aint Dominic de Guzmán was born in Castile, Spain in 1170 into a wealthy and devout Catholic family with strong ties to the Church. His father was lord of the manor in his village, which meant that he owned most of the land. His uncle was an archbishop.

In 1191, Spain was devastated by famine. At that time, Dominic was studying to become a priest and was not as affected as other families by the hunger and suffering. He did understand the suffering felt by other people and decided to give away his money and sold his clothes, furniture and books to help feed the hungry. Dominic's fellow students asked him why he would do something that left him without almost all he owned. Dominic said, "Would you have me study off these dead skins, when men are dying of hunger?" The "dead skins" Dominic mentioned referred to the clothing people wore, since animal skins were often used to make the clothing, such as coats and hats.

Soon after Dominic was ordained a priest, he saw a need to help preach God's Word in Europe's growing cities. Dominic believed that a new kind of spiritual organization in the Church would help minister to its members through an example of poverty and a system of education. Together with six followers, Dominic began his mission in Toulouse, France.

Dominic believed his group's mission to preach the Gospel depended on a new kind of spirituality for his followers. It was one based on a life of contemplative prayer and penance.

In 1216, Church leaders recognized Dominic's religious organization as The Order of Preachers. They are more commonly known today as the Dominicans.



Lesson 1

How do we know God?

hroughout all of salvation history, God has never stopped inviting us to know him and to share in his life and love. God has revealed himself to us through his covenants, through Sacred Scripture, and through his Son, Jesus Christ. We also come to know God through the Church, to whom Jesus entrusted the power and authority to teach the faith.

Throughout all history God has made himself known to us.

Gradually, God, in his goodness and wisdom, revealed himself to us. Throughout history, God has made known his loving plan of salvation. Salvation history is the account of God's enduring love for us as he reveals who he is in stages and invites us to respond.

God's Revelation began when he created the world and everything in it. We can know who God is through the things that he has created. God is the origin and the end of everything.

God created our first parents, Adam and Eve, in his own image and likeness. From the very beginning, God revealed himself to them. He invited them into relationship with him. Even when they sinned and turned away from him, God never stopped loving them. God's love was so great that he promised them **salvation**. Salvation is the forgiveness of sin and the restoration of relationship with God. He also offered them his **covenant**, a solemn agreement of faithfulness between God and his people.

We find the stories of God's covenants in the Old Testament. The covenants God made with Noah, Abraham, and Moses reveal his faithfulness and love, and show us that he will always be with us. They prepared God's people for Jesus, the new and everlasting covenant. **Faith Words**

God's Covenant with Noah: Genesis 9:9-17

God promised that even if humanity failed him again, he would never send another flood to destroy life on earth. The symbol of this promise was a rainbow. This Scripture account revealed an important religious truth: God's mercy, not death and destruction, will have the final word.

God's Covenant with Abraham: Genesis 17:1–2 God chose Abraham to be the father of his people. By the covenant he established with Abraham, God would give him a son and make a great nation of him.

God's Covenant with Moses: Exodus 19:4–6 God chose Moses to lead his people out of slavery and to guide his people to freedom. Through Moses, God established a personal relationship with the Israelites and revealed his law to them.

The covenants of the Old Testament lead to Jesus. He is the new and everlasting covenant who will lead us to salvation.

"See, days are coming—oracle of the LORD—when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ... I will place my law within them, and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people."

Sacred Scripture is the Word of God.

The word *Scripture* means "holy writings." Sacred Scripture is the Word of God expressed in human words. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, human writers put down on paper what God wanted us to know about himself. They shared the account of God's plan to bring us back to him through Christ Jesus. God is the true author of Sacred Scripture because he inspired its human authors.

The forty-six books of the Old Testament and the twenty-seven books of the New Testament reveal the truth about God's love for us.

The Books of the Bible

The Old Testament

- The Pentateuch is the first five books of the Bible. These books tell the story of Creation, of God revealing himself to his Chosen People and establishing a covenant with them.
- The historical books are sixteen books that tell of how God's people lived the covenant. Sometimes God's people did well, and sometimes they fell short.
- The wisdom books contain wise teachings about the covenant with God. There are seven wisdom books.
- The prophetic books contain the words of the prophets. These eighteen books call God's people to be faithful to the covenant. They also remind the people that God has always been faithful to them.

