

Your Grade 5 Saint: Saint Ignatius of Loyola

Christ In Us offers a saint for every grade. As you journey through each unit, remember to pray to your grade's saint. Ask him or her to help guide you to be closer to Jesus Christ.

Saint Ignatius of Loyola was born in the Basque country of Spain in 1491 and was the youngest of thirteen children. Ignatius' mother died soon after his birth.

In his youth, Ignatius developed a passion for military life and enjoyed dressing up as a soldier. He joined the army at the age of 17.

Ignatius was a fearless soldier and participated in many battles without injury. His bravery and leadership were recognized by the royal family of his region, and he soon became an important leader.

But Ignatius' streak of good fortune came to an end in 1521, when he was seriously hurt at the Battle of Pamplona. He was hit by a cannonball, injuring his legs. He would limp for the rest of his life. The military career in which Ignatius took so much pride had come to an end.

The injury, however, set the stage for a religious conversion. During the time his legs were healing, Ignatius read Scripture and books about the lives of saints.

In 1522 Ignatius traveled to a monastery, where he confessed his sins. He placed his sword at the altar of the Virgin Mary as a sign that he would now be a soldier for Jesus Christ.

At the age of 48, Ignatius formed the Society of Jesus. It is a religious order better known as the Jesuits. Ignatius wanted the Jesuits to travel around the world as missionaries. He wanted to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ by establishing schools, colleges, and seminaries.



How do we know God?

od has planted in every human heart the desire to know him. God reveals himself to us so that we can share in his life and love. We come to know who God is when we read and listen to Sacred Scripture. We know God when we celebrate and take part in the holy sacrifice of the Mass. God reveals himself to us through Sacred Scripture and in Sacred Tradition. He reveals himself to us most fully in his Son, Jesus.

God is truth and love.

God created us out of love. He gave each of us the desire to know our purpose in life and to discover life's truth and meaning. God never stops calling us to be close to him.

We can never know everything about God or completely understand his plan. God is a **mystery**, which means that he is greater than the human mind's ability to understand. Words alone cannot fully describe who God is. Over time, however, God gradually revealed himself. It is Jesus Christ who fully reveals God to us. He is true God and true man, as we profess in the Creed at Mass. **Divine Revelation** is God's making himself known to us. Through Divine Revelation, we come to know his plan of salvation for all people.

God is the truth that all people seek. God is the love for which all people long. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches that "God's very being is Truth and Love" (*CCC*, 231).

We come to know God most fully through Jesus.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (John 3:16).

This Scripture verse reveals a central truth of Christian faith. God sent his own Son to live among us and to save us. God the Father's love for us is beyond anything we can imagine.

God has never stopped loving us. Even when his people turned away from him, God remained true to his covenant. Jesus Christ is the New Covenant. God fully revealed who he is in Jesus, in whom he has established his covenant forever. God is always faithful, always loving, and always calling us back to himself.

Jesus tells us: "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). We read about the life of Christ in the four Gospels, which begin the New Testament.

The Gospel writers wanted to share their faith with others. They wanted to share the truth revealed to them by Jesus: "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9). At the heart of the Gospels is the revelation that "Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God" (John 20:31).

Every single thing about Jesus' life reveals who God is. Jesus, the Word of God, is the fulfillment of Divine Revelation.

The Church passes on all that she holds true through Scripture, Tradition, and the sacraments.

The Church, with the help of the Holy Spirit, guides and teaches us the truth about who God is. At Mass, we read and listen to Sacred Scripture. In the Eucharist, God reveals the depth of his love for us. For in the Eucharist, Christ offers his sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to his Father. We share in the grace of salvation.

The revelation of the Good News of Jesus Christ as lived out in the Church, past and present, is called **Sacred Tradition**. Sacred Tradition is separate from, but closely connected to, Sacred Scripture. Together Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition

ensure that the authentic revelation of God is passed down to all generations. They shape our faith in Jesus Christ and our life as his disciples.

We especially encounter the Good News of God's love in the Seven Sacraments, which Jesus gave to his Church. Through Sacred Tradition, the Church passes on "to every generation all that she ... is, [and] all that she believes" (*CCC*, 78). In this way, the knowledge of God reaches the ends of the earth.




What Makes Us Catholic?

The things your family does regularly are called family traditions. The word tradition spelled with a small "t" means "customs." Tradition with a capital "T," on the other hand, refers to the authority, words, and deeds of Jesus passed down to his Apostles and their successors, the bishops. The celebration of the sacraments and the official teachings of the Church are examples of big T Tradition, also called Sacred Tradition.

Saint Ignatius was a Spanish soldier. He was badly hurt when he was hit by a cannonball. While he was recovering, he read about Jesus and the saints. Eventually he founded the religious order called the Jesuits. He helped people know God with his book called *Spiritual Exercises*. Saint Ignatius wrote prayers and reflections that we still use. The first Jesuit to be pope was Pope Francis.
