Christ In Us offers a saint or holy person for every grade. The Holy Person for Grade 3 is Venerable Pierre Toussaint. As you journey through each unit, remember to pray to Venerable Pierre. Ask him to guide you to be closer to Jesus Christ.

French colony now known as Haiti. Pierre worked as a house slave on a plantation. He was raised Catholic and was educated as a child. In 1787, he moved to New York City with the family that owned him.

In 1807, Pierre was granted his freedom. Pierre began to work as a hairdresser and soon became famous for his skills. Pierre eventually became a rich man. But he knew that true happiness can only be found in following Jesus and his teachings. Together with his wife, Pierre founded an orphanage to care for homeless children. He also helped raise money to build a new Catholic church in New York City, now known as Old St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Pierre showed his devotion to God by the way he lived. He gave money and time to many organizations serving the poor.

Pierre died in 1853 at age 87. He was buried in the cemetery at the church he had helped to build. In 1991, his body was moved to Saint Patrick's Cathedral on Fifth Avenue in New York.

In 1996 Pierre was declared Venerable, the first step to sainthood. Pierre's life serves as a model of holiness to us all.

The Bible is God's Word.

Creation alone does not tell us everything about God. God loves us so much that he wants to speak to us. God speaks to us through the Bible. The Bible is also called Sacred Scripture. The Bible is God's own Word.

God chose people to write the Bible. God the Holy Spirit inspired and guided the people who wrote the Bible. He gave them freedom to write in their own way. We can use our imagination to understand what we read in the Bible. We read about events, signs, stories, lessons, and prayers in the Bible. The Bible is a collection of books about God's love for us. The Bible tells us about our call to live as God's people.

God the Holy Spirit guides our minds and hearts to believe all that God is telling us. The Holy Spirit guides the Church to teach us truthfully about what God wants us to know.

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The Bible is made up of two main parts. The first part of the Bible is called the Old Testament. The Old Testament tells us about God's friendship with his People before the birth of Jesus. In the Old Testament, we learn about God's laws and the history of God's People. We learn that God has always loved us and wants us to know him.

The second main part of the Bible is called the New Testament. The New Testament tells us about God's love for all people through his divine



Son, Jesus Christ. When we read the New Testament, we learn about Jesus' life and his teachings. We read about how Jesus healed people and helped people understand God the Father's laws. We learn about Jesus' first followers and about Jesus' saving work, and how the Church began.

We use symbols for the writers of the Gospels. Draw your own symbol for each writer. What does each symbol represent? Matthew: Winged Man. This reminds us of the human ancestors of Jesus. Mark: Lion. This reminds us of Jesus' Resurrection. Luke: Ox. This reminds us of Christ's sacrifice. John: Eagle. This reminds us of the heights of our faith.

Prayer



Jesus shows us the way to God the Father.

God tells us about himself in the Bible. Jesus, God the Son, fully shows us who God is. Everything Jesus did shows us his love for us.

In the New Testament, the **Gospels** tell us about Jesus and his words and deeds. The word *gospel* means "good news." Here is what the Good News of the Gospels means for us:

- Jesus is the Son of God. He came into the world to become one of us and to save us. He came to show us God's love for us.
- Everything Jesus did—his teachings, his miracles, his love for everyone, his prayers, and especially his Death and Resurrection—shows us the way to God the Father.
- Jesus is the Savior of the whole world.
 All of us have been saved by the Paschal Mystery: Jesus' Passion, or suffering,
 Death, Resurrection, and Ascension.
- Jesus is our Risen Lord. He lives at the right hand of the Father in heaven. He is always with us by the power of the Holy Spirit.

The Gospels were written after Jesus' Resurrection and Ascension, when he returned to his Father in heaven. The four Gospel writers are called the four Evangelists. Their names are the names of the Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.

The four Gospels begin the New Testament. The Gospels are so important because they tell us about Jesus, who fully reveals God to us.

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In the Gospels, Jesus showed who his Father was through signs and wonders. The following Scripture verses tell us about one of these signs:

"Suddenly a violent storm came up on the sea, so that the boat was being swamped by waves; but he was asleep. They came and woke him, saying, 'Lord, save us! We are perishing!' He said to them, 'Why are you terrified, O you of little faith?' Then he got up, rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was great calm. The men were amazed and said, 'What sort of man is this, whom even the winds and the sea obey?'" (Matthew 8:24–27)

The disciples were amazed. They had never before seen anyone who could calm the sea like this. Jesus wanted them to have faith that he was who he said he was. He was the Son of God.

Jesus worked many wonders like this. He healed the sick. He walked on water. He even raised people from the dead. These amazing events were beyond human power. They were miracles, or amazing events that are beyond human understanding. Jesus' miracles showed people that he was human and divine.

The Holy Spirit guides the Church.

"When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim."

(Acts of the Apostles 2:1–4)



The Holy Spirit came to the Apostles, Mary, and the other disciples on Pentecost. The Holy Spirit guided the Apostles to begin the work Jesus gave them. They shared the Good News of Jesus with all people. God worked through the Apostles and their followers. Since the time of the Apostles, the Church has continued to share the preaching and teachings of the Apostles about Jesus Christ.

The Church's teaching of all that God has revealed in Jesus Christ is called **Sacred Tradition**.

God reveals himself to us in both Sacred

Scripture and Sacred Tradition.

Through Sacred Tradition the Holy Spirit guides the Church to pass on what God has revealed in the Bible and the teachings of the Apostles. Tradition includes creeds, or statements about what we believe. These statements tell about how we worship God and follow Jesus' teachings.



Scripture and Tradition present God's revelation to us. Together, they show us that the Holy Spirit is alive in the Church through all time, until Jesus comes again in glory.

Sacred Tradition refers to Jesus' teachings, ministry, and authority as they were passed down to his Apostles and their successors, the bishops.

The Holy Spirit lives in the Church, which is the Body of Christ on earth. You are part of the Church. You can live out Jesus' words and teachings every day. As Catholics, we all work together as one Church, one Body in Christ, to help spread the Good News about Jesus.