The New Testament

- The Gospels have at their center Jesus Christ. In the four Gospels we encounter the mystery of Christ's life, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension.
- The Acts of the Apostles recounts the life of the early Church.
- The New Testament letters, also known as the thirteen Epistles, were written by Saint Paul. In them we read about the Christian faith and how to live as followers of Jesus.
- The Catholic Epistles are eight additional letters that teach about our faith.
- The Book of Revelation is the final book in the Bible. It anticipates the end times and encourages Christians to remain faithful to God, even when it is difficult or dangerous to do so.

Your class will be organized into two groups: one to discuss the Old Testament and one to discuss the New Testament. Work with your group to create clues about your section of the Bible. Write the clues on index cards, and use them to play a trivia game with the whole class.



What Makes Us Catholic?

Not all Bibles are alike. Catholic Bibles have seven more books than other Christian Bibles. These books are called deuterocanonical. They are all in the Old Testament and contain accounts of God's interactions with the people of Israel. At first, all Christians used the same books. Then some Christians left these books out of the canon, or the official list of the books of the Bible, because they were not written in Hebrew. Catholics kept them in, believing them to be inspired by the Holy Spirit. These seven books are Tobit, Judith, Wisdom, Sirach, Baruch, I Maccabees, and 2 Maccabees.

Jesus is the fullness of Divine Revelation.

After the Fall, when Adam and Eve turned away from God, he did not give up on humanity. Instead, God began to gather his people to himself. The covenants God made with Noah, Abraham, and Moses were God's response to the chaos caused by sin. God told his people: "I will take you as my own people, and I will be your God; and you will know that I, the LORD, am your God" (Exodus 6:7).

The People of Israel often struggled to keep God's covenant. Through his prophets, God assured them that even though they often failed him, he had a plan for their salvation. A **New Covenant** would replace the old. This New Covenant would last forever.

In the Gospels, we encounter Jesus Christ, who tells his disciples at the Last Supper: "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you" (Luke 22:20). Jesus is the fullness of Divine Revelation. Through Jesus, God the Father fulfilled his plan of salvation and established his everlasting covenant.

One Church, Many Cultures



Catholics of all ages have a responsibility to share and celebrate their faith. Young people can do their part by sharing their faith with one another and with the wider world. Every year, the Church celebrates World Youth Day in a different city, usually over the summer. Catholic young people from different cultures and backgrounds all over the world join together to pray and to learn more about their faith from priests, catechists, youth leaders, and even the pope. They learn from one another, too.

Sacred Tradition began with the preaching of the Apostles.

Imagine yourself as one of Jesus' first followers. Throughout Jesus' ministry, you have walked the roads with him. You have listened, watched, prayed, and had engaging conversations.

Jesus' teaching and presence have touched you deeply. Jesus has totally changed your life. You know, in a very deep way, that you have met the Lord. Your life is different now, because you know Jesus. How would others, in the centuries to come, be able to have the same experience?

As we know, Jesus fulfilled the Father's plan of salvation for us through his life, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension. God continues to offer his salvation to the world through his Church, the Body of Christ. In order for this to happen, Christ commanded his Apostles to preach the Gospel. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, they communicated the message of salvation through their preaching and in writing.

The Apostles would, in turn, hand on to their successors the preaching and teaching that Christ had entrusted to them. This process of passing on the Gospel message, from Christ to the Apostles to their successors, is called Sacred Tradition. The Apostles entrusted the Church with the responsibility to

profess and guard the **deposit of faith** contained in Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition. From the time of the Apostles, the Church has passed on the Good News of salvation in her life, teaching, and worship. The Church will continue to carry out this sacred mission until Christ returns in glory.

Partners in Faith

Saint Dominic

Saint Dominic was born in Spain. He lived about the same time as Saint Francis of Assisi. When he was about 25 years old, he became a priest. Several years later, he and six other priests began traveling around and preaching the Gospel. They became known as the Order of Preachers. Today, we call them Dominicans, after Saint Dominic. Dominic said that it was important to study and pray as well as to preach.
