The original editions of the *Our Holy Faith* series textbooks were published between 1959 and 1964. They were compiled by many different authors over the course of several years. Consequently, the texts varied in their organization from year to year, with similar sections appearing with different names throughout the series and often in varying sequences.

For greater ease of use and consistency, we have reorganized each book so that the Catechism lessons, tests, and other exercises are placed at the end of each relevant chapter or lesson. We have also included answer keys for your convenience in the back of each book.

While the teachings in the original editions remain relevant due to the enduring truths of our Faith, it was necessary to update other aspects in order to more accurately reflect the Church today. These new editions have been revised to incorporate some of the changes to the practices of the Catholic Church.

To the extent possible, we have adapted the text to reflect both the ordinary and extraordinary forms of the Mass and liturgical calendars. In addition to these updates, we have inserted, where relevant to the text, traditional prayers and quotes from the Bible, the Catechism, and the saints

LESSON 1

LESSON 2

God Teaches Us How to Gain Heaven

When Jesus was here, He wanted everyone to know and love His Father in heaven. That is why He taught many things about His heavenly Father to the people of the Holy Land. Jesus also taught them the things that they must do to know, love, and serve His heavenly Father.



Do you know what Jesus did so people would not forget the things that He taught? Jesus started the Catholic Church. He wanted His Church to teach the same things that He taught.

Today the Catholic Church teaches us what God wants us to know. It teaches us everything we must know and do to get to heaven. This is why we say that we learn to know, love, and serve God from Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who is the head of the Catholic Church.

Jesus taught us many things when He was here on earth. He taught these things first to His Apostles. The Apostles were the twelve men Jesus chose to help Him start the Catholic Church. They were the first priests and bishops of the Church.

The Apostles taught everything that Jesus told them. The chief things Jesus taught were put in a prayer by the Apostles. We find the chief truths taught by Jesus Christ through the Catholic Church in the Apostles' Creed. A creed is a short prayer which announces the most essential beliefs of Catholics and all Christians.

When we study the truths of the Apostles' Creed, we learn how great, wise, and good God is. We also learn about His wonderful love for all His children. If we know God well, we will love and serve Him in this life. We will love all His children too, near and far. Then when we die, we will live with Him forever in heaven.

LESSON 3

Jesus Helps Us Know, Love, and Serve God

Jack was trying to climb a wall. He could not do it. Do you know what he did? He asked his friend to help him. With his friend's help, Jack was able to climb the wall.

We are like Jack. We need help too. We need help to know God's truths. We need help to love and serve God. We need help to get to heaven. Who can give us the help that we need? Only Jesus, our best Friend. He will help us. He will give us help to know, love, and serve God. This help is called grace.

What is grace? Grace is a gift from God. It makes our souls holy. It helps us to do what God wants. We can enter deeper into a life of grace through prayer and the faithful reception of the sacraments.

There are two sacraments which give us much grace to know, love, and serve God. We know them already. They are the

sacraments we receive when we go to confession and Holy Communion. They are called Penance and Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist. They are very important. Let us review what we know just to be sure.

LESSON 4

Penance and Reconciliation—A Cure for Sick Souls

On the first Easter Sunday night, the Apostles were gathered in a big room. All at once Jesus stood before them. Do you know what He said? He said, "Peace be with you." Then Jesus breathed on His Apostles and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them." With these words Jesus gave the Apostles power to forgive sin. This is how Jesus gave us the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

What is the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation? It is the sacrament which takes away our sins. It is the sacrament we receive when we go to confession.

Why did Jesus give us the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation? Many, many times while Jesus was on earth, sinners

came to Him. Some were sorry for their sins. They asked Jesus to forgive them. Jesus forgave them their sins.

Jesus knew that after He went back to heaven, people would still sin. They would need His help to be good again. That is why He gave us the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

If we commit a very bad sin (mortal sin), we know that we have rejected God's saving grace. A good confession will take away sin and reconcile us back with God. Jesus comes with His grace to live in our souls, and through confession we receive him fully back into our lives. If we confess our sins to a priest, our souls will be holy and pleasing to God again.

Venial sin is a different kind of sin than mortal sin. It does not stop saving grace from reaching our souls, but it does make us less pleasing to God. It shows we do not love God as He deserves to be loved, for God calls all of us to perfection.

Each time we receive the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, Jesus does something more than take away our sins. He gives us grace to be good. He helps us love Him as we should.

Jesus wants us to go to confession often. If we do, it will help us to live good, holy lives and get to heaven when we die.



It is called the sacrament of conversion because it makes sacramentally present Jesus' call to conversion, the first step in returning to the Father from whom one has strayed by sin.

LESSON 5

How to Receive the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation Worthily

Each time I receive the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, there are five things that I must do.

 I must think of my sins. I must try as hard as I can to think of my sins since my last confession. The Holy Spirit will help me think of my sins. He will help me make a good confession if I ask Him for His help.

When I think of my sins, I will find out my mortal sins first, if I have any. Then I should find out my venial sins. I do this by going over the Ten Commandments and the laws of the Church.

I must not only think of my sins, but I must, insofar as I am capable, also know how many times I have committed each sin.

2. I must be sorry for my sins. My sins have offended God. I must make a good act of contrition to tell God that I am sorry. To have "contrition" means to be sorry for, and regret, the sins we have committed. If I am not sorry, my sins will not be forgiven. Being sorry for my sins, being contrite, is the most important part of my confession.

- 3. *I must make up my mind not to sin again.* I must genuinely intend not to sin again in the future. In relation to this, I must intend to stay away from those persons, places, or things that lead me into sin.
- 4. *I must tell my sins to the priest.* When I tell my sins I should remember that the priest is taking our Lord's place here on earth. I am really telling my sins to Jesus.
- 5. *I must do or say my penance.* The priest gives me a penance for my sins. This penance makes up for some of the punishment for my sins. I must do or say the penance the priest gives me after I leave the confessional.

Our souls are like a bright sun after we have been to confession. They are free from sin. They are holy and pleasing to God. God dwells in them.

What to Do and Say in the Confessional

- 1. Kneel down and say, "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. My last confession was (days, weeks, or months) ago."
- 2. Tell your sins. Tell the mortal sins first, if you have any. Then tell your venial sins. Tell the sin and the number of times you committed it.
- 3. When you are finished telling your sins, say, "This is all I can remember, I am sorry for these and all of my sins."
- 4. Father will then talk to you or ask you some questions.
- 5. After Father gives you your penance, say the Act of Contrition. Then leave the confessional and say your prayers. Though you may use your own words to express an Act of Contrition, the following is a formal prayer that is especially good for those learning how to say an Act of Contrition:

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins, because of Thy just punishments, but most of all because they offend Thee, my God, who art all-good and

deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Thy grace, to sin no more and to avoid the near occasions of sin.
