parts come in the Mass. The other children may help them by looking at page 22 in their Catechism handbooks. When the six children are in the correct order, invite them to read their cards again. Emphasize the parts of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Encourage them to pay attention to the flow of the Mass and notice the different parts.

Invite the children to stand and fold their hands in prayer. Explain that we can use music to pray. Play "Come, Do This in Memory of Me" (CD-1, #20) and invite the children to listen to the words and use them as a prayer.

Have the children close the *What the Church Believes and Teaches* handbooks and return to *Good News*, pages 1–4.

Live the Gospel

Objective The children will relate Jesus' meal with Zacchaeus to the holy meal of the Eucharist.

Activity • Eucharist Booklet (pages 1–4) Direct the children to turn to their copies of *Good News*. Distribute scissors and demonstrate how to open *Good News*, cut on the black cutting line, and nest the two pieces together to make a booklet. Tell them to use the page numbers to help them put the pages together in the right order. Distribute crayons.

Read aloud the booklet title and page through the booklet together. Continue with each page, giving the children time to talk about the page, read the Gospel, and color the pictures and answer the questions as indicated.

Closing Prayer Gather in the prayer circle. **Pray:** "Jesus, we thank you for loving us and sharing your Body and Blood with us in the Eucharist. We know you are a friend to all people. Help us to love all people too." The children respond, "Amen."



People who are lost. All people.* **Ask:** What does Jesus share with us that helps us stay close to him and try not to sin? *His Body and Blood in the Eucharist.*

Ask: What are the two main parts of the Mass? *Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist.* **Ask:** What stories do we share during the Liturgy of the Word? *Stories of God's people and Jesus from the Bible.* Next time you are at Mass, encourage your child to pay attention to the flow of the Mass and notice the different parts.

Once you have completed this section of the lesson, close the handbook and return to Good News, pages 2-3.

Live the Gospel

- □ Activity Eucharist Booklet (pages 2–3) Have your child open *Good News* and lay it flat. Show how to cut on the black cutting line, and nest the two pieces together to make a booklet. Your child can use the page numbers to help put the pages together in the right order. Read aloud the booklet title and page through the booklet together. Continue with each page, giving your child time to talk about the page, read the Gospel, color the pictures and answer the questions as indicated.
- Closing Prayer "Jesus, we thank you for loving us and sharing your Body and Blood with us in the Eucharist. We know you are a friend to all people. Help us to love all people too. Amen."

Understanding the Liturgy of the Eucharist

The Liturgy of the Eucharist is the part of the Mass when we receive Jesus in Holy Communion. During the Liturgy of the Eucharist, we share the Sign of Peace. Before we receive Holy Communion, we offer each other a sign of friendship.
