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
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


How can we know who God is? How can we know what God really and truly cares about?

If we look at a newborn baby or a sunset or a mountain, we might guess about the Creator of all this wonder. Many people in ancient times did just this. They thought that many gods created many wonders. They believed in a god of water, a god who ruled the seas, a god who governed the skies, and on and on.

It seems that the only way we can know who God is for sure, is to learn about God from God. That is, we can learn the truth about God only through God's self-revelation. The word revelation means "a showing" or "a telling." The Bible shows and tells us this: God seeks a relationship with us, and God is on our side. We can be sure of these two huge truths because God has revealed them to us.

The Bible is made up of two sets of writings that are all inspired by God and all tell about God. These two main sections of the Bible are the Old Testament and the New Testament. The books of the Old Testament



contain many kinds of writings: family stories, national histories, prayers, warnings, dreams and visions, and wise sayings. These writings reveal the truth about God and the people of Israel before Jesus was born. They help us understand who God is, and also that we are invited to live as a people God calls and cares for. The New Testament continues the story of Israel as it unfolds after the birth of Jesus.




Basic Facts About the Bible

- The Bible is divided into two main sections: the Old Testament and the New Testament.
- The Old Testament makes up the largest part of the Bible, and the New Testament makes up the smallest.
- The Old Testament tells the story of God's relationship with the Jewish people up to the time of Jesus.
- The Old Testament also helps us understand the New Testament.
- The New Testament tells the story of Jesus and his followers.



- The Old Testament was written over the course of about a thousand years; the New Testament was written over the course of about a hundred years.
- For hundreds of years, the people of Israel passed on their family stories by word of mouth. This is called their oral, or spoken, tradition.
- The word *scripture* means "writings." Sometimes the Bible is called holy Scriptures or holy writings.
- There were at least four major authors of the Old Testament. God's inspiration guided their writing.
- The first words of the Old Testament were written on parchment made of goatskin or sheepskin. The parchment was rolled into scrolls. Many of the scrolls were stored in clay jars. These jars kept out the moisture and strong sunlight that would have faded and spoiled the parchment.

The people believed that in the best possible world, each and every creature came forth from God's hand and received God's blessing. Each was commanded to grow and spread and fill the earth.


This Creation story was Israel's very own family faith story. The people could easily remember this story, for it followed a seven-day pattern.

On the sixth day, human beings were made in God's image and likeness. They were God's finishing touch. God gave them the task of caring for the earth and keeping it new and fresh.

And then God stopped. The seventh day was set aside to be a day of joy and peace. It was a holy day, a day for all Creation to rest and be with God.

Our Blace

The Hebrew people developed a second Creation story, which helped them explain how sin and loss came into the world. This story can be found in Genesis, chapters 2 to 3. In it God created human beings a little lower than the gods. God then created a perfect garden of delights. But a tempter moved through the garden, in the form of a serpent. And the serpent challenged the first human beings, Adam and Eve, to think about their place in God's created world. Adam and Eve had to choose between the tempter and God.

Adam and Eve chose the tempter and lost their friendship with God, their Creator. They also lost their harmony with the created world. The Old Testament records a long human struggle with sin and loss and our need for a redeemer. Christians believe that Jesus is the obedient Son of God who cancels the disobedience of Adam. Jesus is the redeemer who overcomes sin and brings us back to the full life with God that was lost in the Garden of Eden.

Paradise

In the beginning a stream of water flowed across the empty land. There God knelt down and formed Adam from the clay of the ground.

Then God planted a garden called Eden. It was beautiful to see. It was filled with all good foods to eat. A single tree of wisdom grew in the center of the garden. This tree gave knowledge of what was good and what was evil, and it was for God alone. Everything else was for Adam's delight.

God wanted more for Adam. So God created birds to fill the air and fishes to fill the sea and animals to roam the earth. Adam named all the animals.

Even with all that God had given him, Adam was still lonely. So God created Eve to be his partner and life companion.

Lemptation One day a clever serpent drew near to Eve. The serpent convinced Eve to try the fruit from the one tree that was God's alone. Eve saw how good this fruit would be to eat, and thought how wonderful it would be to be wise. The serpent said: "You do not have to obey God. Why, you can even replace God! Think of that! You can know evil and good, just as God does." Loss So Eve ate some of the fruit, and she gave some to Adam. At that moment they knew they had disobeyed God. They were so ashamed they hid in the deepest part of the garden, far, far away from God. At sundown, when the evening breezes stirred, God called out to Adam and asked him why he was hiding. Adam answered that Eve had made him eat the fruit of the tree of wisdom. Then God asked Eve why she had done that. Eve replied that the serpent had tricked her into eating the fruit. Adam and Eve had turned the beauty and the order of Creation upside down. They did not want to be "a little less than the gods." They tried to be smarter and greater than God, rather than grateful children of God. Their choice meant that they lost the joy of God's familiar presence. The garden was no longer a place of ease and rest. Adam and Eve and all human beings after them would have to work hard to harvest the goods of the earth. They would experience pain as they bore and raised their children. They would have to struggle to overcome pride and selfishness. They had lost the Paradise God had given them.
